Reducing the risk of chimney fires

Many of us will soon be lighting fires for the first time in months. As part of Home Fire Safety Month, it is aimed to raise awareness of safe chimney use, including the importance of ensuring that chimneys are swept regularly, are clean and appropriate quality fuel is used.

What causes chimney fires?

Chimney fires usually occur because the deposits of combustion are left within the flueways. A chimney fire is the burning of soot within the flue system, and can result in damage to the flue, house or surrounding structures and can start a house fire.

Chimney fires are usually started when high temperatures or flames extend into the appliance outlet and ignite the combustible deposits.

Humberside Fire and Rescue Service is urging residents to follow the following guidelines:

• Ensure your chimney is swept regularly, according to the type of fuel used:

- o Smokeless fuels at least once a year
- o Bitumous coal at least twice a year
- o Wood quarterly when in use
- o Oil once a year
- o Gas once a year (Any work on gas appliances requires a Gas Safe registered installer/engineer)
- Keep chimneys and flues clean and well maintained

• Be careful when using open fires for warmth. Make sure you always use a fire guard to protect against flying sparks

- Ensure the fire is extinguished before going to bed or leaving the house
- Ensure good quality fuel is used

• Never interrupt the air supply by blocking air vents or air bricks

Responsibilities for the maintenance of chimneys Renters and owners

Any person that uses flue appliances has a responsibility to maintain the appliance and flue. **Landlords**

Landlords have a duty of care to their tenants and are required to repair and keep in working order, any room heater and water heating equipment.

After a chimney fire has occurred it must be inspected thoroughly as soon as possible by a Certified Sweep before the chimney is used again. This is to ascertain if the rapid and dramatic changes of temperature, which would have occurred within the chimney, have caused any damage and to determine the need for any remedial measures.

Chimney sweeping

Chimney sweeping is important. The function of sweeping the flue/chimney is to remove the deposits that build up when the burning of carbon based fuels occur. By sweeping the flue/chimney it ensures that there is a clear and safe passage for the safe exit of combustion products. This lessens the chances of the chimney catching fire.

It is important to remember that all fuels – including oil, gas, wood, charcoal, coal and smokeless fuel – contain carbon and care should be taken with all flues at all times. If you do not get complete combustion then carbon monoxide will be produced.

Sweeping will also ensure the safe removal of obstructions that may have lodged inside the flue: nests, cobwebs, flue collapse (loose brickwork), which could prevent the safe exit of products of combustion The other function of a chimney sweep is to help and advise people in the safe use of the appliance.

BUDGETS

Although next February's council tax budget seems a little way off East Riding of Yorkshire Council has been working on the council's finances and most importantly thinking about how we aim to protect the services you value most. Since 2010/2011 ERYC has made £71 million of reductions with a further £70 million of savings to be made by 2017/2018

Whilst making these budget cuts we have still managed to hold the council tax at 0% increase whilst maintaining the services you tell us are important to you. Every year we invite representatives from all the parish councils as well as partner organisations to attend budget meetings where the council provides a true insight into the choices councillors will be faced with when producing the budget for next year. Our budget meetings for this year start in November and there has been a high level of demand from people wishing to attend and the events are now fully subscribed. However this year to ensure we gather us much information as possible from residents anyone who would like to have their say on the council's spending priorities can do so via an online survey.

THE LOCAL PLAN

The East Riding Local Plan is the name for the suite of planning documents that together will provide the long



term plan for development in the East Riding it will provide the framework for managing new development and addressing the main planning issues in the East Riding to 2029.


Whilst perhaps sounding a bit heavy and uninteresting this plan once adopted will be used to guide investment decisions and determine planning applications which affect all areas of the East Riding. It identifies the location and amount of new development that will take place in different towns and villages in the East Riding, including new homes, shops and businesses. It also identifies where development should not take place, for example because of the risk from flooding or because a site is protected to remain as open space - such as allotments and playing fields.

As part of the process before the plan can be adopted it has to go through a public enquiry stage, which is where we are at present.

North Frodingham is designated as a Village in the draft local plan; this means that only small scale development within the development limits would be allowed, whilst ERYC has no plans to alter that we must await the inspector's decision. It is hoped the process will be completed by late winter /early spring.

CHRISTMAS CAR PARKING

We recognise how difficult things have been for a number of our local businesses in the current economic climate and as in previous years we aim to support the local economy by providing free car parking at the key Christmas period. We hope this will encourage people to shop locally and attract trade to the town centres in the run up to Christmas.



Now it is possible for details of offending owners to be reported and for them to be sent a warning letter from the ERYC Dog Wardens – you have been warned:

Do you see irresponsible dog owners walk on after their dog has fouled.

Where possible please tell us : location & time & date of fouling, name & address of dog owner, description of the dog. To request removal of dog faeces please call 01482 393939 from East Riding Council

Our local Police contact was able to report no incidents in North Frodingham, but warns that criminal activity is spreading throughout the East Riding. Thieves are targeting anyone who does not lock their property or maintain constant vigilance. Telephone scams are increasing in number and variety; the latest included a caller saying 'Hey this is sorry I missed you, call me back quickly on 0809.... as I have something important to tell you'. 0809 is an area code located in the Dominican Republic; the call charge is £15.00 per minute and there is no redress if you make the call!

Sussex Police said 'Do not dial area code 0809, 0284 or 0876 from the UK unless you know the person you wish to contact.'



We continue to receive reports of identity theft and credit card fraud. One such incident reported to us appertains to a person endeavouring to purchase a mitre saw over the web. The credit card details were given, but the cardholder was contacted by the company in question, advised there appeared to be problems with their card and it would be better if payment were effected by a direct debit. The credit card company in question recognized there was something strange about the attempted transaction and blocked the card to prevent any potential fraud. Most of us purchase commodities via the website/E-Bay these days, but please be very vigilant; there are many opportunists out there who are very adept at stealing identities and card details. Do not become one of their victims.

We have also been made aware of attempts at vehicle cloning in the Force area. Persons are being contacted by letter from a company calling themselves Vehicle Mileage Check. Their plan of approach is to send you a letter stating they are acting on behalf of a motor dealer and that the vehicle dealer has the details of your vehicle as you are wishing to sell it, but before they can proceed they need to enquire about the vehicle's mileage/condition etc. If you have your vehicle at your home address but the alleged motor dealer has your vehicle details there is a good chance your vehicle has been cloned. If this should happen to you, report the matter to the Police immediately.

A member of the public sold a small gold sovereign on E-Bay, posted the item via special delivery necessitating a signature at the recipient's address. E-Bay contacted the person selling the sovereign advising this transaction had been monitored and had been found to be fraudulent. The person wishing to sell the sovereign contacted Royal Mail to try to stop the delivery, but was informed they were unable to intercept the parcel and that the person should contact the police to report the incident.

A male contacted a member of the public by telephone advising he was a bailiff and on route to their home address. He gave a mobile number as well as an 0845 type number as his contact details. Being suspicious of the call, the member of the public rang the 0845 number which was answered by a female who stated the number related to Northampton County Court. The member of the public thought this very strange and contacted Directory Enquiries for a telephone number for Northampton County Court. When he made contact with the Court and explained the situation, he was told the Court knew nothing about the incident or who the caller was who had purported to be a bailiff.

September 18th Alan Brigham, the Speaker for the evening, spoke about the East Yorkshire Regiment in WW1. He gave us a comprehensive summary of his approach to research, highlighting some useful web sites for those looking for relatives etc. He then talked about the structure of the Regiment, the Battalion names and the men who were involved. Before the WW1 started there had been three battalions of regular soldiers, and a similar number of territorial regiments. Lord Kitchener's recruiting success saw a further eight battalions added to the total; some went to France after training, some were placed in Reserve Battalions (used to make up the complement of a battalion that had suffered heavy losses) and others remained in England for coastal defence etc. Three battalions were cited as 'Pals Battalions' keeping together the volunteers from a specific village or town. One comprised mainly men whose peacetime occupation had been commercial; the second held men drawn from the professional class, and the third was labelled as t'others.

Alan kept us entertained for over an hour after which Polly Stead gave the vote of thanks, and light refreshments were made available.

The meeting in November is the AGM at which we will be considering the programme and group outing for 2015. Come along, and if you enjoy what you hear, perhaps you will consider joining. We meet six times a year for an annual fee of just £5.00.

Summary of the Response from our Ward Councillors

The Council is restricted since, with BT being the supplier agreed by national government, we can only work to their roll-out programme which is very frustrating as the council carries the risk for any problems.

Jane and I, were asked to 'launch' the first superfast broadband connections in Rawcliffe near Goole and we both made reference to the need for ensuring rural villages (particularly our ward!) were always at the top of the list - we had the ear of the BT Openreach Northern Director responsible and also the Governments BDUK regional director who oversees the delivery of the national programme and we made it clear to them the need.

The good news is that BT Openreach have at least just about completed their provision of the new cabinets required across the East Riding - its now down to their capacity to connect their services. Nth.Frodingham is in the programme, and Jane and I will continue to monitor progress. Jonathan & Jane.
