From East Wolds & Coastal Councillors.

High on our agenda at the moment are talks concerning the East Riding of Yorkshire councils budgets for 2012/2013 and during December 2011 we took part in four budget conferences held at venues across the East Riding. These conferences were attended by Directors and Cabinet members from East Riding of Yorkshire Council, representatives from the community and your parish council was represented at the conference held at Bridlington.

In the current financial situation everyone is aware of the pressure on delivering services and the budget conference is an opportunity to share some of the hard decisions that we face this year. We went through a number of workshops with those present and invited them to tell us what services they felt should be protected in the future. At all four events maintenance of Highways & Footpaths and care for the elderly came out as priorities and will most certainly be a message we take forward in our discussions. Feedback from the conferences can be found on the East Riding of Yorkshire Council website. It is worth mentioning that the Council Tax we pay only makes up 20% of the money received to run the council services (over 450 in number). So if the level of grant from government stands still, or decreases, as in the current climate we have to find different ways of working to provide the services to avoid increases in Council Tax or a reduction in services. With forward planning we have so far been able to protect services.

Also, it is good to be able to remind people that now is the time to think about applications for the Lissett Windfarm Community Trust fund again. Applications are invited from community groups in the East Wolds & Coastal Ward in February & March and the panel will meet in April to decide where the money will go for this year. In May 2011 at the Community Trust A.G.M. recipients of the previous years grants were invited to attend and tell us something of the benefits derived from the money they received. It was a really enjoyable evening and pleased us all to see how much good had been achieved locally as a result of the grants.

East Riding Council is what is called a 'Unitary' authority. That means it delivers all the local government services to its residents across almost a thousand square miles. This is unlike, say, North Yorkshire where the services are split between the County Council and the seven District or Borough councils. East Wolds and Coastal Ward which we represent is made up of 21 parishes (of which North Frodingham is one) and each one has a different character and identity from large parishes such as Nafferton to smaller ones such as Thwing. As councillors we are elected to represent everyone in those communities and are always available to answer any questions or concerns our residents may have. If we can't help we always try to point people to where they can find help.

Police Report

Do not leave sat navs/laptops/items of value on show in vehicles. Ensure they are out of sight (in the boot if possible) before leaving your vehicle and ensure your vehicle is secure.

Do not leave keys on view at home near front doors which have glass panels in them (easy visibility) and a letterbox in the centre of the door panel. It takes a matter of seconds to feed a coathanger or some wire through the letterbox, hook the keys, extract them through the letterbox resulting in vehicles being stolen from drives or from outside properties. This is happening in our Force area, please do not be a victim yourself.

If persons are seen acting in a suspicious manner, please report it to Humberside Police to enable us to check the matter out. If the persons are checked out and nothing untoward is happening, your call will not have been a waste of time, we view calls such as this as "calls with good intent". If the Police do not know about something, we cannot check it out.

If a matter is an emergency, call 999. If it is not an emergency please note the new non emergency number for Humberside - 101. You will start to see this denoted on marked police vehicles

If persons (with vehicles) are seen on farmland and have lurcher or greyhound type dogs with them, endeavour to get their vehicle registration numbers and ring the police with the details. Poaching of deer/rabbits and similar animals, not being killed in humane ways is going on in our area.

Police surgeries - we are endeavouring to start monthly surgeries up with effect from March 2012, to be held at the Social Centre. Day and time to be confirmed in due course. Your local PCSO looking after North Frodingham is now Claire Watson, who is based at Driffield PS on Wansford Road.

Resurfacing works to the B1249 Wansford Road and Anderson Street junction in Driffield as well as resurfacing to the south of the traffic signals from the school to the Police Station and carrying out some carriage way patching between the two sites. Due to some of the work being close to the level crossing, Network Rail have requested a full road closure across the level crossing between Fawcett Gardens and Anderson Street.

The works around the Anderson Street junction will be carried out in 2 phases - the first being the closure of the B1249 Wansford Road (with traffic management at the southern side to assist with traffic movement from Anderson Street to the end of the site near Meadow Road junction). This will be in place from Wednesday 25 January 2012 until Thursday evening (26.01.2012). The diversion route will be Anderson Street, River Head, Beverley Road, A164 Kellythorpe Road, A614 Driffield By Pass and B1249 Scarborough Road.

The second phase will be to close Anderson Street for 1 day to allow the resurfacing of Wansford Road junction to be done. The diversion route will be B1249 Wansford Road, B1249 Scarborough Road, A614 Driffield By Pass, A164 Kellythorpe Road, Beverley Road and River Head.

Access will be maintained at all times through the traffic signals at Bridlington Road junction.

Remembrance

Mrs Jane Moat brought children and staff to the War Memorial at 11.0 am on 11 November. The children presented a wreath and planted poppy crosses in the names of those who had died during the two World Wars. They also decorated the Memorial with large illustration of poppies, inscribed on the reverse side with prayers which they had written. This was most imaginative and thoughtful but, to cap it all, I was presented by Class 2 with a commemorative booklet, headed 'We will not Forget', which contained copies of the prayers written by Callum Sinclair, Kelvin Laidlaw, Connor Jones, Emma Storry, Isabelle Crook, Amelia Lee and Katrina Watson. On Remembrance Sunday I took this to St Elgin's Church, where it was greatly admired and appreciated.

Thank you, Class 2 - I will treasure it.

<u>Personal</u> The Parish Council elected me Chairman in 1993 and , for the next 17 years, continued to re-elect me - a case, probably, of 'better the devil you know'! By this time last year, though, I was in no doubt that I was past my 'sell-by date' . I was pleased when Kathryn Kell was elected to succeed me, but by that time, Village Voice had been in a state of 'suspended animation' , and I now welcome the opportunity to express, publicly, my best wishes to Kathryn and my thanks to Christine Taylor, Ron Fuell and Joy Harris (successive Clerks to the Parish Council), and to the many friends who have been fellow-councillors over the years. Joy, of course, is a well-known figure in the village, but I sometimes wonder whether the average resident knows much (if anything) about the range of voluntary activities/responsibilities to which she is committed, in addition to her formal duties as our Clerk.
