Dark Undertakings, Rebecca Tope

Tope writes about village life but there is always a twist and a murder. Her two series of books are based in the Cotswolds are in the West Country and either follow the life of a house sitter or as in this book the life of an undertaker. What appears to be a straight forward death, albeit of a healthy popular man (JIM), raises question to Drew, (new to the business) and when the doctor refuses a post mortem he decides to investigate. Could this be a murder?

Written in a warm friendly style Tope creates believable characters and the reader is drawn in. When the dog dies two days later Drew is convinced there is something not straightforward about this death. Over a period of a week the story unfolds and we learn more about Jim's life and what has led to his death.

An easy and enjoyable book to read on a Sunday afternoon next to a coal fire.

People are still falling victim to identity theft/credit card fraud by using the Internet. A member of the public ordered some supplement tablets via the internet from a company calling themselves CIMOBIA. The amount to be taken from the person's account was £10.00, but it appears £160.00 was taken from their account. They contacted their bank who are refusing to refund the monies. The matter has been referred to Action Fraud.

A member of the public ordered an engine from Gumtree and arranged a bank transfer from his account to a Nationwide account. The engine has never been received nor the money refunded. The male who was allegedly selling the engine is now refusing to accept calls/answer texts. The advert appears to have been removed from Gumtree along with all the other items which the member of public noticed were on sale then

We are receiving reports of vans being broken into overnight which are having money and/or tools stolen. The latest report was of a van parked up at a hostelry. The occupants, having returned to their vehicle the following morning, found tools totalling around £5,000.00 having been stolen. The lock on the rear door was not damaged nor was the van and the thoughtful thief/thieves had locked the van up securely at the rear having removed the tools!

A white rover 420 vehicle was parked overnight at a local public house and was due to be collected by the registered keeper the following morning. However when the owner returned to the pub the following morning, the vehicle was no longer there. The owner was to make enquiries with the landlord lest they had moved the vehicle for any reason (causing obstruction), but to date the vehicle has not been located.

A silver Mercedes car has also been stolen from the car park of a local hostelry in the Force area. The modus operandi appears to be similar to the aforementioned event. Be very vigilant if you are parking your vehicle at a local public house, ensure it is securely locked and do not leave anything of value in view.

A report was received of a vehicle parked behind the school in the village at 05.00 hours. Two men were seen near the vehicle and when a dog walker passed the vehicle, one of the men tried to make out he was talking on a mobile phone and referred to a meeting which was planned behind the school at 04.00 hours that morning. Who arranges rendezvous or meetings at 04.00 hours? If anyone sees vehicles which appear to be parked suspiciously and/or persons acting in a strange manner, please ring 101 and notify us. Even if the situation is completely bona fide, your call will have been made with good intent.

Lissett Community Wind Farm Fund

Lissett Airfield Wind Farm is owned and operated by Infinis one of the country's largest renewable energy producers. Since the wind farm opened in 2010 the company have made a donation of £60,000 each year into a fund which can be spent on projects that provide 'Public Benefit' in East Wolds and Coastal Ward of the East Riding. To date the fund has supported over 63 larger projects with grants totalling over £234,000. To date the parish of North Frodingham has received 1% of the overall grant expenditure from the fund and this has included most recently £2,000 towards the River Hull Valley Drainage Heritage Project . The fund is managed by a panel made up of representatives from the seven parishes in closest proximity to the wind farm. The fund panel will receive the next donation from Infinis in January 2015 and have therefore met recently to decide on how the fund will be disbursed.

Applications are invited from local charities, community groups, schools, parish councils and churches in the East Wolds and Coastal Ward of the East Riding of Yorkshire..

The fund panel will consider funding requests up to a maximum £5,000 and would like to see evidence of the organisation commitment to the project up to a value of 30% of the total project costs. In exceptional circumstances the fund panel will consider applications outside these parameters and will also consider donations of materials and/or volunteer labour as part of the match funding.

All applications must meet the fund criteria 'Public Benefit' which means that a project MUST meet one or more of the following and be open to all of the public. (Note: organisations that have a membership within a specific age range can apply and need to show that all members of the public within that age range would be eligible to take part in the project if they wish). The fund panel accepts that venues sizes, numbers of volunteers and other factors may limit the actual number of people taking part in an activity or event.

- · advancement of education
- advancement of health or the saving of lives
- advancement of citizenship or community development
- advancement of the arts, culture, heritage or science
- advancement of amateur sport
- Advancement of environmental protection or improvement
- Promotion of the efficiency of the police, fire and rescue services or ambulance service

Applicants must supply the following supporting documents with their application

Copy of most recent bank statement(s) - all accounts, Copy of most recent annual accounts, copy of governance document, three comparable quotes from different suppliers for all items costing £500 or more.

Previous applicants are most welcome to apply.

The opening date to download and/or request an application pack is Monday 5th January 2015, & the closing date for return of Applications and Supporting Documents is Monday 5th March 2015

The fund panel will meet on 15th April 2015 to decide on which applications to support.

Please note that any expenditure on a project that comes from the fund must take place after the fund panel meeting on 15th April 2015.




