#### DR IAN ANDREW DICKSON JOLLIE



Dr Ian Jollie died peacefully at home on Tuesday 10th of February 2015 after courageously battling the degenerative brain disease PSP (Progressive Supranuclear Palsy ) for the past seven years. It is a cruel disease which gradually robs people of their ability to walk, talk, see and swallow while remaining mentally alert.

Having lived in North Frodingham for 50years both he and Judy were an established and well respected part of the community. His passion for General Practice and obstetrics saw him become the senior partner at the Beeford and Leven surgeries when Dr Player moved on. At the same time he was able to follow his interest in obstetrics at Beverley Westwood and Castle Hill Hospitals having brought into the world at least two if not three generations in the same family.

Although a true Yorkshire man, his ancestral roots were in Scotland, where his great grandfather, grandfather, father and brother were all eminent doctors.

I worked with Ian for twenty five years at the surgery as a district nurse and feel proud to have known him as a friend and colleague for so long. He was widely respected as a GP but also as a kind, determined and funnv (yes, funny!) individual. It would be wrong of me and I am sure he would be the first to agree, to portray him as a Saint, as I am sure many of his patients and staff had, at some time or other, been at the receiving end of his "I do not suffer fools gladly" mood. The booming sound "ENTER" as one stood outside his surgery door could have the mightiest of men quaking in their boots. However, he never left the surgery at the end of the day without thanking his staff for their hard work.

Following his retirement age 60yrs, after 40 yrs at the surgery, he was able to enjoy 10 good years travelling, walking, golfing and spending precious time with his wife and family.

Judy and the girls, Debbie, Susie and Kirstie have borne their grief with courage and dignity, qualities which he would have been so proud of.

He will be sadly missed by all who knew him.


With the advent of sunny days, people are starting to leave windows open in the evenings or doors unlocked to let fresh air into their homes. Unfortunately there are persons within our Force area who take advantage of this – we have been starting to receive reports of burglaries of both commercial and domestic premises. Please can all home owners ensure their properties, including any outhouses, garages, sheds are secured even if people are in their properties at the time. A recent report was for monies having been stolen from a property whilst the owner sat watching TV in their lounge. The thief gained access through an insecure UPVC door, the home owner never heard a thing.

Over recent weeks householders in the village have been approached by persons purporting to be canvassing for EYG glazing. It is true EYG have had canvassers working in the area for them, but Humberside Police have been told these canvassers are smartly dressed and carry a form of ID. It appears some of the persons who were allegedly canvassing in the village for EYG were not "suitably attired to make a positive impression" - they were wearing tracksuit trousers, trainers, hoodies and carried no ID! Please be very mindful of cold callers and who they purport to be. If you are unsure ask for their ID. If they present it, close the door asking them to wait outside and contact the company they allege to be working for to check their authenticity. If they claim they do not have any ID or refuse to show it, do not admit them to your homes.

Be aware North Yorkshire Police are receiving reports of bogus water officials operating in their area. We've experienced this many times before – they arrive in two's or three's, stating they need to check your water supply etc and distract you while one of their colleagues invites himself into your home and searches for valuables. Don't be caught out.

For the farming community – North Yorkshire are dealing with an increasing number of thefts of farm equipment – tractors, trailers, quad bikes to name but three. Please ensure you do not leave farming equipment unattended wherever possible and never leave the keys in them. Some of these thieves are professionals and know exactly what to steal to order! At its March meeting, Peter Rogers, Assistant Estate Manager, Burnby Hall, gardens & museum, gave a fascinating talk entitled 'Mr Stewart and the Romanovs'. We heard that, Herbert Stewart, elder brother of Percy Stewart, the owner of Burnby Hall, became tutor, from 1908 – 1917, to the family of Grand Duke Alexander Michailovitch, brother-in-law of Tsar Nicholas II. The talk was liberally illustrated with photographs, taken by Herbert, of the family he worked with, many of which had never been published before. Peter has produced a small booklet about the subject which led to a degree of international acclaim, as previously unknown information and photos of the doomed Russian nobility had been revealed.

The next meeting on Thursday 21<sup>st</sup> May will feature an enactment group helping us back to life in the 17<sup>th</sup> century. After that, in July the group will be visiting Burnby Hall and Gardens.

You are welcome to come to any of the group meetings. We meet six times a year (the summer meeting being a group outing) for a fee of just £5.00.



### Medibus and Dial a Ride

Getting around in the rural areas is sometimes difficult at the best of times. This is even more of a problem if you live in a rural village and need to attend a hospital appointment or wish to visit a friend or relative in hospital. This can often mean relying on friends and relatives to provide transport which is not always convenient.

East Riding of Yorkshire Council's Medibus service provides a flexible home to hospital transport service. The service is funded by a Central Government Rural Bus Challenge Grant.

There are four Medibuses based at:

- Beverley(serving Beverley Westwood, Hull Royal and Castle Hill Hospitals)
- Carnaby (serving Alfred Bean, Bridlington and Scarborough Hospitals)
- Pocklington (serving York District Hospital)
- Withernsea (serving Princess Royal, Hull Royal and Castle Hill Hospitals)

Medibus is easy and convenient and fares are very reasonable (about the same as bus fares). East Riding Travel Passes are also valid on the service.

Medibus works on a pre-booked basis and fits its schedule around its passengers on a day to day basis. Each Medibus can carry 8 passengers and has room for 1 wheelchair and the 4 Medibuses carry an average of 450 passengers per month, so it is best to book your journey as soon as possible. Each Medibus has easy access using an electrically operated side step and ramp to the rear and our drivers are friendly and helpful.

Once your journey is booked, a courtesy call will be made to you the day before your appointment to give you an exact time that you will be picked up from home. Depending on distance to the hospital, this is usually no more than 1 hour or so before your appointment. After you have finished your appointment or visit to hospital, the driver will normally be back to take you home within 1 hour.
