The school was open for tours, there was an exhibition of children's work and History Society photos displayed as well as bouncy castle, balloon release and stocks to name but a few of the events. So many local businesses supported us with raffle prizes and we are very grateful. We ended by singing Happy Birthday to our fantastic school with the most impressive cake made by Mrs Walker. We were able to share the blowing out of the candles with our two eldest pupils as well as two of the earliest pupils, Mrs Duggelby and Mr Webster. We really appreciated them joining us. As the end of term is now approaching I know that we fulfilled our aim to ensure that the centenary was meaningful for our children and thank you to all who supported us. As the warmer weather appears to have finally arrived with us, people are opening windows and doors to let the fresh air pervade their homes. However, due to windows and doors being left insecure through the daytime/into the evenings, not only is the fresh air pervading homes, but so are the burglars. Humberside Police are receiving lots of reports of walk-in burglaries, which when investigated have been caused by insecure doors (including patio doors) and windows.

Thieves posing as police officers have defrauded victims of thousands of pounds after a spate of bogus telephone calls. More than 130, mainly elderly, people have reported such calls since March. A 76 year old woman reported she had had £13,500.00 stolen and a 76 year old man has transferred £4,000.00 to the scammers.

A genuine Police Officer will never ask you to transfer money.

The calls have been mostly around Hull and East Yorkshire but some were made to people in North Lincolnshire. One couple who received such a call stated that the police officer claims her husband's bank card had been used in an attempt to buy a laptop computer and three had been arrested. The lady said the caller was so plausible, giving them his police number, a crime reference number and asked them to ring the bank. The couple rang but put the phone down when "customer services" could not say which bank had been used.

The fraudsters are using unregistered, pre-paid phones that are hard to trace.

During the call the thieves claim recipients have been a victim of fraud and ask them to contact their bank giving them a number to ring. Targets are asked for card details and personal data or to transfer money to a supposed police bank account.

Police officers do not use holding accounts and bank details should never be given out over the phone.

It has become noticeable the number of vehicles which are parking on pavements in the village. Whilst people sometimes do this to ensure their vehicles are not damaged by passing vehicular traffic (especially at the present time when building work is underway in some areas of the village thereby increasing the amount of parked vehicular traffic), it clearly states in the Highway Code you should not park partially or wholly on the pavement unless signs permit it. Parking on the pavement can obstruct and seriously inconvenience pedestrians, people in wheelchairs, the visually impaired and people with prams and pushchairs. How would you feel if your child had to walk in the road because a thoughtless car driver had parked their vehicle on the pavement and your child had to step into the road to get past the obstacle, resulting in them being injured by a passing vehicle?

It has also been brought to our attention that persons are parking close to junctions in the Main Street. The Highway Code clearly identifies the locations you should NOT park your vehicle or trailer on the road where it would endanger, inconvenience or obstruct pedestrian or other road users:-

Near a school entrance

Anywhere you would prevent access for emergency services

At or near a bus stop

Opposite or within 10 metres (32 feet) of a junction, exception in an authorised parking space

Opposite another parked vehicle

Where the kerb has been lowered to assist persons in wheelchairs

In front of an entrance to a property

On a bend

Please think of the impact your action may have on other people

Medibus and Dial a Ride

Getting around in the rural areas is sometimes difficult at the best of times. This is even more of a problem if you live in a rural village and need to attend a hospital appointment or wish to visit a friend or relative in hospital. This can often mean relying on friends and relatives to provide transport which is not always convenient.

East Riding of Yorkshire Council's Medibus service provides a flexible home to hospital transport service. The service is funded by a Central Government Rural Bus Challenge Grant.

There are four Medibuses based at:

• Beverley(serving Beverley Westwood, Hull Royal and Castle Hill Hospitals)

• Carnaby (serving Alfred Bean, Bridlington and Scarborough Hospitals)

• Pocklington (serving York District Hospital)

• Withernsea (serving Princess Royal, Hull Royal and Castle Hill Hospitals)

Medibus is easy and convenient and fares are very reasonable (about the same as bus fares). East Riding Travel Passes are also valid on the service.

Medibus works on a pre-booked basis and fits its schedule around its passengers on a day to day basis. Each Medibus can carry 8 passengers and has room for 1 wheelchair and the 4 Medibuses carry an average of 450 passengers per month, so it is best to book your journey as soon as possible. Each Medibus has easy access using an electrically operated side step and ramp to the rear and our drivers are friendly and helpful. Once your journey is booked, a courtesy call will be made to you the day before your appointment to give you an exact time that you will be picked up from home. Depending on distance to the hospital, this is usually no more than 1 hour or so before your appointment. After you have finished your appointment or visit to hospital, the driver will normally be back to take you home within 1 hour.

Lissett Wind Farm Grants

In April the wind farm panel met to consider this year's list of applications for grant funding of local projects and this year we have again been able to help a number of organisations with funds for local projects.

The process has worked well to date and All 21 parishes in the East Wold and Coastal Ward(E.W.C.)are eligible to apply for grants and we do all we can to encourage people to put forward ideas, especially if they are of benefit for a wider number of people living in the area. One such application was approved this year for an amount of money to be held by the Wind Farm Panel for use by communities in E.W.C. for home security schemes.

The panel had been particularly impressed by a small application from Brandesburton Neighbourhood Watch in 2014 and could see the potential benefit a larger project could offer residents. The police have been very supportive of the scheme and have offered to refer cases where they believe the money could be used to provide some home security in areas where they think there is a need. If there are residents in your neighbourhood who you believe could benefit from some basic home security then please get in touch with us. the parish council or police mention the Lissett Wind Farm scheme and ask for an

For anyone passing Gembling School it will have been very evident from the number of cars parked outside that something is happening in the building. You will remember that the school closed a couple of years ago and remained empty for some months, however the school is currently being used on a temporary basis as accommodation to for pupils from Kingsmill School whilst their school undergoes some alterations & refurbishment. The programme of work at is in 2 phases and currently indicates that the works will be ready in October 2016 with the gradual transfer of pupils from Gembling School back to their newly refurbished school in Driffield.

Fraudsters are targeting classified advertisement websites like AutoTrader to advertise vehicles for sale. Buyers are then contacting these 'sellers' to find out more about the vehicles and are being told to pay for them via 'Apple Pay'. In this case the fraudsters are not using the genuine Apple Pay service and potential victims pay money directly to bank accounts in control of the fraudsters. Individuals receive emails claiming to be from Apple Pay with a web link to a cloned website with false terms and conditions of the 'escrow' service. Any money remitted to the fraudsters is then unrecoverable and the vehicles are not delivered.

Protect yourself:

- Meet the seller 'face to face' and view the vehicle before parting with any money.
- Be cautious of web links in an email. They may not direct you to the genuine website.
- Report scam advertisements to the classified advertisement websites.
- If the vehicle is below market value, consider whether this is an opportunity too good to be true!

Please be reminded that garden furniture is vulnerable to theft

When going online be very cautious about opening links that are from an unknown source; many scams are achieved in this way.

There is a bogus site claiming to be NS&I offering the chance to invest in Pensioner bonds. Care !!

Your search engine can direct you to a fake site. Care !!

Never give out your details online or over the phone unless you initiated the contact. Especially bank details !!

Parish Council Report

We had four members of the Parish Council resign their seats at the last election. So far we have managed to co-opt two new members and they have been officially welcomed to the group. I mentioned last issue that the Parish Council intends to concentrate on the Cemetery for a while. The grass cutting and weed control well in hand and the Cemetery and church yard look all the better for it. The storage facilities have upgraded and security much been improved. Before making good the fences and hedges, painting the gates etcetera – it was decided that we call in the Tree Surgeons to conduct thorough a investigation of their status.

Bad news I am afraid, the copper beech trees at the gate are infected with *Ganoderma* fungus. One has extensive decay at the base; it must be cut down. The other is less extensively decayed, and with prudent management and monitoring should last a few more years. If you are one of those who carved their initials into the trunk of the trees – now might be a good time to say your fond farewell to the memory!

Other matters still in hand include the possible purchase of a cardiac defibrillator; dealing with any planning applications that arise and generally spotting and reporting any potential highway and other problems. The Council has discussed the problem of maintenance of Rights of Way and understands that whilst we do not have many designated footpaths those that run through private land should be kept free from obstruction by the owner of the land.

THE DIARY OF WILL JAMES SMITH

June 25th 1914 - Bloomin heck, I've only got three days until it's too late to sign up, to join the World War 1 army. I've left it too long. Mother told me not to sign up because she is afraid I will get injured and wounded in some way, but I think it is the right thing to do, to save my country, and other countries that are supporting us. I know that if we work as a team we can get through this war.

June 28th 1914 - Signed up yesterday - mother isn't happy.

Tomorrow we are being transferred to France to start training for the upcoming war. We have to be at the canal for 5:00am (which I am not looking forward to!)

Mother is preparing an appetising feast before I leave, also, she is praying that

everything will be ok and that I will be swell when I come back.

July 11th 1914 - Many apologies, I haven't informed you of what has been happening, I have been too busy training. I think I'm getting quite good at aiming on the rifle range. I am also learning about physical fitness. I almost got sent out of training because I called a rifle a gun - people here are so strict! I haven't got too long until I travel to the real, misty battle field, where no man's land is.

July 28th 1914 - Our first battle is almost here, I really hope I survive. This might be the last time I write to you but I might make it - I don't know.

August 23rd 1914 - Our first battle is over, except, I'm not at the battle field anymore I'm lying in a hospital bed, in a great deal of pain. I went over the top of the trench, and got caught in machine gun fire. It's a throbbing pain. I can't stand it, but hopefully I will be back in the war in no time - you're probably wondering why I want to go back to the war as I just got shot, but I do. It's my duty.

I want to save my family, I want to save the country, I want to make a difference.

August 25th 1914-Going back to war today the nurses have been wonderful. I am a little bit anxious of going back to the front but at least I won't be lying in a hospital bed feeling useless anymore. I only liked two things about the hospital, the food, because at the war we get bread, bully beef and a bit more, but not a great deal, the other thing is Nurse Rosie - she is quite exquisite!

If I survive the war, as soon as I leave, I am going to ask her to marry me - or at least see me again.

December 25th 1919 - This is the last time I will be writing to you, I am going to pass this diary on to my new born son, so that when he grows up, he will understand what we soldiers of World War 1, went through.
