


#### My Last Trip

Towards the end of July 1945 the war in Europe had been over for three months but the war in the Far East was still continuing. I was a radio operator and was sent to join a ship in Immingham, the SS Empire Mortimer, a war-time built 10,000 ton cargo carrier.



She was loading Army stores for the Far East, among which were 6,000 tons of petrol in jerry cans which amounted to about a quarter of a million separate items – all to be man-

handled. No pallets or fork-lifts then, so a slow laborious job.

I mention here that my wife in Beverley was expecting our first-born, so I was trying to get there whenever possible. This involved train to New Holland, ferry to Victoria Pier, town bus to bus station, and then East Yorkshire bus to Beverley. Time taken: 2½-3 hours, distance about 50 miles. (A bridge was needed!)

And then our daughter was born, the bomb was dropped, Japan surrendered and the war was over. Our first thoughts were that these supplies would not be needed and we wouldn't be going. But no, we carried on loading and, having completed, we said goodbye to Immingham and departed, bound for Rangoon.

#### Parish Council

Yesterday the Parish Council finally placed the order for a cardiac defibrillator which will be fixed to an outside wall of the Blue Post. This brings North Frodingham into line with other villages in the area and will hopefully be a vital yet rarely used asset for the community. The Ambulance Service is to talk to residents about the device at an open meeting in the Village Hall. Details of this will be posted on all three notice boards and you are encouraged to come along for an hour and find out about this new village asset.

<u>Cemetery news</u>, the second phase of tree work will be carried out before the end of this year. Trees to the east, centre and south of the cemetery will have crowns lifted, dead branches removed and ivy disentangled, as necessary.

Two changes to the way the Parish Council operates are taking place, both involving electronic communication! Planning applications are now to be managed via the Internet and be available for anyone to monitor. Access is quite simple provided you have an Internet connected device: Type East Riding Council into your search engine and wait for the home page contents to appear; click on the section marked Planning & Building Control; next screen click on Search for Applications in Your Area; then click Open Access. This gets you to a page where you can open the file you need by typing in a reference number or a line of the address. Good Hunting!


The other change will also make it easier for you to monitor the work of your Parish Council without attending the meetings, reading the Noticeboard at the Millennium Garden, or requesting information from the Clerk. All small Councils are to publish full details of annual accounts and members, Minutes and Agendas, on dedicated websites. Our site is currently under construction and should be operating before the end of 2015 and is intended to replace the current system of external auditing of accounts, by 2017. Paper copies of the Agenda will still be posted on the main noticeboard each month and of course you are still welcome to attend any of the Parish Council meetings, second Monday in the month in the village Hall at 7.30pm. The Parish Council is still looking for two residents to make up the quota of Councillors, how about YOU?

#### Social Centre

Most of you will have seen the newly painted Main Hall by now, if only in a photograph, so far we have only had a very positive response to the work carried out by the teenage volunteers from around the East Riding. However we have also had the benefit of local volunteers, particularly Mr Geoff Rudd, who have completed staining woodwork on the outside of the Hall. On behalf of the users of the hall, THANK YOU so much.

Our Hall now provides a venue for so much of the social activity in the village, with at least ten groups meeting on a regular basis, lots of private parties, informative talks, etc. Even if you do not make use of the facilities, can you imagine the impact on village life if it closes because there are too few volunteers to keep the management committee functioning? Please think about giving a few hours each month to join the committee and keep this asset operational.

**History** Group

'The Adventurous Stewarts' were the topic for September's meeting of the history group. Twenty members assembled to hear Peter Rogers, who had been unable to meet us at Burnby Hall Gardens, give his talk, illustrated with many photographs, about five of the fourteen children of Rev. and Mrs James Stewart. Flora, who was a devout Christian, killed in China whilst working as a missionary. Douglas, who became a midshipman on an iron barque that transported migrants to Australia and was just eighteen when the ship went down with all hands in 1888. Arthur Stewart, the youngest of the family, who moved to

Canada at the age of 24 years, but returned to fight for England during the Great War. The last of the five was Percy Stewart, who was eventually responsible for the purchase and donation of Burnby Hall to Pocklington. Percy and his wife had travelled around the world several times and collected the unusual artefacts that form the basis of the small Museum collection.



## **Museum Display 2015**

If you didn't manage to visit the '100 years of Childhood' display this year, you missed well over 150 assorted toys, books and games loaned by local residents.



The centre piece was a detailed model of a schoolroom, circa 1900, complete with outside loo, dunce and gowned teacher. To say nothing of the tiny Natural History folders in front of each child.

Also available to stir the memory were copies of a School log book and attendance register and photographs of Frodingham students from 1919 to 2007.

The Museum, in the Cemetery, is now closed until next year when the History Group will be mounting a 'Trades and Tradesmen' display depicting something of life in Frodingham in 1901 – 1911. If you have anything that could be of use in this exhibition, please contact one of the members of the History Group or, better still, come along to the next meeting Thursday November 26<sup>th</sup>.

**STANDING ROOM ONLY** in the Village Hall, Friday 30<sup>th</sup> October, as 127 residents from Frodingham, Beeford and Foston got together to discuss the proposed anaerobic digestion plant on the outskirts of Beeford.

The meeting, organised by Mrs Lisa Goodall with the help of the Parish Council, was chaired by Mrs Angela McKie and Mr David Goodwin with the support of our local MP, Sir Greg Knight.

As expected the main source of disquiet was the increase in traffic through the villages, as food, fish and vegetable waste is ferried to the digestion plant. Estimates varied but all agreed the total number of two-way journeys involved would be in excess of the 7-9 per day claimed by the applicant.

Other concerns were the loss of amenity, potential for waterway pollution, risk of gas explosion and obnoxious smell.

Sir Greg Knight suggested that our strongest objection was the narrow, twisting nature of our country roads, unsuitable for the increase in heavy goods vehicle movement. He urged everyone present to make known their objection to the case officer before the deadline for response, as indeed he claimed he would be doing Monday morning.

Reports have been received from around the Force area of a gentleman stating he was representing Everest Glazing, but when asked to provide ID, he refused. The gentleman was of white European appearance with a north eastern accent. He tried extremely hard to gain access to the properties where persons answered their doors to him. Cold callers are a fact of life, but if you are unsure as to their reason for attending at your property, request some form of ID. When this is given to you, if you are still not sure about them, ask them to wait outside, ensuring your door is securely closed/locked and contact the company they claim to represent. We have had instances recently whereby persons representing the Red Cross have been out canvassing - when checks were made on them, it was proven

they were in the areas with the knowledge of the Red Cross. Never feel you are wasting police time by making such a call, if persons are found to be in your area legitimately, it is peace of mind for you. However, in some instances the information you are able to impart to us may provide us with a part of a puzzle we may have been looking for.

As the dark nights approach, there has been an influx of calls to Humberside Police regarding poachers on farm land. Please remain vigilant – if you see a vehicle(s) parked near farm land with dogs with them, there is a chance they may be there against the farmer's wishes. Please do not approach them as they be armed, if possible obtain their vehicle registration details and call it in on 101. Checks can be made and a patrol deployed if it is deemed necessary.

We are approaching the festive season in the not too distant future. If you go shopping, be it for Christmas presents or otherwise, please ensure any items left in your vehicles are not left clearly in view. Wherever possible store them in the boot out of the sight of would-be thieves; if it is not possible to store them in the boot, cover them with a blanket or something similar. Lastly, take great care with credit cards; don't let anyone see you input your pin number. You don't know who is standing behind you in a queue.

Take care and have a safe and happy festive season.

#### **Transport**



Once all the responses have been gathered they will be considered and if any proposals are to be made to change the way in which the library service is delivered in the future residents will be consulted again before any final decision is made.

Please be aware there is now a NEW scam going about, beware of texts or Emails from a friend of yours saying they are stuck somewhere abroad having been mugged and asking you for financial help.

A couple were recently in the news having hired a "man and van" from a Facebook advert: the removal men turned up, took all their possessions and drove away never to be seen again. If you're hiring someone for an important job - don't just rely on social media.

Most people who come to your door may be genuine callers, but sometimes, you can't be sure and so you need to "think security" before opening your door to them!

'Cold call' scams typically involve fraudsters deceiving victims into believing they are speaking to a police officer, a member of bank staff, or a representative of another trusted organisation, such as a computer company in order to steal money. Always be on your guard if you receive a cold call especially if you are asked for any personal or financial information. #### Talk Talk Cyber Attack.

Talk Talk, the phone and broadband provider, has been the victim of a cyber attack on their website commonly referred to as DDoS – distributed denial of service attack. This has led to hackers accessing Talk Talks servers and stealing personal data, which could affect over four million customers. It is currently unknown exactly what data has been stolen but Talk Talk has stated that there is a chance that some of the following data could have been accessed:

- Dates of birth.
- Email addresses.
- Telephone numbers.
- Talk Talk account information.
- Credit card and banking details.

#### Protect yourself:

- Be wary of any emails claiming to be from Talk Talk asking for additional information, such as passwords, even if they are able to tell you specific account details – this could be a *phishing* email and sent to gain access to your account.
- If you have already opened an email attachment, please ensure you change the
  passwords for all your bank, email and online shopping accounts as soon as
  possible.
- As well as e-mails, be VERY wary of any telephone calls claiming to be from Talk Talk which ask for additional information, or want to gain remote access to your computer. Again they may tell you specific details about your account; If you do get such a call, do not give any details, terminate the call, use a separate telephone line/mobile phone and call Talk Talk back on one of their known numbers to ascertain if the call is genuine.

Monitor your bank accounts for any unusual activity which you believe could be fraudulent.
