

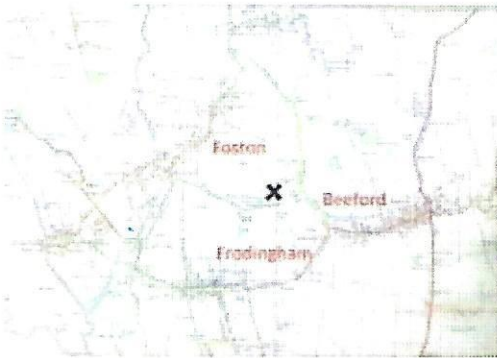

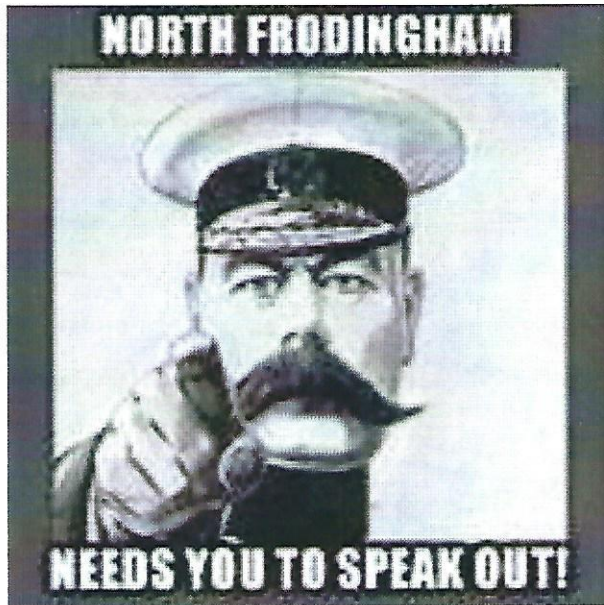

The matter currently exercising many residents, and which will affect everyone, is the proposed development of the large **industrial bio-digestion plant** in the triangle between Foston, Beeford and North Frodingham.



This edition has been hurriedly put together in order to be distributed in advance of the planning meeting which had been arranged for March 10th but which has now just been put back to **April 14th**.

A small group of highly committed individuals from each village has got together and put a great deal of time, effort and personal expense into the campaign to oppose this development on our behalf. They have contributed an article stating the possible consequences if this plan goes ahead and inviting those who haven't already done so, to make their views known to the planning committee before a decision is made.

You may have already made an objection but if, after reading more about it, you have other points to raise, there is nothing to stop you writing again.

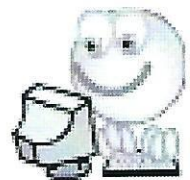
Other developments have been the installation of a **defibrillator**, the building of a **village website** and a visit from the **Archbishop of York**.

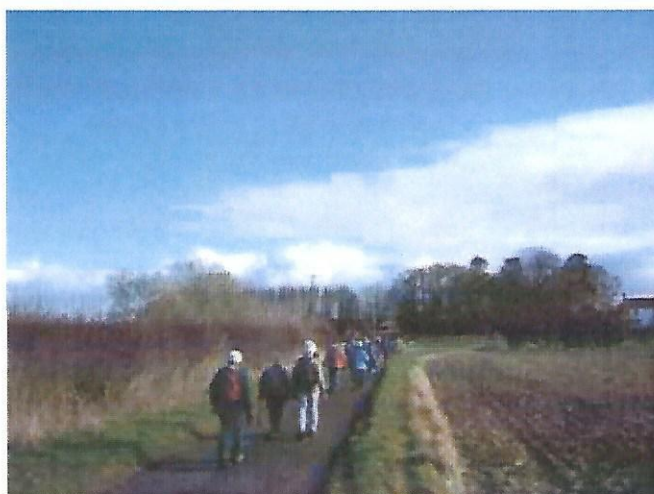

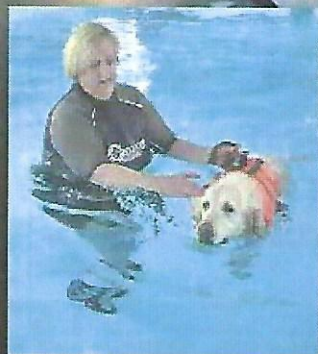

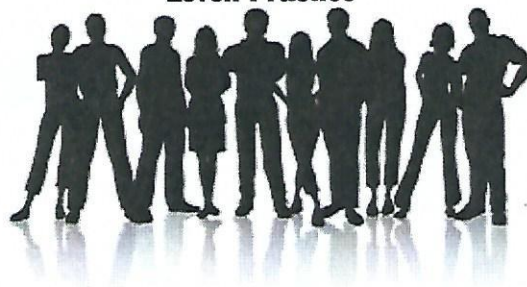

Social Centre (Joy Harris)

The latest meeting of the Committee resulted in some worrying trends; two or three planned events have been cancelled because there will not be sufficient committee members available to safely run them. This is a sad reflection on the importance North Frodingham places on this resource, the various clubs that use the hall and private parties will of course continue as usual and routine bills will be met. BUT it is the one-off events that provide the 'top-up' funds.

History Group (Joy Harris)

The first meeting of the year, a cold, wet night in January



still attracted twenty one members to the warmth of the Village Hall. After a short business meeting, and collection of the annual subs, our Chair introduced our speaker, Sheila Cadman who was to talk about 'Wansford, Back to its Roots'.

Sheila, without the benefit of slides or notes was able to keep the audience entranced with her obvious enthusiasm for the subject. Having moved to Wansford some twenty plus years ago she embarked on a quest to uncover the history of her new village home, *(how well I can identify with that feeling!)* Her journey began with the discovery of pottery sherds in her back garden; some were identified by experts, as medieval, some as Staxtonware, other fragments from various local potteries. But some from much further away; one fragment in particular had writing on it and was obviously part of a small medicine pot. Over time, and presumably a lot of gardening, to her amazement she found the remains of several other similar pots and eventually was able to

trace their origins to Dorset on the south coast. How did they find their way to Wansford?

She started to find out about the river transport to Wansford; of the canal boats and the connections to Drifffield, Hull and Nafferton. Then followed a short digression to talk about the carpet factory that had been built on the bank of the river; its machines were installed by the son of William Arkwright and were powered by water. At the height of production two hundred people were employed, with sixty orphans, brought up from London, to make up the numbers. These children lived in a row of cottages built between the river and what is now the canal. The carpet factory burned down and was eventually replaced by a bone-crushing mill which eventually was pulled down in the 19th century.

This talk was extremely interesting and we all felt that not only had we learned a lot about our neighbours but also that there was a lot more to learn. Hopefully Sheila's book will 'whet the appetite' of someone who will explore the links between Frodingham and Wansford.

children, dog-walkers and bike-riders will be affected by increased traffic, damage and pollution. The school will also suffer due to the fall in numbers of children in the village

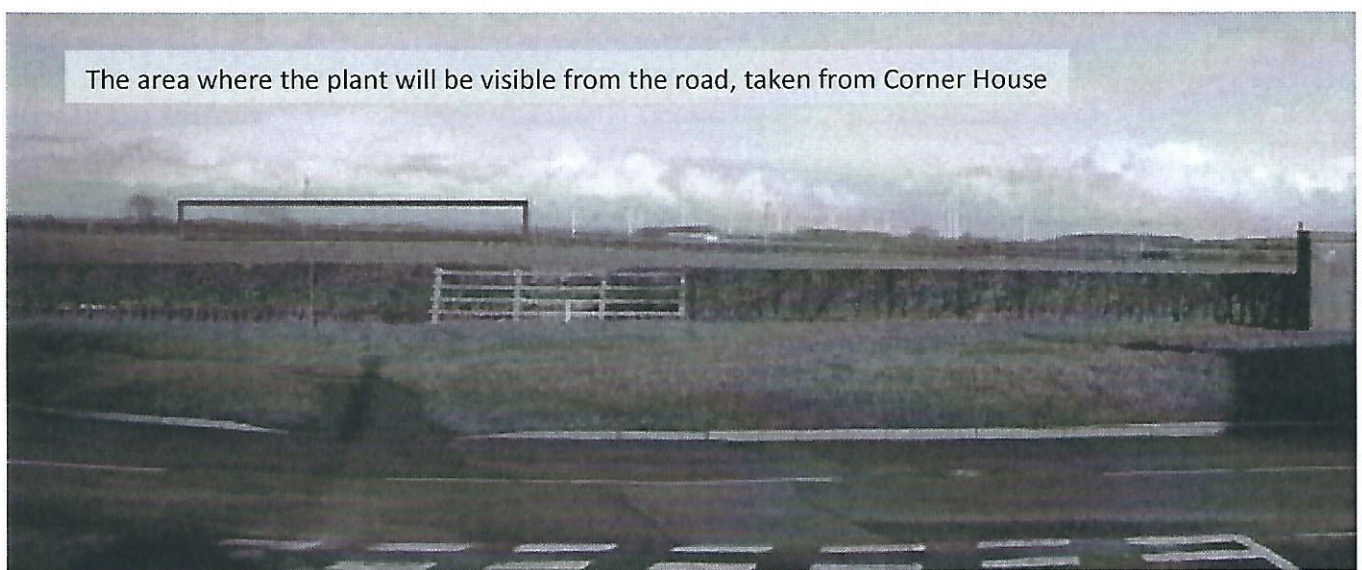
- ☒ Our 'rural service centre' (Beeford) will fall into decline for the same reasons and suffer the same effects. This means that residents of North Frodingham will no longer be able to use services there, such as the doctors' surgery, butchers, convenience store, vets, caravan site, chip shop, restaurant and public house.

What does this mean for YOU?

- ☒ You will be constantly living with the stink of the waste plant and the stink of passing lorries and tankers (full of animal waste, fish waste and other people's rubbish).
- ☒ If you want to leave the area, you will have to lower the price of your house by between 10% and 20% (as suggested by local estate agents).
- ☒ If you live on the Main Street, your houses will shake and begin to

damage due to the passing heavy goods vehicles (now up to a possible 10 per hour and increasing). Your children will be unsafe, as they navigate dangerous roads and breathe in carcinogenic diesel fumes from the many large vehicles. If you drive, you will have to navigate increasingly dangerous and blocked roads.

- ☒ You will be unable to avoid the sight of an ugly 220m long, 95m wide and 14m high construction which will have uprooted our hedges, trees and greenery.
- ☒ You will be constantly worrying about unmanned and large-scale gas explosions in a relatively close proximity to your home and family.
- ☒ You will have to watch helplessly as your village slowly falls into ruin and decline, both structurally and economically.
- ☒ You will have to travel further afield (Driffield, Brandesburton, Leven) for basic commodities and recreational services.



What can you do?

The residents who have been active against this development have been amazed at the way in which 3 villages can unite and support each other. New friends have been made and there is a real sense of community which it is hoped will continue, regardless of the future of the waste plant.

Thank you for all you have done so far.

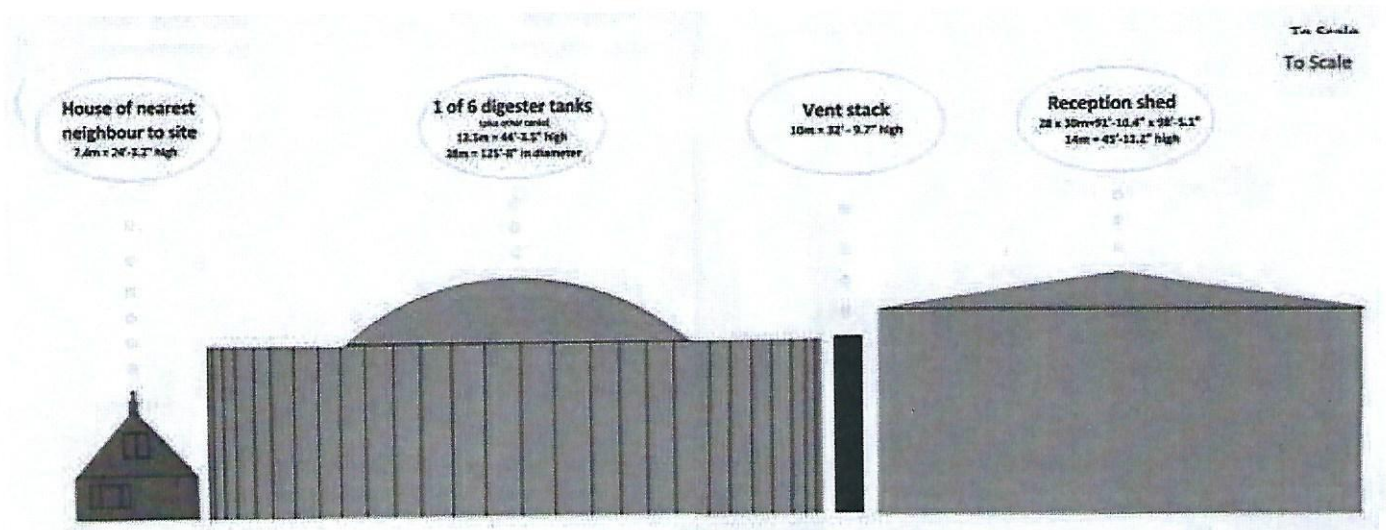
If you have been unable to support the fight until now, there are huge ways in which you can still make a difference. You can:

- ✓ Did you know: you can object more than once about different concerns; your children can also place objections on the portal; it is better if all members of your household place individual objections (joint objections count only once).
- ✓ Attend the crucial decision meeting at County Hall, Beverley (now 14th April but could be further delayed – we will keep you informed). We must attend silently, but a large turnout will speak volumes and must affect the decision of the council.
- ✓ Share this information with your friends, family and neighbours so that they can make a difference too!

BEEFORD ANAEROBIC DIGESTER

There is no way we could exclude mentioning the Beeford application for an anaerobic digester from this editions update, the application which will be one of the largest plants considered to date, has certainly fired much local interest and we have been actively advising all interested parties who contact us to understand what are and are not planning issues. Hundreds of letters of objection have been received with North Frodingham parish councils along with a number of other local parish councils voicing concerns. At present we are expecting the application to be heard by the Strategic Planning Committee on March 10th at County Hall Beverley. (Now April 14th – Ed.)

BUDGET SETTING/COUNCIL TAX

On Thursday 11th February councillors of East Riding of Yorkshire Council met to set the budget and council tax for the following 12 months. Councillors as a result of large changes in how local government is funded and large reductions in the financial grant given to councils from the Treasury in Westminster, councillors unanimously agreed to increase

council tax by an overall figure of 3.99 % in 2016/17 - the first such increase made by East Riding of Yorkshire Council in six years. This equates to 1.99% increase for services and 2% for Adult Social Care.

The government have allowed councils to raise council tax by an additional 2% if they wish, as long as the money raised is used for Adult Social Care. However, the adult social care precept will only meet 55 per cent of the expected increase in demand and costs for adult social care over the next four years. This charge will be shown separately on the council tax bill and must be spent on adult social care.

It is likely that most local authorities will adopt this approach, which effectively is passing raising local taxes to help pay for social care away from central government, but an important issue for the likes of the East Riding that has an elderly population that is above the national average and continually growing faster than other parts of the country. The East Riding hasn't raised council tax for a number of years but consultation with residents has shown that protecting adult social care and services is a priority.



An increasing number of reports have been received by Humberside Police appertaining to burglaries across the Force area, some being domestic and others being commercial. A number of properties have had secured doors and windows forced in order to gain entry to properties, resulting in money, motor cross bikes, tools, generators, racing clothing to name but a few being stolen.

A report was received from a young gentleman who had left his motorcycle in a layby by his property, secured by two chains, but despite this, offenders managed to cut through the chains and

steal the bike during which time the victim was in his home but neither heard nor saw anything.

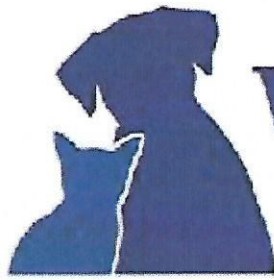
A commercial property was broken into resulting in keys for a lorry being located. The lorry was entered and tools removed.

If a thief is determined to steal your property they will go to any length to obtain the goods, but make it as difficult for them as you possibly can. CCTV equipment is now readily available on the market and does not need to be expensive to purchase. If CCTV equipment is fitted at your home, ensure no cameras look directly into anyone's property to avoid issues. Speak to your home insurance company to see if, by having CCTV equipment fitted, you may get a reduction on your insurance premium.

STEP-BY-STEP PROCESS TO FOLLOW WHEN YOU FIND AN UNCONSCIOUS PERSON

| Step | What to do | How to do it |
|---|---|--|
| 1 | Assess situation | Have they had a fall? Look for evidence of cause of trauma. |
| 2 | Check for damage to back of head | Place hand under head to check for bleeding |
| 3 | Are there physical signs of cardiac arrest or problem | Grey pallor; cold extremities; blueish tinge around mouth; possible sweat sheen on skin. |
| 4 | Check for responsiveness | Shout into each ear 'OPEN YOUR EYES' Tap shoulders repeatedly |
| 5 | Check for breathing | Place one hand on forehead and two fingers of other hand under chin. Tilt head back to open airway and hold in position. With ears close to patient's mouth listen for breathing for 10 seconds (Adult should take two breaths and child four in that time.) |
| This assessment will only take a few seconds and will help the ambulance service operator to prioritise situation | | |
| 6 | Telephone ambulance service 999 | Give details of what you have done and found during the checking. (The operator will tell you what to do next. The paramedics will be dispatched and you may be told to get the defibrillator in the meantime) |
| 7 | Collect the Cardiac defibrillator | Located at Blue Post Inn, Main Street. The operator will give you the code to open the box. Send someone – do not leave patient. The operator will remain on the line until the professional arrive. |
| 8 | Start cardio pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) | Lock hands together, lock elbow joint and apply repeatedly pressure pulses over the heart. Hand should be positioned in centre of body between the breasts, roughly on a level with the nipples. Apply strong downward pressure at a rate of 100-120 beats per minute (two per second) Keep going until help/defibrillator arrives. |
| 9 | Defibrillator arrives prepare to shock | Between you remove clothing from chest area; make sure any jewellery is well out of the way. If necessary shave hair to ensure good contact with electrode. (Equipment is in the defibrillator bag) Dry area of patient if it is wet with sweat Place pads on skin using diagram on pad for guidance. (One pad should be above right breast; the other should be placed below left breast. The two pads should be in a diagonal line across the chest) |
| 10 | Stop CPR and allow machine to take over. | Follow verbal instructions from the defibrillator Make sure nobody touches the patient whilst shocking. Resume CPR for two minutes and continue to follow instructions until paramedics arrive |
| 11 | Paramedic arrives | Breathe a sigh of relief Tell him/her what you have done Make yourself a cup of tea! |
