



It is a wonderful collection of 'bygone days' with everything from a Round House to a crofter's cottage, to a Manor House to explore, and well-stocked village shops and workshops to look at and (dare I say it) for some of us to recognise.

Overall the outing was a great success, supported not least by the superb home-made cakes and tea/coffee with which to revive ourselves after walking round the Museum. The weather was fine and some of us were even able to get a preview of the exhibition of wedding dresses from mid-19th century to post WW2 which is now running, and well worth a visit if only to marvel at the 18 inch waistline of some of the brides!

Forthcoming meetings. September will be listening to a talk about Emmotland by Mr Sissons. We are hoping to learn more about the chemical factory and the extraction of minerals that once made Emmotland a hive of industry, and created the deep fishing pits in the area.


The museum is organised and run Museum by members of the History Group. We have assembled quite a large collection of exhibits and acquired a number of display cases in which to show them. Held in the chapel in the cemetery, this year we focussed on the retail outlets and workshops in the village at the start of the 20th century. Using the 1901 census and various trade directories we tried to show what it must have been like to live in a village with 4-5 grocery shops, tailors, 2 fish shops, several butchers, blacksmiths, joiners, a rope-maker and several cobblers. We had photographs and biographies of some of the notables of the time and many examples of the goods they sold or the tools they used. Sadly, by now, we have closed for the year and dismantled the exhibition, but never fear we shall be working on the display for 2017 and open again during the summer months. 



Would you like to get your phone or other valuable items back if they have been lost or stolen? The Police want to help.

For the past 11 years, they have been running a scheme called "IMMOBILISE".

It has the backing of the councils, Carphone warehouse, Orange, Vodoaphone, T Mobile; even The Home Office in the Government (but there's no budget helping the police get the message out).

For the Police, the FREE REGISTRATION OF YOUR PROPERTY IS A VERY POWERFUL TOOL IN

The N.M.P.R. is a single online property search system for the UK Law Enforcement agencies.

For the first time ever, it allows them to search any identifiable item of property to view its registered owner's details, if it has been reported stolen to the system by the police anywhere in the UK, by the owner, the insurance company or in the case of a mobile phone, a mobile phone network. Virtually all the police forces in the UK use the NMPR with nearly a hundred thousand officers have access via their control centres, handheld devices and computer systems. Hundreds of thousands of checks have been run since the system went live with many arrests and charges brought as a result of the information held on the N.M.P.R. database.

Humberside Police have been receiving reports of thefts from motor vehicles. When leaving your vehicle, please ensure it is securely locked and nothing of value is left on view. When reports are received by us, invariably CD's, iPhones, IPads and similar high value items have been left visible for the thieves.

We have also received reports around the Force area of damage to crops, with vehicles being driven through fields or people having walked through the fields.

There have been reports of building (sheds) being set alight and an attempted burglary at a property in the village. In this instance the property alarm sounded and persons fled the scene, leaving bolt croppers behind them which have been seized. Ensure your house and outbuildings are secured at all times, be it day or night.

With any callers, always request to see their ID. If you are not sure if it is genuine, close your door, ensuring it is locked and contact the organisation they claim to represent if a number is visible on their ID.





The Mortuary Chapel in the cemetery is used to house a small local history museum. Each year members of the Local History Group put on exhibitions featuring different aspects of North Frodingham's history.

For example this map illustrates the village's connection to William Wilberforce, the anti-slavery campaigner. In 1694, Wilberforce's great-grandparents Samuel and Ann Wilberfoss purchased 45 acres between the church and the river from Samuel Hunter.



The Act of Enclosure came into force in 1808 and within twenty years, most of the larger holdings had either been sold for a substantial profit or consolidated into even larger farms.

William Wilberforce began to sell in 1805 and had almost completed disposal of his inherited holding by 1827. He sold the Free Landing to the Commissioners of the Driffield Navigation in 1826.
