

At its May meeting the Local History Group enjoyed a fascinating presentation about the life and times of Amy Johnson. Mr David Mooney illustrated his talk with slides, and included his repertoire of anecdotes about this amazing aviator.

The group, which increases in number month-by-month organised the forthcoming outings to Hornsea Museum Thursday 19th July, and Leven Tuesday 24th July, and agreed the schedule for manning the Local History Museum on Sunday afternoons 2-4pm until the end of September. The Museum is proving to be gentle attraction, visitors not as numerous as wished, but this is largely accounted for by the run of appallingly wet Sundays we have endured this year. It is worth coming to see, we have a lot of old farming implements and domestic items on display as well as a collection of Frodingham Minute Books and Log Books, toys and photographs, wartime memorabilia and school work. Something for everyone and all associated with the village. There is no charge and someone always available to talk with – do come.

In addition to planning its outings and scheduling the Museum, the Group also agreed to map the numerous dykes and drains in the Parish in an attempt to understand and explain how the area is drained and how flooding can be prevented.


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

School Council

The School Council, led by Mrs Donaldson, are a very proactive group. Earlier in the year, they met with Greg Knight MP who kindly responded to their very searching questions. Elected by their peers, the group discuss issues in school, promote the school rules and run a very effective tuck shop. They are very active in getting parents involved in fund-raising activities not only for the school but also for charities. (£120 this term).

On Thursday 14th June, the School Council went to Real Aid at Tickton. We met a lady called Chris, who talked to us about landfill. Everything in the Real Aid warehouse would have gone to landfill if it were not recycled by Real Aid.

When she had finished talking to us, she showed us around the warehouse and explained what happens to everything. The clothes that are donated get cleaned and sent out to Real Aid shops. They make mother and baby packs and put in new-born baby equipment and things for a new mother and a blanket. These packs are sent out to other countries, especially Africa.

They collect wool and knit small teddies for the education packs. In these packs, there are books, pencils and a soft toy.

Real Aid also send out food parcels for the families who don't have enough to eat in the East Riding of Yorkshire.

We have collected food for the food parcels in school and have run a cake stall to raise money for Real Aid's 'Care and Share Week'.

Parish Council

The last two meetings of the Parish Council have included the usual flurry of planning applications to be reviewed and bills to be paid. Our local police representative has informed the Council that there seems to be an increase in telephone scams and bogus door-to-door callers in the area. Be wary about any unexpected callers especially if they are asking for personal information, or for access to your property.

Sadly it seems the lighter, albeit wetter, nights have encouraged some of our young people to engage in antisocial behaviour, particularly in the area of the Millennium Garden. Residents are asked to keep their eyes open and report anyone seen damaging the garden to a member of the Parish Council.

The Council is now in the process of negotiating the purchase of new grass cutting equipment for the Cemetery and Churchyard, it apologises for the untended grass in the meantime.

The Council has just been awarded a grant from the ERYC to relocate a hedge, on the bank of the Frodingham Mill Drain, to facilitate dredging and reduce the risk of flooding, in the event of a heavy downpour, into the west end of the Village and onto the valuable Carr land.

Finally the Parish Council noted with sadness the passing of 'Ben' Butler a well-known village character who, over the years, had voluntarily spent a great deal of time keeping the cemetery memorials in good condition. If anyone knows his 'secret' recipe for cleaning the white stones please let us know!

Social Centre Committee

The Committee reports completion of the electrical safety check and repair of damaged Emergency Exit lights, so all public safety checks are now complete for this year. It has had a bit of bother in the playground where youngsters are intent on using the new equipment in a way that it is not designed for. Perhaps mum's and dads could pass this message on to the young people, swinging back and forwards on the Zip wire across its line, and twisting the saucer swings so that they spiral out of control when released is fun, but not safe, and even worse will shorten the life of the equipment. One of the gates has been damaged and will be repaired when a replacement hinge arrives, in the meantime perhaps children could remember to shut the gate as they leave the area to prevent entry of stray dogs.

As with everyone else the Village Hall Committee is receiving ever-increasing utility bills; gas and water being much higher than last year. The Committee is preparing to increase its hire charges but has decided to keep the charge to groups using the Hall on a regular basis the same for a further year. The charge for hiring the Hall for a resident's private party will increase to £25 for a child's party during the day and £50 for an evening event. Non-resident's will be charged at double the rate, whilst Charity events will be charged at half the rate, £12.50 during the day or £25.00 for an evening event. The Committee apologises for having to do this, it will be the first increase in over four years, but is a necessary change if it is to maintain the Hall in its current state. The new charges will come into effect on September 1st 2012.

A decision was taken to postpone the formal opening of the playground until all of the installation is in place, including some benches and waste bins and the gate is repaired. Please keep an eye on the Noticeboard for information about the event.

There have been a couple of incidents during the past month of persons asking householders if they can gain access to properties to check the depth of loft insulation. One incident was checked by Humberside Police and found to be an over zealous sales persons. However, the other incident was reportedly a person working for Humberside County Council, which when checked with them was incorrect. No access was reported to us as having been obtained to any properties in the village.

Words of warning for anyone looking for loans on the internet. Choose your loan companies very carefully as you may be asked to pay a fee up front to cover the administration, but you may find no loan will be forthcoming and your fee will not be traceable with the alleged loan company.

An incident has been reported to Humberside Police recently of young persons playing football and using skateboards at weekends in the school playground area. Due to ongoing building work in this vicinity, signs are being erected to warn persons of the dangers of being in this area out of school hours, which at this time is not a play area. It has also been reported of possible damage having been caused to the Millennium Structure due to persons climbing on it. If there are any further incidents of this kind could people please contact the non emergency number 101 and report the incident(s) promptly, giving names of persons concerned if known and not leaving the matter for others to report or leaving the matter dormant for a number of days.

There have been bogus callers in the Hutton Cranswick area recently, and they may head for North Frodingham. The offenders are in a dirty white Ford Transit van (no registration number known), which is a long wheel base, has a rack on the top which usually had ladders affixed, has lettering on both sides of the van "Roofing Specialists". The driver is a white male, 5'6" tall, medium build with ginger hair wearing workmans clothing, described as having a posh accent; the second male is white, has dark hair, 6" tall. The ginger haired male does all the talking..

If you are approached by these individuals, the matter is to be reported to Humberside Police, to be book marked with log 640 29/06/2012 and log 293 dated 12/06/2012

We've also had an incident in Hutton Cranswick recently whereby 3 males purported to be from the Water Board and were checking stop taps. Their modus operandi is to advise that there is pressure on the waste pipe and it has blown from the sink. One male went upstairs to the bathroom on the basis he was checking the pressure on the pipes upstairs,

whilst the other two remained downstairs talking to the two ladies (distraction tactics). After the men had "completed their checks" and left the property, one lady went upstairs to find the bathroom awash with water and the bedrooms having been ransacked, resulting in a vast amount of cash and jewellery having been taken.

One male was described as being 5'9" in height with fair/gingery hair, late 30's/early 40's and of stocky build. He was described as wearing "ordinary dress" and had an ID tag around his neck with "ANTECH" or similar written on it but no picture.

The second male was described as 5'5" of proportionate build, 28-30 years of age, wearing dark trousers/blue shirt and wearing blue gloves. He was described as a "smart office lad".

The third male was described as 5'7" of a tall thin build aged circa 35 years with slick short black hair wearing a black top and black trousers

This incident occurred when there would have been plenty of activity in the village.

ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

The village has enjoyed a spell of relatively little anti-social behaviour, perhaps the promise of new playground equipment helped. However despite the grand new playground we are experiencing trouble again ranging from damage to window boxes and floral displays, the gate in the new playground, and at the Millennium Garden. Please, if you see youngsters damaging public or your neighbours or your own property LET THE POLICE KNOW. Call the non-emergency number, 101, and report the problem. Even if you don't actually see the youngsters, still report the damage to the police as soon as possible and they will help us deal with this problem before it gets out of control.

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Message from Ward County Councillors : Jonathan Owen & Jane Evison

Lissett Community Wind Farm Fund.

Lissett Wind farm, love it or hate it, there can be no doubt that the legal agreement requiring Infinis to provide a percentage of their income for a community grant has been well received within the East Wolds & Coastal Ward.

At the end of June the Lissett Community Wind Farm Fund held its annual review and all Parish Councils and recipient community groups were invited to attend to say a little bit about the way the grants have been used. The event which was held at Rudston Village Hall this year was very much a celebration of the projects that have been completed and was well attended by many of the East Wold & Coastal villages. North Frodingham has successfully submitted applications for funding of community projects in the last 2 years and representatives from the village attended the event.

Rural Strategy

East Riding of Yorkshire Council Rural Team is in the process of producing a new Rural Strategy, recent political & economic changes mean that the Strategy now needs to be radically revised and renewed. The new Rural Strategy will help E.R.Y.C. and the Rural Partnership with evidence they need to take positive action to tackle these changes and make the most of any opportunities. The Strategy is of particular importance to villages such as Nth Frodingham as it reflects the position of many East Riding residents and highlights areas of local importance.

The Draft Strategy has just completed the consultation process and will be presented to ERYC Cabinet later this month; some of the challenges refer to Broadband coverage, fuel poverty, farming, business development, rural transport & housing.

Parish Council Cluster meeting

At the end of July we have arranged a meeting at County Hall in Beverley for the parish councils in our ward. We represent 21 Parishes, all very different in size and population. From Wold Newton and Watton (Small parishes and 28 miles apart) to Nafferton and Hutton Cranswick with populations well exceeding 2000 people. Every one different, but there are many issues common to all. There are over 195 Parish Councillors representing just the Parishes in our Ward, and we try to attend as many of their meetings as possible. By bringing representatives from these Parishes together and bringing council experts responsible for various areas, we hope we have the opportunity for people to share their issues and hear how the East Riding of Yorkshire Council can tackle them. We are pleased that North Frodingham Parish Council has accepted the invitation and is sending representatives and continues its long history of involvement representing its residents.


