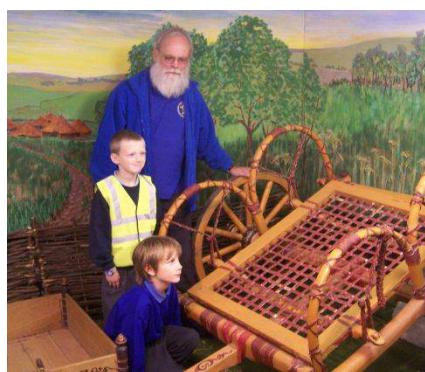

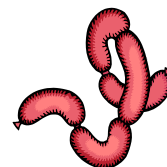

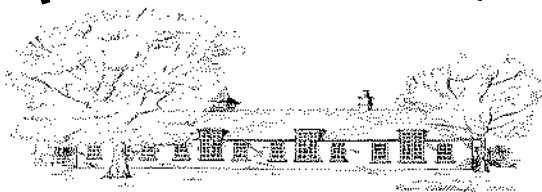

Parish Council

A relatively quiet period with few Planning Applications in the pipeline, although the appearance of Frodingham's wind turbine has certainly put us on the map! Your Parish Council has concentrated on the various open spaces around the village. The brick and concrete work at the Millennium Garden went out to formal tender and was awarded to J Gravil Ltd. At the church and cemetery Mr Stevens is gradually getting things back under control after the problems with broken mowers and numerous wet weekends, it has been a difficult period and the Council is appreciative of his hard work and determination to succeed. Mrs Blakeston and Mrs Shepherdson have offered to take the War

Memorial garden under their control, and Mr Rudd is prepared to assist by cutting the hedge as and when necessary.

There is currently a vacancy on the Parish Council, Brigadier Simmons having resigned, which will be filled by election or co-option as required. If you have any interest in joining the Council, please put your name forward by contacting an existing councillor, or the Parish Clerk.

The next meetings of the Parish Council are scheduled for 12th November, 10th December and 14th January. All are held in the Village Hall at 7.30pm, the Agenda for each will be posted on the noticeboard, and anyone is welcome to attend.

Social Centre

Not too much activity during the last two months, the Committee is finalising purchases of equipment for the new playground, and unfortunately has had to add the cost of a new gate to the budget. Mr Stevens is getting the grass cut on a regular basis and the Committee is still considering whether to design and construct a skate board ramp to the rear of the site, using the soil left from erecting the larger pieces of

equipment. The difficulty is deciding whether skate boards will 'go out of fashion' and pogo sticks become the latest trend!

The Committee would be greatly assisted if a few more residents would volunteer a couple of hours a month to help manage the Village Hall and the recreation ground. Please think about it! The next meetings of the Committee are scheduled for 5th December and 2nd of January.

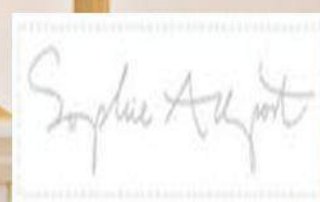



NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

There have been a couple of burglaries reported in the village in the past month, one being of two motorcross bikes from a garage. A green Transit type van had been seen in the area during the preceding days, which may/may not have any link with this crime. However, please be vigilant for the said vehicle whose registration has been reported to Humberside Police as ND51 YLR.

A further report has been received by Humberside Police regarding a green van, probably a Diablo whose registration number was given as ND51 YLA. It was parked on the forecourt of the local garage, three males alighted and appeared to be scouting around the shop.

The second burglary was by the thieves having gained access to the property via a conservatory window. All rooms in the property were searched and jewellery was sought through. During these times of austerity and particularly as we now approach the dark nights, please can we all endeavour to ensure windows and doors are securely locked, even if we are in our properties during the daytime. Thieves are now getting very brazen and will attempt to break in even if persons are at home.

A report was received from a home owner in Foston on the Wolds that someone tried the house door handle at circa 22.50 hours one evening. The noise startled the dogs who barked and it appeared may have caused the person/persons unknown to leave without gaining access. No vehicle or direction of travel could be confirmed. Had the house door not been locked.....

A report of anti social behaviour has been made known to us with young persons banging on house windows and doors during the early evenings. Whilst it may appear to be fun to do this, there are elderly persons living in the village who may live on their own and/or have health concerns of which these young persons may not be aware. The consequences of their banging on windows and startling/frightening persons could have very serious outcomes. We will all get old one day. The matter is being monitored and relevant action will be taken if the situation continues.

We are fast approaching the festive time of the year, a very beneficial time for burglars/thieves. If you are going Christmas shopping and leaving your purchases in your vehicles, **PLEASE** ensure they are out of sight. It takes seconds for a burglar or thief to gain access and it is the heartache and inconvenience the aftermath can cause.

A friend had a phone call from someone who said that he was from some outfit called "Express Couriers" asking if they were going to be home because there was a package for them, and that the delivery would arrive at their home in roughly an hour. And a delivery man turned up with a beautiful basket of flowers and wine. They were very surprised since they didn't expect anything like it. They inquired as to who the sender was. The deliveryman's reply was, he was only delivering the gift package, but allegedly a card was being sent separately; (the card has never arrived!). There was also a consignment note with the gift. He then went on to explain that because the gift contained alcohol, there was a £3.00 "delivery charge" as proof that he had actually delivered the package to an adult. This sounded logical and they offered to pay him cash. He then said that the company required the payment to be by credit or debit card only so that everything is properly accounted for. The husband swiped the credit/debit card on the small mobile card machine which had a small screen and keypad where he was also asked to enter the card's PIN and security number. A receipt was printed out and given to him. To their surprise, in the next few days £4,000 had been charged/withdrawn from their credit/debit account at various ATM machines. It appears that the "mobile credit card machine" was able to duplicate and create a "dummy card"; with all the card details. They immediately notified the bank which issued the card, and the credit/debit account has been closed. The Police confirmed that several households had been similarly hit. **WARNING:** Be wary of accepting any "surprise gift or package", which you neither expected nor personally ordered, especially if it involves any kind of payment as a Condition of receiving the gift or package. Also, never accept anything if there is no proper identification of the sender. The only time you should give out any personal credit/debit card information is when you yourself initiate the purchase or transaction! If in any doubt.. .don't!!!
Tell the Police and your Credit Card Company...
.AND: If at all possible; get vehicle details too...

WOLDS WANDERERS

North Frodingham is one of 21 parishes in the East Wolds & Coastal Ward that we represent, the majority of which are small very rural villages. This month we thought we would highlight one or two activities that could be of interest to rural communities.

The Pub is the Hub

Pub is the Hub is a not for profit organisation founded in 2001 by HRH the Prince of Wales, it encourages local authorities, communities, licensees, pub owners and breweries to work together to support, retain and locate services within the rural pub. Pub is The Hub offers advice, support and if appropriate funding for pub operators and owners who are considering a diversification scheme.

Community Transport Strategy

Transport or lack of it is a common rural issue and East Riding of Yorkshire Council is in the preparing a Community Transport Strategy, the strategy which is at present in draft form is currently being considered by our 4 main Community Transport Operators. The document attempts to give a future structure to Community Transport operations.

In addition ERYC is also piloting a Parish Transport Toolkit. The toolkit attempts to help parishes who find either transport reduction or unmet transport need an issue with ways of seeking solutions. If you do know of please do get in touch with us.

Brigadier Alan J Simmons

It was with regret that the Parish Council accepted the resignation of Brigadier Simmons from the Council last month.

It was back in October 1985 that the Parish Council first welcomed Brigadier Simmons as its new Community Advisor on Emergency Planning, a most appropriate position if ever there was one. Seven months later he was co-opted onto the Council, and has served this community ever since. In June 1993 Mrs Jollie retired from the Council and Cllr B Rookes and Cllr D Watson nominated Cllr Simmons to the Chair, a position that he held until September 2011 when ill-health forced him to step down. Reading through the Minutes of his tenure, it is noticeable how much has changed in North Frodingham, and also how difficult and slow it has been to achieve some of the needs of the Village; a 30mph speed limit for example took several years before it was imposed.

The North Frodingham Parish Council Chairman, A.J. Simmons built a reputation at County Hall for his forthright responses to some of the 'bump' churned out for our unpaid Councillors to wade through in their own time. Yet he was assiduous in carrying out his responsibilities and well deserves his reputation for hard work and old-fashioned courtesy. His presence will be missed at Council meetings.
