

'Living With Water' Project

Last month a new project was announced at an open meeting in the Village Hall. A steering group had been formed under the 'wing' of the ERYC to investigate and understand the drainage system of the River Hull Valley.

The objective is to produce a travelling exhibition and an accompanying booklet, which will increase public awareness of the River Hull drainage system.

Our section, which covers the Foston, Frodingham and Wansford parishes, intends to map and document the watercourses that make up the system in our area, review historical development and publicise its importance and value today.

To do this we need to evaluate the variety of plants, birds, mammals, and the number of people and businesses that depend on the system. We have to quantify the productive value of the area, and then estimate the price of neglect of the system.

It is a mammoth task; we have a small group of volunteers ready to start work researching and collating information, which will be shown the facilities at the Treasure House in Beverley and helped to find source material, but which could benefit from any help you could offer.

Do you have any knowledge of drainage in the area, either how it used to work, or why it seems to be in difficulties now? Have you any photographs of weirs, culverts, clearing dikes etc. that we could borrow? Do you know any of the men who used to check the river banks every year, or how the fields used to be drained?

We can do the dry data research, but it is your stories and experiences that will bring our part of the project to life, please help by getting in touch or jotting down a few notes. The steering group members for this part of the project are John Tickle in Foston, Phil Meadley and Joy Harris in Frodingham and Colin Walker at County Hall.

Parish Council (PC)

As expected, the last meeting of the year was fairly quiet, with only one application for a house extension to be discussed and one Planning approval to be acknowledged. Special Inspector P Gravil gave a brief report regarding police matters and urged everyone to be aware of bogus door-to-door salesmen, and telephone scams which seem to be on the increase. Her advice is to be very careful the old maxim truly applies – 'if it seems to be too good to be true, it probably is!'

The PC has managed, after prolonged negotiation with ERYC, to get the 30mph sign reinstalled at the west end of the village, let's all hope it has some effect on the speedsters!

The PC continues to discuss drainage issues with Yorkshire Water and is hoping a solution to the problem in Main Street, which occurs after a sudden heavy downpour, can be resolved, however little can be done at the moment as all resources are being

directed to coping with flooding elsewhere in the region. To date the PC has not received any reports of flooded property in the village, although reports of breaches in the river and dike banks have been received and are a cause for concern.

To end on a positive note, the PC has been able to continue financial support for the Twilight Bus Scheme, for the Driffield school children, and has managed to reduce the amount of money being requested from ERYC for the next financial year. The annual precept which is included in your Council Tax bill is used to pay for maintenance of open spaces and public property, support for local groups, and administration. Anyone interested in seeing the detail of expenditure is welcome to inspect the accounts on application to the Parish Clerk.

Finally the Parish Council extends to every resident its very best wishes for a healthy, wealthy and safe 2013.

Social Centre (SC)

The SC committee had both good and bad news to report at this month's meeting. The 'good' news was that the Village Hall had managed to 'pay its way' throughout 2012 and that various running repairs had been made, voluntarily, by members of the committee to ensure that it can continue to function. The 'bad' news was that the Youth Club would be closed for the foreseeable future. North Frodingham has had a youth

club in operation for more than twenty years, it seems sad that now, with more youngsters in the village and the cost of getting them to other groups is so expensive, that ours should have to close. The SC committee hopes that some parents will come forward to re-open the club and continue its long history in the village.

The SC committee wishes everyone a happy New Year and looks forward to seeing you at future events.

An incident was reported to Humberside Police regarding 10 caravans which were broken into at Brandesburton. At the time the incident was reported it was not known what had been stolen from the units, but it was believed to be electrical items. Whilst this did not happen in North Frodingham, it is only a short distance away. For anyone who has caravans in storage or kept away from the home address, please can they make sure they are secure.

There have been a number of incidents reported around the Division of poachers - Nafferton and Kirburn appear to have been the main areas of interest at this time, albeit North Frodingham does get visited by such persons. Please be vigilant if lights, be they torches or vehicle lights are seen in fields. The vehicles may be there with the farmer's permission or may even be the farmer himself, but the chances are it may be poachers with dogs. One such vehicle has been reported as a Subaru, no colour advised but registration mark V177 DPK. Another vehicle reported to us was a blue/silver Mitsubishi Shogun, registration P243 UGU.

There has been an incident of potential fraud reported to Humberside Police whereby a member of the public took out shares in a Time Share some time ago. The person was contacted by a company calling themselves Business Alliance Company, Hare Street, Buntingford, Hertfordshire SG9 0BB, telephone number 01442 780 8014. They advised the person they could claim monies back for them from the Time Share upon receipt of a regular payment. To date monies totalling around £8,000.00 have been sent to this organsation via UKash Vouchers. Needless to say other than the vouchers having been cashed, there has been no other communication with the person from the company. If anyone is contacted by this organisation, please contact us with the details. A male acting in a suspicious manner in Highside was reported to Humberside Police. He was encountered by a home owner on their drive, between their car and the boundary fence maintaining he was looking for a dog. The home owner's dog had gone out some time previously and there was no sign of another dog. No description of the male was passed to Humberside Police, but there have been a number of vehicles in the area recently from which fuel has been stolen. If anyone is seen acting in a

suspicious manner, please contact us on 101, the non emergency number, giving us as much of a description of the person(s) as possible, along with details of any vehicle they may have used.

It appears someone took a liking to a Christmas tree which was located in a pot outside a house in the village and decided to deprive the owners of it. Many people like to adorn their homes with Christmas lights and various ornaments at this time of the year. Please ensure they are secured as far as is possible.

It only remains for me to thank those of you who have taken the time to report matters to us for your co-operation and to wish everyone a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year from Humberside Police.



Coincidence or what?

This is a true story and happened to me as a young man.

When I was sixteen I went to sea as a cadet in the Merchant Navy and joined my first ship in January 1947, which was berthed at Toxteth Dock in Liverpool and we were due to sail for the West Indies on the twenty fifth of that month. It was a cold day and snowing quite heavily, however after two or three days we began to run into some warmer weather, for which I was quite happy. Everything was new



to me and I very soon found I had a lot to learn. The senior cadet was a Welsh lad and we had a cabin to ourselves on the main deck. The officers were white and the crew were West Indians mainly from Barbados. The Bosun was a Barbadian and was in charge of the two of us when we were working on deck, although at meal times we had to change in to uniform and eat in the saloon with the Captain and other officers.

After calling at Bridgetown in Barbados we discharged cargo at various islands around the West Indies and then across to Georgetown in what was called British Guyana to load sugar among other things. While we were there we were entertained at the local services club and met a number of the club hostesses for dancing and social evenings. I was particularly attracted to a very nice looking Guyanian girl and we spent quite a few evenings together, but before long we had to sail for the U.S.A. and then for home. I never went to Guyana again, so never saw the young lady again.

A number of years later I had left the merchant Service and was called up for National Service and was stationed at Rhyl in North Wales training to be a wireless operator. I had been home on leave at my home in Bridlington and was returning to camp when I met another soldier who was also returning to the same camp, we travelled together in the same compartment and got into conversation, as you do, or used to do in those days. It turns out he used to be a gunner during the war and was sent to various merchant ships as a D.E.M.S.Gunner. (Defensively equipped merchant ships). We discussed the ports we had visited and it turns out he had also been to Georgetown, and also been to the same services club, whereupon he pulled out his wallet and showed me a photograph of the same girl I had been friendly with. COINCIDENCE or WHAT?

Local Development Plan

As we start another new year we have been giving some thought to what matters of interest lie ahead, high on the agenda of local importance for some is the Local Development Plan. This document, produced under guidance from government, will identify the housing and other needs for the East Riding for the next fifteen years and identify the proposed housing numbers and identified sites for development throughout the East Riding. The draft local plan will be consulted on with members of the public and parish councillors between January 2013 and March 2013, at present it is suggested that there are enough planning consents in the pipeline and no further development is proposed for Nth Frodingham. Your Parish Council will have an important voice in responding to your views on the plans for N Frodingham.

Monday 6th May 2013. This means a weekly collection remains but blue bins will be collected more frequently and green less so. Residents in the area will receive an information pack the week before this takes place. This will contain a letter setting out the changes and a leaflet including the new collection calendar. Any residents who do not have the full range of recycling bins available (blue bin, brown bin and food waste caddy) will be able to request these and there will also be information in the leaflet showing the full range of materials that can be recycled in each bin. Waste and recycling officers will be on hand during the period following the introduction of the scheme to help with any concerns any residents may have. This is by no means a reduction in the service but an attempt to adjust timetables to meet what residents have told the council is what they would wish.
