

Surely that is a question of priorities, and since there is a shortage of prime farmland in this country and therefore we import a large percentage of our food, the East Riding should be a priority for flooding protection. What do you think??

History Group

The January meeting of the History Group was very well attended with over 25 members joining for another year. A subscription of £5 was considered to be very good value for five meetings (with speakers) and outing and an annual buffet, over the year.

Mr Christopher Wright, retired harbour master at Bridlington, gave an interesting talk about the history of the harbour. Although quietly spoken, and without the benefit of illustrations, Chris was able to keep the audience fascinated by details of the early construction of the harbour, its current use and the difficulties it faces with regard to financing. Whilst we were surprised to hear that the Bridlington fishermen landed the highest catch of shell fish in England and the highest catch of lobsters in Europe, there was also a lot of concern about his description of the overall decline in the amount of fish being caught off our coast. We were also concerned to hear about the silting of the harbour, courtesy of the vagaries of the tide in Bridlington Bay, and the potential impact of the proposed Marina on the number of pleasure craft using the harbour. Our Chairman, Polly Stead gave the vote of thanks after which members were able to enjoy light refreshments and a good gossip amongst friends.

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Distribution of the 'History of Frodingham' has continued steadily as residents became aware of its existence. Coincidence again

Once again there happened to me a remarkable coincidence. It was when I was a young man on a first trip event and with the same West Indian crew. The ship's "chippy" (carpenter) was from

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Message from Ward County Councillors: Jonathan Owen & Jane Evison

In an effort to help East Riding residents keep their energy bills down the council has launched a scheme called YORSwitch to help East Riding households make sure they are getting the best deal possible from their energy providers and if not then helping them switch to a better offer.

Last month, the Department for Energy and Climate Change awarded the council and its partners £428,750 to support the scheme, which will see the council and its partner organisations work to reduce gas and electric bills of interested households.

The scheme works by households in the East Riding registering their interest followed by an online auction between energy suppliers, with the winning supplier's best offer made available to residents.

For anyone not online, from Thursday, 21 February, information about how to get assistance is available by calling (01482) 393939 or in person at a customer service centre.

The closing date for registrations is Monday, 8 April, with the online auction, between energy suppliers, taking place on Tuesday, 9 April.

Following the auction an offer letter will be sent out to those who registered detailing the winning energy supplier's offer. Residents then have time to consider the offer and decide if it is right for them. If it is, then all the resident needs to do is respond to the offer letter and then the energy supplier will set up their new energy deal which lasts 12 months.

"The YORSwitch scheme makes switching energy suppliers really easy so that we can all start to save money on our gas and electric bills.

"It's easy to get involved either on line or in person and the more people that get involved the greater the buying power of YORSwitch."

NEW INDEPENDENT WATCHDOG FOR HEALTH AND SOCIAL CARE IN EAST YORKSHIRE

A new independent organisation which will give East Riding residents a voice on health and social care will be launched on 1 April 2013.

Healthwatch is being introduced by the Government at both national and local level, with Healthwatch East Riding of Yorkshire becoming the local consumer champion for patients, service users and the public.

The new organisation, commissioned by the council, will be established by 'Meeting New Horizons', a community interest company owned by Hull Council for Voluntary Services. It replaces services currently provided by the East Riding of Yorkshire Local Involvement Network (LINKS), which currently scrutinises health services on behalf of the public. Healthwatch will build on the excellent work of LINKS and discussions are taking place with their lead members to encourage and support ongoing involvement of their valuable contribution in the new organisation. The local Healthwatch will give residents and communities a stronger voice to influence and challenge how these services are provided within their local area.

It will also provide or signpost information to help them make choices about health and care services including where to go to make complaints about NHS and other services. 
Parish Council (PC)

The January and February meetings of the Parish Council have been relatively uneventful with only two planning applications for new dwellings to be dealt with. The main issues presented to and by the councillors were:

- a) The increase in dog fouling in the village. Dog owners are reminded that the fine for not clearing up after their pet is considerable, and that the new Dog Control guidelines state that all dogs should be kept on a lead when using public areas. The ERYC Dog Warden will be including North Frodingham on his schedule for visits.
- b) The church hedge is in a poor condition and Council is considering replacing it with a low picket fence that should considerably improve the appearance of, and visibility in, the area. Residents are asked to forward any comments to Councillors or the Clerk.

- c) Greg Knight MP has been contacted in an attempt to find out why the River Hull is not discharging into the Humber as well as it should. To date there has not been any satisfactory official response.
- d) Grange Road is continuing to deteriorate, the police and ERYC Highways department are attempting to persuade HGV owners not to use the road until White Bridge and the adjacent dike banks have been repaired. So far this is not being too successful and residents are asked to co-operate by letting Council know the licence plate number of offenders, so that they may be contacted.

Residents and group leaders are reminded that application to the Lissett Wind Farm fund is now open, details may be obtained from Karen Wood, ERYC, County Hall, Beverley, HU17 9BA.



Social Centre (SC)

The SC committee is able to report that finally the remaining money from the Groundwork Fund is due to be paid, and that purchase of benches and bins for the playground will soon be made. In addition members of the committee will be repairing the old shed at the side of the Village Hall, to create more storage space. Hopefully this will improve the area around the hall and remove yet another target from our young 'demolition experts'.

Bingo sessions have been organised for this year, and we hope that more residents will support this endeavour to raise funds for maintenance of this community asset. We lost two groups last year, the Drum Club and Youth Club whose regular use of the Village Hall contributed to keeping us financially viable.

The SC committee is hoping that someone will come forward to re-open the youth club; that the Drum Club may restart or that a new group will form! Whilst looking for support, may we also make a plea for some community-minded people to give a little of their time and join the Social Centre Committee? Next meeting 03.04.13, 7.30pm

Apart from road accidents which are part and parcel of this time of year, there have been no incidents in North Frodingham which are for public consumption for the next Village Voice.

Grange Road – following a request from members of the Parish Council to approach the EYRC re HGV's using this road and driving erratically/irresponsibly, a letter has been sent from the Traffic department at EYRC to the companies who were identified by persons in the village. They have been sent a letter asking them to liaise with their drivers and find alternative routes such as the B1249 or A165 via Beeford. However, if persons witness HGV's driving down Grange Road, or are forced to take evasive action on this road by ongoing HGV vehicular traffic, if possible please can they take the vehicle registration details and pass them to one of the PC members, for them to cascade onto myself. The vehicle details will be relayed back to the Council for the relevant action to be taken by them. If the use of Grange Road by HGV's continues (without their having justifiable reason to be down there such as delivering to the farms), the advisory signs "Unsuitable for HGV's" may be changed to mandatory ones by EYRC, banning them using this single road.

An incident has been reported to Humberside Police of persons having been approached by a company calling themselves Community Initiatives Associates based in Chester, who explained they were looking for sponsorship for community care. The persons agreed to make a donation to their organisation by company debit card, but a few days later received several demands for monies for other companies. This has not occurred in North Frodingham to our knowledge at this time, but please be aware if you have your own business and are contacted by this organisation, do not partake.

We are always looking to welcome persons to the Special Constabulary in Humberside. If this is of interest to you and you would like to know more about the role, watch the village newsletters and communications you receive; an article outlining our role is being prepared.

RDF are producing a new commission for BBC1 called Fight Back Britain.

They'd be very interested in hearing Neighbourhood and Home Watch members' stories.

The programme concentrates on the role that the public plays in helping the police fight crime. How social networks, mobile phone footage, photos, eyewitness accounts etc. can provide crucial evidence in identifying suspects and assisting in successful convictions. The highlight of each episode will be the inspiring stories of public involvement.

As well as these stories, the programme will provide advice on how members of the public can play their part in responsibly aiding the police, as well as insights into how they can keep their family and property safe. Where relevant, they also want to include on-going cases where an appeal for evidence would be useful. The series is a BBC1 prime-time commission, with a provisional transmission date from mid-July. They are looking for past and present stories where the public (and ideally their footage) has played a key role

Waste Bins Collection Plans

East Riding of Yorkshire Council is rolling out the fortnightly collection of the blue recycling bins and green landfill bins as result of the hugely successful trial. The brown bin for composting is already collected fortnightly.

The roll out of the new service will start in March and take up to the end of the year to complete across all areas of the East Riding. It will be done in phases and will include a major programme of support to assist residents to manage their waste by increasing further the amount they recycle in the blue bins.

The five phases of the roll out would start in the Hedon area followed by the Bridlington, Willerby, Market Weighton and Goole areas. This is based on the successful pattern used for the roll out of the brown bins in 2008, the introduction of the collection of food waste in 2011, and the distribution of the larger blue bins and collection of glass, further plastics and Tetra Pak, also in 2011.

The introduction of these new services led to a massive change in the amounts of waste being put in the blue and green bins, resulting in calls from residents for fortnightly collections for both bins. Currently the council collects the blue recycling bins every four weeks and the green landfill bins every week. The brown bins for composting have been emptied every fortnight since 2011.

In April 2012 the council responded to residents' requests by trialling a fortnightly collection of the blue and green bins for 6,000 properties across Brough, Cottingham, Hutton Cranswick, Keyingham, Swanland and Thorngumbald. It was immediately successful and the trial was extended to a wider range of areas covering a total 20,000 households across the East Riding.

There was an immediate increase in the amount of waste being put in the blue bins. The recycling rate in the trial area rose to 70 per cent compared with a monthly recycling rate in the non-trial area of 60 per cent.

At the same time, there was a drop in the amount of waste being put in the green bins for landfilling. The amount of waste

collected from the green bins in the trial area went down by 35 per cent.

Throughout the trial, the council proceeded cautiously, taking account of feedback from those residents taking part. The general response was that they fully supported the fortnightly bin collections as it enabled them to recycle even more. During the trial, residents were given direct support by the council's recycling team which went from door to door. There was also a telephone hotline number, a dedicated email address and an information pack. The recycling team also gave presentations at community group meetings.

The pattern of the roll out will be based on the council's depot areas:

- Holderness area including Hedon, Withernsea, and surrounding villages.
 The roll out in this area is scheduled to start in March.
- Bridlington area including Flamborough, Driffield, Nafferton, Hornsea and surrounding villages. The roll out in this area is scheduled to start in May.
- Willerby area including Beverley, Cottingham, Anlaby, Hessle, Brough, South Cave and surrounding villages. The roll out in this area is scheduled to start in July.
- Market Weighton area including Pocklington, Stamford Bridge and surrounding villages. To be confirmed but the roll out is provisionally scheduled for September.
- Goole area including Howden, Gilberdyke, Snaith and surrounding villages. To be confirmed but the roll out is provisionally scheduled for October.
