Ferry Extends The Season

Highland Ferries have announced they will start the Cromarty-Nigg service on May 1st this year - a month earlier than previous years. The shops and eateries in Cromarty have been urging for this for a long time. In a recent survey 50% stated that the ferry had a 'significant impact' on their business with a further 25% saying it was 'essential'. In recent years many folk from the north have started coming as foot passengers, seeing it as a quick and pleasurable way to spend a day in Cromarty. Black Isle residents should also be aware that a bus service operates from Nigg to Tain when the ferry is running and this makes for an interesting excursion without need for a car.

Dredging To Harbour Complete

The recent weeks of dredging in the harbour, although getting off to a much later than anticipated start, have finally been completed.

Approx. 3000 m3 of dredged material was removed from the harbour, rather more than was anticipated and which has been deposited in the designated dumping ground between the Sutor. The Harbour Trust is very grateful to the folk from the Aberdeen University Marine Research Team who assisted in monitoring marine mammal activity during the dredge to minimise disruption.

In addition to the dredging, the pontoon mooring chains have been replaced and the works will now allow much safer and deeper access to the harbour, even at lower tides. The Trust would like to thank everyone for their patience during the disruption caused by having such a large vessel in the harbour, and they look forward to everyone reaping the benefits of the work done. Existing berth-holders wishing to make use of the pontoon again this year should email their interest soonest to <u>info@cromartyharbour.org</u>. It is especially important to know early if you do not intend to take up your option to renew so that we can offer the space out to those on our waiting list.

Meanwhile, further work continues submitting funding bids to a variety of sources and working with consultant engineers Wallace Stone to prepare designs and contracts for the essential repairs works urgently need to the Smeaton Mole and Inner Admiralty Pier. Listed Building Consent has been obtained for all the proposed works subject to the fine detail of conditions being agreed with Highland Council and Historic Environment Scotland and Pat Hayes, secretary of the Harbour Trust said "I must say that the staff of both organisations have been incredibly helpful and supportive. We now have tenders in for the stone work to the Smeaton Mole (under the bridge) and as soon as we have the sign off from the Highland Council Conservation Officer for the detail of the work, we hope to award the contract and start the repairs by the end of March. We have funding in place for this thanks to grants from Marine Scotland, the SSE Sustainable Communities Fund and, subject to final confirmation, Highlands and Islands Enterprise."

Further works to the concrete piers and decks are dependent on other funding bids. The Trust expects these works, including those covered by the Fisheries Local Action Group (FLAG) and SSE Sustainable Communities Fund, to cost upwards of £645,000 of which funding of just over £293,000 has been secured to date. Following this, there will have to be wider stone work repairs to the North (East) and West Piers before tackling the decaying structure that is the Outer Admiralty Pier.

Ferry Slipways Update

As we reported last month the application submitted by Cromarty Community Development Trust made it through to round two of the Rural Tourism Infrastructure Fund (RTIF) awards programme.

This could see up to £400,000 being invested in Cromarty, split between two elements of the project. These are: the restoration of the slipways to secure the long-term future of the ferry; and the establishment of a modest site for the motorhomes, which have been using the Links without any management or charge. Two sites were being explored for this. The first was at the western end of the Links. This has proved problematic with the cinema development being approved.

The second was at Whitedykes which is owned by the Highland Council. That means control of the site could be passed to the CCDT under the new Community Empowerment Act. But considerable amounts of spoil were deposited there during the extension to the Primary School. Appeals to the Highland Council to remove the material seem unlikely to succeed.

Despite this, the CCDT's application for the second round of the RTIF awards (deadline January 31st) is based on this area of ground. An initial planning application has now been submitted to the Highland Council as planning authority.

The cost of removing the spoil may well prove too much for the council, however, and the CCDT may not be able to afford to undertake other preparatory remedial work. The directors have therefore identified another small patch of Highland Council-owned land very close to the Whitedykes site. It lies to the west and north of the industrial units on the western periphery of Cromarty on the Jemimaville road. We are now exploring with the council the feasibility of this becoming our fall-back option.

If appropriately handled this could be a very exciting development and would add another dimension to the extraordinary range of attractions in and around Cromarty. It would undoubtedly increase the number of visitors to the area, so there's lots to consider. It will be interesting to see at what point, and in what ways, the community has an opportunity to contribute to a plan. Watch this space!

Townlands Barn Latest

David Ross writes: 'One of the most important meetings in the short life of Cromarty Community Development Trust (CCDT) will be held in the coming weeks. On Sunday February 10th the CCDT will host an open meeting in the West Church Hall at 2.30pm. It is to be a 'brainstorming' session to discuss the options for the future use of Townlands Barn.
