



Development Trust Starts A Thrift Shop

Cromarty welcomed its latest addition to the number of shops on offer with a special project which will see all the income going straight back into the community.

Rosemarie Hogg writes:

'Holes were boarded-up and filled in, rough floor received a screed, and all rubbish dumped from the old dairy shop. After many hours painting when paint fell OFF the walls and large flakes dropped onto the heads of our poor unsuspecting volunteers, the walls were suitably disguised with old net curtains, LED lights were hung around to bring a bit of light into the room, the old dairy shop opened on Easter Saturday. No fanfares, no pipers, no ribbon-cutting, a low-key start was what we were aiming for; the thrift shop doors quietly opened and the visitors arrived. Luckily there were quite a few tourists around and we had a very busy day, raising £256 for our first effort.

Saturday 27th April was a quieter weekend, with life back to normal, but we still raised £190.20 for funds.

Our trading depends totally on the generous donations of the community, and we are extremely grateful for all the varied goods we have received. But please do not give us your rubbish – we can only 'sell on' good quality goods. Donations can be given to any of the people named on the notice on the thrift shop door.

This venture is raising funds for our community projects, the money stays in Cromarty. Please give us your

continuing support. Thank you all, from the shop volunteers.

The shop will be open every Saturday from 11am to 3.30pm up to the end of September.'

More Development Trust News - or not

For the second month running the Cromarty Community Development Trust (CCDT) has to report it expects to hear 'very shortly', whether the application it submitted to the Scottish Government's Rural Tourism Infrastructure Fund (RTIF) has been successful.

The indication was that the trust would be informed in April. The latest information, however, is that Roseanna Cunningham, the Cabinet Secretary for Environment, Climate Change and Land Reform in the Scottish Government has asked to see all the applications. It is therefore difficult to know, when a final decision will be taken.

If successful, it would see up to £400,000 being invested in the community. This would be spent upgrading the slipways to secure the long-term future of the ferry service, and establishing a site for motorhomes at Whitedykes.

Meanwhile CCDT and its project partners Nigg and Shandwick Community Council have applied for grants of £50,000 each from the Beatrice (windfarm) Partnership Fund. Local MSP Kate Forbes agreed to be the CCDT's referee for the application. Kate had asked to be briefed on the project, and came to Cromarty last month.

Some folk have apparently been asking how they can find out what the Development Trust gets up to – the simplest way to know more is to join. It's only £1 and you get full access to minutes of the meetings and regular updates.

Planning Consultations

Two important meetings coming up with proposals that will directly effect local residents:

A second public exhibition is being held prior to the submission of marine licence applications for the proposed **East Quay at Nigg Energy Park**. Staff will be on hand to present the proposals, provide an interim update on assessments and seek public feedback.

Marine works will include the creation of a quay wall which will retain locally-dredged infill material; and dredging of sea bed sediment to provide access to berthing in all tides.

The exhibition will be held: Tuesday 21st May 3.00pm – 7.00pm at West Church Hall

There will be a further opportunity to provide feedback and leave comments for consideration by the project team. There will be subsequent opportunity to comment formally on the applications when submitted.

Road Traffic Management in Cromarty proposals – a date will be confirmed shortly for a public meeting in early June. Look out for further details on posters around the town coming soon.
