Update from Cromarty Care Project

Hot off the press, the CCP has been invited to apply for the Queen's Award for Voluntary Groups, we may not succeed but are very glad of the local recognition.

Latest news from the Development Trust:

A new local distillery-based business is being seriously considered, with a view to bringing the development to Cromarty. Those behind the plan have already established a successful enterprise in the Highlands and want to start another. They've been in touch with the Community Development Trust (CCDT) to look at possible sites and community opportunities.

We're hoping to meet their representatives this week for exploratory discussions, to see if there is an appropriate location in Cromarty – one that would suit the developers and be of benefit to the community.

The idea of establishing a micro distillery in Townlands Barn had already been mooted, as this Newsletter reported some months ago. Peter McIlhenny, a partner in LDN Architects who have offices in Edinburgh and Forres, is working with the CCDT on options which would give our oldest building a new role in the 21st century. He has been involved in planning several distillery projects, and thought one could work in the barn.

This most recent approach is quite separate and comes from a different source.

The CCDT had already agreed proposals for the barn, which would embrace mixed rental and workshops. They would not be changed or varied without full public community consultation.

Green Moves

The CCDT and the Cromarty and District Community Council are exploring the possibility of establishing a Rural Transport Hub in the town. This would offer environmentally friendly, coordinated services and would include: the purchase of two electric vehicles (EV) for community car-sharing; the Cromarty- Nigg ferry; electrical charging points for EVs - cars and buses; bike hire and electric bike hire. Cromarty is geographically compact and flat so the Hub could be spread between nearby sites or on one site.

It is hoped that the Scottish Government's Rural Tourism Infrastructure Fund (RTIF) could provide much of the necessary financial support. Initial approaches have already been made to VisitScotland by Nigel Shapcott. If there is anyone out there who is interested in this proposal please contact <u>nigel.shapcott@gmail.com</u>

Local and Visitor Attractions

The RTIF also offers the prospect of funding to allow a much-needed upgrading of the South Sutor to the Viewpoint highly popular local walking route. The number of visitors using it has increased in recent years. Meanwhile during the recent lockdown, many more local residents than normal were using it for their permitted daily exercise.

There has been resulting damage to the path and steps over the years, which will have to be repaired.

The CCDT gained a lot of experience applying for RTIF support over the past year and a half - not always positive. But it would all be useful in preparing future applications.

It is thought that a wider group of volunteers of those interested in pursuing the transport hub and/or the upgrading of the 100 steps should be formed.

Slipways

There were times when we thought we were never going to be able to say this, but work is due to start any day now on the replacement of the Nigg and Cromarty slipways.

For much of the last year, it has seemed that for every step the CCDT took forward on this project, it was forced to take two backwards. But the Beauly-based builders Simpson are now poised to start breaking up the old structures, starting on the Nigg side. The 25-year lease of the slipways from the Cromarty Estate, is just about to be signed as everything has now been agreed. VisitScotland has confirmed that the first tranche of the £300,000 RTIF award will be released once the lease is signed, and Simpsons can start.

The money will not come to the CCDT directly. It will be transferred to the Highland Council, who will then pay the bills as the work progresses.

Despite all the setbacks, Cromarty will be amongst the first communities amongst last year's winners, to see work actually start on its RTIF project.

We hope to be able to deliver an equally positive report on the Whitedykes campsite in the not too distant future.

Cinema

We are consulting with our volunteers to determine the best way to move forward given the current guidelines on cinema re-opening. We hope to make an announcement about our re-start plans in the next few weeks. The car parking for the office hub and cinema has just been completed but will take a few weeks to bed in.

The Cromarty Peace Group is going to be holding a Hiroshima Day 75th Anniversary Commemoration event at Cromarty Harbour on Thursday 6th August at 4pm. There will be bagpipe music, appropriate readings and an Act of Remembrance. We will, of course, be observing social distancing!

We Are Now Open!

Cromarty Courthouse Museum will be open on Saturdays and Sundays during August from 12am until 4pm. We look forward to welcoming our visitors once again. Admission is free.

Since Easter, we've given our attention to making improvements to the exterior of our building, with repairs, repainting and the usual maintenance work in the garden. More recently, we have been focusing inside - on putting in place our plans to ensure the safety of our staff and visitors when we reopen.

We have had to make some changes within the museum in order to comply with Covid-19 standards but hope that visitors will still be able to enjoy seeing our historic Courthouse.

Staff and volunteers will be on hand to advise you on your route through the Courthouse and they will ask all visitors to use the hand sanitiser provided, wear a suitable face covering and maintain safe physical distancing.

In addition to our usual displays, we have a temporary exhibition of the 2007 "Under the Surface" images from the SEA CROMATY SPARKLE celebration that formed part of Scotland's Year of Highland Culture. Hard to believe that was 13 years ago!
