Local Vacancies Noticeboard

At the latest C&DCC meeting, Youth Members, Tilly and Gregor, raised the subject of young folk trying to find out about seasonal and part-time work vacancies not being publicised in Cromarty.

It seems that most vacancies are advertised 'by word of mouth', and this can be very frustrating. In addition, younger people tend to look for news online rather than on a physical noticeboard.

Members agreed that Paige would write to all employers in Cromarty (to start with) and ask them to supply news of any vacancies (however short term) to the C&DCC, and this would immediately appear on a new Local Vacancies Board, on the Cromarty Live website, with prompts on both the <u>C&DCC</u> and <u>Cromarty Youth</u> <u>Cafe</u> Facebook pages. This facility will be there for all age groups and different sections of the community. Readers should note that the <u>Cromarty Live website</u> is now trying to be both inclusive and up to date with lots of local Cromarty and Black Isle news, with many interesting and informative documents to view and read. This includes all C&DCC approved minutes, agendas and reports, plus the latest Cromarty Youth Cafe news.

Future of the East Church Hall

Following the pre-school classes being moved to the Cromarty Primary School premises, the community has been left with a valuable community asset unused but definitely not unloved.

The C&DCC has received a lot of local interest, who are very keen to see the East Church Hall used as a functioning, useful and sustainable community facility. Local folk have many fond memories of this building in its many guises over the years, and have asked that the C&DCC coordinates the local interest and, in the first place, liaises with the Highland Council, who are the 'custodians' of this Cromarty Common Good Asset.

At our latest meeting, it was agreed that the C&DCC will make this approach and then bring together all the community ideas in an attempt to create a sustainable community-based future for the East Church Hall.

"Eliza's Path" Now Open

Martin Gostwick writes:

Cromarty-based charity The Friends of Hugh Miller is pleased (and a little proud!) to announce we are the provider of a smart new amenity for the local community and visitors alike, the ornamental railing and remade path at the St Regulus Burial Ground, also popularly known as the Pirates' Graveyard.

The railing is in galvanised steel with a black paint finish, and bearing on the supports for its 16-metre length an artistic dog rose motif, as a romantic signifier of both Hugh Miller and his hero Robert Burns' love for the wildflower.

We have (unofficially) named the amenity as "Eliza's Path" because it leads to the grave of Hugh and Lydia Miller's firstborn daughter Eliza who died of a fever aged only 17 months. The project was inspired by two elderly members who were deeply moved when they learnt of this family tragedy at the Hugh Miller Museum, and paid their respects on frequent visits when they were still physically able to make it up the steep slope to the headstone Hugh himself carved as his last work as a stonemason.

The ground also has, of course, many other historic associations, especially for Clan Urquhart, whose chiefs' graves lie a vault beneath the Chapel ruins, but also many Cromarty seafarers and other worthies (not all pirates!) whose stories Miller told in his great work of folklore, *Scenes and Legends of the North of Scotland*.

The project, which cost £16,000, has been primarily funded by the charity itself, and two generous donations, one from The Highland Council, and the second from the House of Fraser Foundation, the latter because it provided improved access for the elderly and infirm. It also received some very generous donations from some 20 individuals. It has the approval of the Cromarty Estate on whose land it is situated.

It was carried out to original drawings by LDN architects, of Forres, Morayshire, as considerably amended and

constructed by Sam Barlow, bespoke blacksmith of Mooreworks, Lairg, Sutherland, with new gravel groundwork laid by Martin Gill of Avoch.

The charity's secretary said: "We hope we have improved the visibility, appearance and usability of this facility, which previously could be quite slippery and hard to climb, and many more people will take advantage to enjoy this beautiful tranquil place."

At last! The time has come..."the walrus said..." ? (No, no that is something else entirely) - Hugh Miller's Museum is reopening to visitors. Hurrah! It is a small step - we are opening just Saturdays and Sundays in July and August from 1-5pm (last entry 4.30pm).

We are very excited by the prospect of welcoming visitors back to the museum after being closed for some many months. In order to keep our visitors, staff and volunteers safe from covid, visitors will notice a number of changes to our operation. Apart from the ubiquitous sanitising stations spread throughout the museum and the wearing of masks, the biggest change is that we will have booked slots for visits.

The museum buildings are so small that it is impossible to social distance. Due to this, only 2 groups are allowed in each of the museum buildings at any one time; with a maximum number of 8 people in each building.

People wishing to visit may be able to do so straightaway if the museum has the capacity, or advised to book a slot at the reception desk and return at the specified time. All bookings must leave a contact (telephone number or email) to allow for covid tracing. (Note that these plans are subject to change - subject to the course of the pandemic). If you are lucky, Duncan Cook (see image) will be in costume to welcome you to the cottage.
