Here's a round-up of what has been happening — and what is to come — in our little town.




# Firstly, a Big Thank You

# **Cromarty Community Development Trust**

Sheila Currie from the Cromarty Community Development Trust writes:

## **Inner Moray Development Plan**

Several directors attended the community meeting with the Highland Council Planner this week to hear about and comment on the Inner Moray Firth 'main issues' report. This is the 'listening phase' before the draft Development Plan comes out later this year, so it is vital that communities get their wants – and our 'not-wants' – into the ears of the planners.

The Development Trust will be making a submission to the Council, so let us know what you want us to say. Endorsement of the Sandilands Field land for housing would be useful, as well as comments about any other potential housing sites that are identified in the Report. It is useful to remind the Council that we DO need housing in Cromarty, just the right types in the right places.

It was interesting to hear the Planner say they would be open to extending the camper van site to the west (ie away from existing houses) and that the landowner wasn't opposed. Highland Council reduced the number of camper van pitches from 14 to 10 in their planning permission, so this is potentially good news, though we'd need to find more funding for that.

We believe there is a demand for new workshop spaces in Cromarty, so that folk can set up local businesses. Please let us know and let Highland Council know.

We also know of interest in community food growing in Cromarty (as well as the allotments which are run by individuals) and please let us and the Council know of this interest and where it could be.

## Slipways

We hear the ferry service is hoping to start in May, which is excellent news. We'll be getting some safety markings and signage done in time.

We were appalled though to hear that Highland Council are thinking about cutting their subsidy to our ferry service; and they need to be told that this is madness, especially after so much public money has been spent on upgrading the slipways.

### Barn

The Trust is meeting the Sutor Gin people this Friday (26 February) to discuss their proposals for working with the community on a gin project at the Barn.

This is not our only option for the Barn, so we welcome other ideas and proposals. Of course any proposals – by a business or from the community – will be fully consulted on with the community before anything is confirmed.

## Housing

Still no reply from Albyn Housing re our offer to take back the land for housing and we hope to keep at them to commit to building or releasing the land.

### **Thank you Dave!**

And this month we say farewell and many, many thanks to Dave Ross as he and Mary move to Inverness. Dave has been an utter stalwart, with his knowledge of land politics, excellent relationship with our lawyer and his journalist's eye for getting to the point and finding things out.

We hope he'll continue to stay involved and we all know he's made a huge difference to the Trust and to Cromarty.

## **Cromarty Harbour**

Pat Haynes from the Cromarty Harbour Update writes:

### **Repairs and Restoration**

The Harbour Trust plans to start the next phase of harbour repairs in early March. Work is planned to re-lay the most uneven areas of the granite sett surfacing on the West pier and deal with undertake grouting where necessary to address some of the cavities in the structure. This work is funded by a Historic Environments Coast and Waters Heritage grant and the FCC Communities Foundation with additional support from the Cromarty Trust and Friends of Cromarty Harbour.

The Trust has also recently been successful in gaining an additional grant of £30,000 from Marine Scotland's fund to support ports and harbours infrastructure projects where their income has been adversely impacted by the Covid pandemic. This has all been rather last minute and the grant needs to be spent by the end of March but the additional funding will allow the Trust to repair most - if not all - of the sandstone surfacing of the mole. Lochshell Engineering has been appointed as contractors for the

project. The restrictions caused by the pandemic have also meant that the trainees from UHI Construction and Built Environment course, whom we had expected could participate in this project will no longer be available, as the start of their training has been deferred until September, we do however hope that they can become involved in future projects.

We are hopeful that activities around the harbour will be able to return to some sort of normality this coming season but revenue from harbour activities barely covers routine maintenance even without the limitations imposed by the pandemic. The Trust, through the volunteer working group is looking to the future and working to source funding for further repairs to the piers and the mole and also to undertake a wave attenuation project to protect the harbour basin from strong tides and storm surges. In the next few weeks, we plan to install three additional finger pontoons and a new ladder on the wall of the west pier.

Our small maintenance team of volunteers has been busy over the winter carrying out routine repairs to make the harbour ready for the summer and is always looking for more volunteers to help, whether that be as a member of the maintenance team or on an ad hoc basis if you have some spare time and the relevant skills or just plain enthusiasm for helping to preserve and develop our beautiful harbour.

### **Health and Safety**

Recently a swimmer cut herself in some old wiring close to the outer wall on the west pier. No serious harm was done and a full recovery is expected. However, the incident serves as a reminder that with some 250 years of active history our working harbour can still present hazards. With wild swimming taking place outside of the harbour, I would ask that all swimmers be careful when they are close to harbour walls as they can trap all manner of debris from the tides. The area is regularly checked but our volunteers can't be on patrol 24/7. In the highly unlikely event of something occurring, please report it to our harbourmaster or email <u>info@cromartyharbour.org</u>. Be safe and enjoy.

## Private Use of CCTV Cameras in Cromarty

The Community Council has had a number of requests for guidance with regard to the private use of CCTV cameras in Cromarty. It is a sensitive issue that covers both the personal security and privacy rights of many residents. It is also a difficult legal subject.

The Scottish Government guidance on regulations for the use of CCTV gives help, for Black Isle residents who are unsure of these regulations, and how they apply to them. This can be found

We also include the link to a case history, which may be of interest, as it gives an insight into what can happen if CCTV regulations are not followed. Users of CCTV have a duty of care to their neighbours and other residents when using any surveillance technology, which may also include 'smart' doorbells. But these are not the only information sources available, which is what makes it such a difficult subject, so we also suggest people, concerned with the use of CCTV, do their own research – Google CCTV regulation Scotland.

Whatever you read or think, we suggest that all residents in Cromarty read, and follow, the Scottish Government guidance, but above all, attempt to be a good neighbour, especially in these times when we all desperately need the support of each other.
