Strong Strong and Stick Together: #TeamCalum

Cromarty lass, Katie Mackay, completed her 30th Munro on Saturday the 23rd of October. This was the final hill to climb as part of her challenge to raise awareness of suicide by climbing mountains of over 3,000ft to mark what would have been her brother, Calum's, 30th birthday this year. She has raised a whopping £8000, surpassing her target of £3000, which will be donated to charities supporting mental health and families affected by suicide, including James Support Group (more below).



Katie certainly embraced a range of weathers during her challenge, including blazing hot sunshine, gusty westerly gales, and wintry icy conditions, but she did it all with a smile, accompanied by her wee dog Kai, a wonderful group of friends and family, and (of course) some tasty treats for the summits! She carried a red bow tie with her all the way, a symbol that has since become synonymous with Calum. James Support Group

Covid restrictions continue to frustrate us all, so we are being extra careful still with our arrangements for the face to face meetings. **Today** (Sunday 31st) is the last Sunday this month, which is always the day we hold our meeting at The Mercure in Inverness. Running from 11am for 2 hours, this is a relaxed and friendly group with sadly one thing in common. We have all been affected by suicide, some have lost a son or daughter, some a partner, some a close friend, in fact, many different relationships. The thing is, we all get something from the meetings, Wendy and I get comfort from helping others being able to speak freely about their loved ones and the memories, both funny and sad. Being able to articulate openly knowing that the people listening completely understand is the best way to grieve, and we all need to grieve.

Those of you who are on Facebook will have seen young Sophie complete a 5k in Bught Park as part of the Loch Ness challenges, and she fundraised for us a whopping £365. Sophie is second on the left in the picture below.



You may have also seen the friends and family of Frazer More having completed a 10 mile walk (picture below) from Tain back to Portmahomack which I was fortunate to attend, supplying hot drinks etc half way. Hollie's idea raised a fantastic £10040 for James Support Group - a truly astounding amount in the memory of Frazer who would have been 30 last week. Wendy and I are truly grateful for their efforts, and to all who kindly donated, without these kind acts, we would struggle to expand our bereavement support services as planned.



We hope to begin meetings during November in Invergordon, Thurso, Nairn and Aviemore. Dingwall is on hold for now, but Inverness will continue as restrictions allow.

Our campaign "It's OK not to be OK" started on 1st October and runs until 31st March which is the peak period for suicide in The Highlands - yes that's six months/ half a year! We release a video each day of a different person saying the phrase "It's OK not to be OK" -This is shared across different Facebook groups to keep the message about poor mental health & the very real threat of suicide high in the public domain. We need over 180 of you to volunteer your 4-second clip to keep this going so please, send your clip to <u>support@jamessupportgroup.com</u>, or text our 24/7 helpline 07563 572471, or FB message Patrick Mullery.

This is the time to be aware of yourself, and those around you - if you need to talk please contact us and do not suffer alone. After all: it really is OK not to be OK.

Middleton Trust News

Gillian McNaught writes:

Four local organisations providing a range of activities for younger members of Cromarty & District, supported with

a Middleton Trust (MT) Award, have given details to Trustees of just how the funding has helped improve the wellbeing of those involved, particularly during this post Covid recovery period.

Cromarty Tennis & Sports Club once again ran wellattended summer coaching sessions followed by *the* rival tournament to Wimbledon - Crombledon - in the Dr Forth 'Centre Court' in the Victoria Park, with a posttournament buffet to match any cream tea! This was followed by further coaching sessions in October, with remaining MT funding going towards much needed new tennis rackets, balls and coaching equipment specifically young players.

A two year Schools Programme with Cromarty Primary School involving the children in all aspects of film is being delivered by **Cromarty & Resolis Film Society.** Involving a trainer from the outset to assist with the challenges of online learning sessions due to Covid, was valuable in helping to engage the children and make online learning fun. With teaching from professional filmmakers, the children were able to make their own stop motion animations and learn new skills. One teacher noted these experiences, with "marked improvement in their literacy with their detail in writing, analysing skills and their IT skills" and attributed all this to the support from the C&RFS.

Cromarty Youth Café, now in its 8th year, received an award to support the post of Assistant Youth Worker and associated running costs. The Cromarty Youth Café Spectacular Summer Programme 2021 Report details the huge amount of fun, delicious food, range of activities and new experiences provided for young people. All of the 57 different activities organised were full to capacity, learning hours topped 1247 and 550 young people took part in the programme, including youth volunteers and leaders!

To help younger members of the **Cromarty Community Rowing Club** operate independently and save future potential backache, a trolley and 'capstan' style winch to recover boats from the water was purchased with funding support from the Middleton Trust. The Middleton Trust Trustees are delighted to see the positive and practical ways young people have benefited from the Awards. They meet next week to look at the 2021 funding applications and their decisions will be announced in due course.



This coming month brings a huge amount of activity at the cinema. We are screening our normal broad range of films including family-friendly options such as 'Boss Baby2' and 'Conni and the Cat', and the fabulous new Wes Anderson movie 'The French Dispatch' but we are also linking up with Inverness Film Festival, hosting a special Japan Season and working with Cromarty Primary School. Inverness Film Festival features a vast array of films and runs from 5th-11th November. We will be showing six movies in Cromarty as part of the Festival with full details here: <u>https://eden-court.co.uk/inverness-film-festival-</u> 2021

The Japan Season is part of a UK wide programme that Cromarty Cinema is participating in and launches on 11th November. The brochure can be found here: <u>Cromarty</u> <u>Cinema - Japan Season</u>. Our unique programme features 5 weeks of films and activities including workshops, talks and Q+As with directors and artist/filmmakers. Cromarty Cinema is delighted to be part of Japan 2021: 100 Years of Japanese Cinema, a UK-wide season supported by the National Lottery and BFI Audience Film Network. At the season's finale, we will be screening three short films including one by Natsumi Sakamoto. Our Schools Partnership, which is supported by the Middleton Trust, continues to develop with a strong emphasis on literacy and story-telling through film. Over the coming weeks, award-winning artist Eleanor Stewart will be working closely with cinema volunteers and P6-7 school pupils to celebrate the work of pioneering filmmaker, Lotte Reiniger (1899-1981). During our weekly programme, pupils will learn about silhouette techniques and make their own work inspired by Lotte. The British Film Institute stated that 'No one else has taken a specific animation technique and made it so utterly her own.'

OFGEM upheld our complaint against SSE and instructed them to issue a letter of apology (received) and a credit of £100 (not yet received). We still have to deal with SSE to organise the reconnection of electricity but the procedure is now clearer and we have started the process. In the light of past experience, we are not anticipating a speedy resolution!

Campervan Site

At last, the final plans for the campsite have been approved following some minor amendments. This means we will, at last, be able to move forward with our plans. Although the site will be slightly smaller than we had hoped at the start, we will still be able to create employment and hopefully generate much-needed income for the town, as well as taking vans off the streets.

We will be going back to contractors and hope to award the project in the near future.

Funding

We applied for funding for a Development Officer to a new pot of cash, but were unfortunately unsuccessful (about 8 out of 200 applications were successful!), but there is another round soon and we are optimistic we shall beat the Faroes and progress into the Quarter Finals!

Cromarty Arts Trust


