

They both served in the Cromarty Artillery Volunteers, on Cromarty Burgh Council and as Elders of the Kirk. They were both keen sportsmen. The speaker will talk about their achievements.

Ross Couper retired to Cromarty after 12 years in heavy industry, a steel foundry and a lead smelter on Tyneside. For 20 years he was a lecturer in Mechanical Engineering at Northumbria University, then spent 3 years at Seoul Polytechnic in South Korea.

Community Campsite

Over the weekend of 10th & 11th of November, we maxed out for the month with 5 bookings on the Friday night and 2 bookings on the Saturday night (7 in total). Cold temperatures but the prospect of winter sun likely helped. Beyond our income generated through these visitors, we know that certain bookings brought wider benefits or spends around the town.

Two of the campervan bookings on the Friday night were made by friends meeting up in Cromarty for a 'night out' one from London and Strathpeffer. Not only did this support the campsite (bringing in a joint income of £70) but also helped local business through their stay and spend.: £45 in Cromarty Cinema; £100 in Fishertown Inn (est); £20 in Slaughterhouse Coffee (est); and £50 in Sutor Creek (est).

'It is the sum of the parts, that was the attraction, and really something we could promote' said one.

We had another two night booking that week, from a couple from Midlothian taking their campervan for 'one last fling of the year' – and we know that Fishertown Inn benefited with \pounds 80-100 of a spend.

A week later the first of our known 'regular' customers - a couple from Badachro - returned to us. They had first happened upon the site in September and they promised us a return visit (and soon). And they have told us to expect them again; they have advised us this is going to be a regular booking plus they are planning to bring other family members over too.

What's not to like?!! It seems for many of our visitors the attraction of all of Cromarty is the whole package and the winning formula for the campsite.

And we have again confirmed another two day booking for the first weekend in December for the same mix. These visitors are coming through from Inverness for the weekend. [yes, we know we're a town not a village, but we can let them off surely!]

Promoting our services and building our IT provision through Plexus

If you haven't dropped into the campsite's booking system yet, you might want a look into our set up. Checkout what we show that's on offer to visitors and how the whole town is represented. See <u>cromartycamping.com</u>

Our graphics, website and booking system were a team effort from Colin, Jamie and Gill in Plexus; working alongside the Development Trust. This work was fully funded by Development Trusts Association of Scotland (DTAS) - to act as a catalyst for the operational side of the campsite.

With booking now open for 2024, we can confirm we have recently taken bookings for April, June and September next year. This is just the news we need.

Moving forward, we have now commissioned the development of the CCDT's own website. Our own IT needs a radical overhaul, to better engage with and inform our members and the community, plus to share information to the local community and related groups, grants team, funders, local authority and other development trusts etc.

This process is now commencing.

The Royal Hotel - A visit from Highlands and Islands Enterprise (HIE) and applications to the Scottish Land Fund (SLF)

A couple of weeks ago, Gabbi Heaton-Armstrong, HIE (as Inner Moray Firth Development Manager) and Paul Harrington, HIE (as Scottish Land Fund Area Manager), met CCDT in Cromarty, visiting the Campsite (as early investors in the project) and The Royal to learn of the communities plans and support us in the process.

At the campsite we were exploring ways of capitalising on what we have and diversifying what we do in recognising that it may pay CCDT to put in place some provision for cycle tourism going forward. HIE confirmed there are grants available for this, and we have discussed how we might tap into these.

With regards to The Royal Hotel, we have gone through all the preliminary checks with the Scottish Land Fund. This is jointly through the 'Funding Office' in Glasgow; and now locally through HIE / SLF recent visit making sure that to date we are compliant in our operations as a Trust and are following all the correct procedures.

We are now working on the Stage 1 Application for feasibility which is seen in SLF terms as 'being given the opportunity to explore the possibility of community ownership'. This will not only involve continued community and business engagement - plus tapping into the trusts and the communities skill base and setting up small working groups - but also fund and outsource discreet packages of work too (business planning and consultancy, structural and building surveys, building valuations etc).

Funding for Stage 1 is capped at £30K (but this is typically be associated with an estate purchase, with complexity). With quotes in place - which we are now obtaining - it is likely we will be seeking a sum in the region of £8-12K. HIE have confirmed they will provide ongoing support at every level as our 'critical friend' and DTAS plus their Community Shares team are in place too.

Stage 1 of SLF funds the feasibility which explores and determines the intrinsic value (or otherwise) of the asset to the community of Cromarty - as it stands and going forward with a business plan - and whether it is in the CCDT's / the Community's interest to take it into our own hands.

And part of this feasibility study will include coming back to the community – possibly with another public meeting in January.

East Church Hall

A working group of members and Trust directors have formed to take forward ideas about how best to use the East Church Hall for community benefit that pays its way. Watch this space and the various community facebook groups for progress.

Bird & Bat Boxes

We've had a generous offer of wood to make bird and bat boxes for the Campsite. Please get in touch if you are interested in doing this.
