Its Time to Shape Our Own Future

The Black Isle Local Place Plan is your opportunity to help create a Black Isle that we are proud to call home. A Black Isle fit for future generations.

The aim of the plan is to provide a Black Isle wide vision for the future. It will build on existing consultations and surveys and over the next few weeks we will be consulting with communities across the Black Isle to find out what your priorities for the Black Isle might be. There will be eight drop-in events held in Community Council areas across the Black Isle, where we'll be seeking your views. What do you want Cromarty and the other communities across the Black Isle to be like in the future? What are the changes you would like to see? What kind of voice do we want to have, sitting in the middle of the Greenport bubble?

Your answers will give you and your Community Councils real influence over the future of your community, because they will be the basis of the Black Isle Local Place Plan - a new feature of Scottish planning legislation that influences Council planning policy and public services. To achieve that, the first stage is for you to tell us what really matters to your communities. Please drop in at one of the March events for a chat and a cuppa.

Then, over the next few months, we'll organise more events with residents, businesses, Community Councils, Highland Council councillors and staff, and other groups and organisations to work out how to tackle what matters to you in the future. The work is being funded by the Council, so we hope it will have a real impact.

Our logo Opportunity Black Isle is in response to the awarding of Greenport status to Opportunity Cromarty Firth. We are not in any way affiliated to the Greenport. We want to highlight the fact that we're responsible for creating our own opportunities. The Local Place Plan gives us, the local community, a great opportunity to determine what life on the Black Isle will look like in the coming years. We look forward to working together.

The Community Engagement Events kick off in **Cromarty** on **Monday 13th March**, 3.30pm - 7.30pm at the West Church Hall. Come along, enjoy a cup of tea and some cake and share your views with us. We'd like to hear from as many different folk as possible. It's really important we gather a wide range of views from all sectors of the community.

Cromarty History Society

Where Angels Fear To Tread - Tues 21st March, West Church Hall

A little bit of background...

The writing of The Bookseller of Inverness was born of a desire to come closer to home in Shona's writing, and to delve more deeply into her own history and culture. She will consider some of the challenges of writing a fictional adventure set in the Jacobite period, and discuss (with photographs) how she went about the research for the book, much of which was written in periods of lockdown. She will then speak briefly about a longprojected novel set in 1830s Cromarty, set aside twice, which she is now working on in earnest.

Shona MacLean was born in Inverness and brought up in a series of small Highland Hotels in Lochaber, Easter Ross and the Black Isle. After Dingwall Academy, she attended Aberdeen University and has a PhD in C17th Scottish History. Married with 4 now grown up children, she is the author of two series of C17th-set historical crime novels, as well as the recent standalone, The Bookseller of Inverness. She has twice won the Crime Writers' Association dagger for best Historical Crime novel of the year. Cromarty Courthouse



Liz Broumley writes:

Our museum is gearing up to opening for the 2023 season on Easter Sunday, 9 April.

As we prepare to celebrate the 250th anniversary of the completion of the construction of Cromarty's Courthouse building in 1773, it is important to let you all know that the Courthouse and the museum are facing significant financial challenges The hostile economic environment that's affecting us all has reduced the museum's income and grant funding while leaving us responsible for the heating needed to preserve the museum collections. We are trying to turn this into an opportunity to find alternative funding including a fundraising campaign. . In the coming weeks we will be launching a series of fundraising events, as well as opening the Courthouse and garden to community functions. We are planning an open evening in the Courthouse for local people to come behind the scenes in the museum and explore some of its gems.

The Courthouse formed part of George Ross's development of the town in the late 18th century, which also included building Cromarty House, the harbour, the brewery and the Gaelic chapel, as well as a hemp factory, a nail and spade factory and housing. As the Laird of Cromarty, he was keen to bring new prosperity and status to 'his' town. Today, it's our town and your Courthouse remains a key building and visitor attraction. We would like it to return to greater community use, it's not just a place for visitors!

In the 250 year period since, the Courthouse has served many purposes for the community. Apart from housing the Sheriff Court and a county prison, it latterly housed the police cells, the Naval Shore patrol cells during WW1, the Burgh Magistrates Court and was the venue for town council meetings. From 1950s, it was neglected and in a deteriorating condition before its restoration as a significant heritage site and museum.

If you have an idea to raise funds, please let us know. Please support as many events as you can. Even better, come and work with us as a volunteer and share friendship and skills. The Trustees will continue to apply for grant funding and work closely with our sponsors. We want to take the opportunity created by economic problems to develop the Courthouse as a vibrant, sustainable local resource, but this can only be done with your support.



Community Development Trust

From Sheila Currie:

Campervan site

I hope folk have had a chance to see how well Aardvark are getting on with the site works for the community's new Camper Van site, with the levelling and drainage works getting done. Also a brand new section of pavement along the front of the houses.

There is a great sense of community support now emerging behind the construction of the campsite, and specific thanks go to the immediate neighbours who have been kind, tolerant and encouraging during the construction phase – one neighbour commented that now it was quite exciting to see the project underway with the investment, change and the prospect of a new community facility 'happening' at their end of the town; as a result they were feeling more connected.

New pavement is now constructed to connect up the campsite. This gives safe pedestrian access to the 3 neighbouring houses and any businesses or facilities in the industrial estate. This was part of the community gain, in the delivery of the wider campsite facility.

Similar works will be done at the entrance - integrated with landscape features and planting - as a mixture of native trees and shrubs, biodiversity and 'drifts' of coastal plants and grasses for colour and interest.

Aardvark Contracting Ltd kindly agreed to filling up the potholes after the construction of the pavement. This was not in their contract or their responsibility, but they are onside and share the vision to deliver the best that they can for the community.

Most of the building works will be finished by/in April, and we hope to be open as soon as possible after then.

So far we've just been calling it 'the campsite' or 'campervan site', but does anyone have any better ideas for a snappy title that might bring in the punters? And please do tell any of the campervan people parking in Cromarty that you speak to, that we'll have a new Site opening this spring, with electric hookups, sewage and other waste disposal, plus toilets and shower.

East Church Hall

Gillian Newman, who was heavily involved in the East Church Hall millennium renovations, has been on a hunt for the record drawings and photographs of the construction. These drawings and documents are enormously helpful in understanding the construction details and condition of the building as it stands and in considering future plans.

Beyond this Gillian has kindly volunteered some of her time to work with us to better understand more on the building, its past life, and clarify unknowns; all in conjunction with a wider process of community engagement going forward. We are going to take up her offer, and will also digitise and archive these building records for access to all.

Highland Council and The Common Good Fund (who own the building) have now approved us running a Community Doors-Open Day. We have reached a point in the year of longer daylight hours and warmer temperatures, which we needed as there is no heating at all in the building at present. We'll set a date soon, and give everyone plenty notice and details so all can come along.

Trust AGM
