A New Storage Shed for the Community Larder



On Friday 23rd February, Chris and Paul from Fettes Sawmills rolled into town and constructed a new shed for us (seen here with Denise McIntosh, Chair of Cromarty Care Project).

Why do we need a new shed? Up to now our storage has been in three separate locations, relying on the goodwill of St Regulus Church and one of our Trustees, together with a small 'bunker' (showing signs of age, visible in the image on the left) beside the Larder itself. Now, our wonderful volunteers can focus on stocking the larder without extra running around, and we have all our stock in one place. A definite improvement!

The new shed has been made possible thanks to a grant from North Highland Initiative Community Infrastructure Support Programme. We are grateful to Fettes Sawmills who donated delivery and installation charges. Thanks also to Cromarty Development Trust for allowing us to erect the shed at Townlands Barn.

Citizens Advice is Coming to Cromarty!

Christine Macdonald, from Ross & Cromarty Citizens Advice Bureau, will be offering face-to-face appointments in the Victoria Hall on the third Tuesday of every month, starting on Tuesday 16th April. CAB can give advice on a whole range of issues including benefits, debt and money, energy, work issues, relationships and housing, and we can help you to fill out benefit forms. Below is the first of a regular information slot from CAB:

CAB Focus on . . . Attendance Allowance

Attendance Allowance is a benefit for people over State Pension age who need help with personal care or supervision because of an illness or disability.

There are two different weekly rates, and the amount you get depends on how much help you need. Any money you do receive doesn't need to be spent on your care. The money you receive isn't taxable or means-tested – so your savings or income won't affect your claim. Claiming also won't affect any other benefits you receive.

You can claim Attendance Allowance if you meet all the following criteria:

• You're over State Pension age (if you haven't reached it, you may be eligible for Adult Disability Payment instead).

• You have any type of disability or physical or mental illness, including sight or hearing impairments and conditions such as dementia.

 \cdot You could benefit from help with personal care, such as getting washed or dressed, or supervision to keep you safe during the day or night.

• You have needed help for at least 6 months. If you are terminally ill you can make a claim straight away.

You don't need to be receiving care to apply for Attendance Allowance.

To make a claim, you have to fill out the Attendance Allowance application form. There are a couple of ways to get your form. You can:

• call the Attendance Allowance helpline on 0800 731 0122 • download a claim form from GOV.UK.

It is best to telephone for an application form because if your application is successful, it will be back paid to the date of the phone call. You have 6 weeks from the date of your request to return the form.

When filling out the form, it is important to be really clear about how your illness or disability affects your life and attach any supporting information, such as GP letters, your care plans, or prescription lists. The success of your application can depend on how well you complete the form. Citizens Advice can help you with this. It can take up to 12 weeks to get a decision but, if successful, your payment will be backdated. If you're not happy with the decision, you can appeal. Our Advisers can also help you with appeals.

I am writing at the end of February, just about six weeks into my role at the Courthouse. This is an exciting time of year as we prepare for our 2024 season and the opening on 1st April. There is a lot going on at The Courthouse. I started at the beginning of January and it's been a very busy time, meeting the staff, volunteers and lots of new people in the town, whilst taking on the exhibits and the shop amid the cleaning, painting and general tasks getting ready to open for the new season. Thank you to everyone I have met so far for the very warm Cromarty welcome. I am delighted to be here.

A new season is always a new challenge. This year we are focusing on growing the charity so that we have a future in 2025 and beyond. We will be doing this through community projects, applying for external project funding, and finding innovative ways to share the history of Cromarty.

The Courthouse finances

As with all businesses, and the Courthouse is a business, we are working hard to build a sustainable financial plan going forward because unless we change this will be the last season The Courthouse is open. Our priorities are to improve the shop sales significantly along with the visitor experience with the aim of increasing our donations. Entrance will still be free. But we are putting a lot of effort into creating projects that will create funded roles as well as improve and enhance our business model. Unfortunately, it's the gritty reality facing museums and heritage across the country. We are recruiting: for an Operations Supervisor. This is a new role five days a week from 1st April to 31st October and one day a week through our closed season. The job is all about working with visitors, making the shop more efficient and looking after our social media to enhance the museum and the overall experience. It is designed to be as flexible as possible around other commitments such as caring responsibilities. We also have an exciting new volunteering opportunity for Volunteer Tour Guides who will be to lead our new free tours of the Courthouse. Volunteer Tour Guides will only be committing to being onsite for 60 minutes so it can easily be fitted into lunchtimes or around busy days. If you are interested please come and have a chat.

And, in addition, we have some great projects on the go...

The Courthouse building

We have been working closely with Highland Council (the owners of the building) to get essential works completed. The Council has already cleared the gutters and the downpipes and we have been working with them to address other essential maintenance to maintain integrity and make the building watertight. It's ongoing and major work is required. Our thanks to Julie Ferguson our Building Volunteer and the staff at the Highland Council for their help and assistance in taking this forward.



If you have time on a Wednesday morning please drop in and say hello to us! Everyone is welcome, young and old. We will be busy making giant easter eggs for the next couple of weeks but even if you don't fancy getting your hands dirty come along for a chat - if the weather is nice we might even get our cake in the garden!

The Courthouse Clock

I am told the clock has not kept time nor struck the hours for twenty years or so. The last record of it being serviced is 2002, shortly before the Highland Council ceased to support the maintenance of clocks on public buildings.

We have agreed an initial repair contract with Smith of Derby to get the clock going and the bell striking again. But, there is always a but.....there is additional work to do in restoring the clock loft, making it safe, along with other ongoing clock repairs. To do this and fully restore the clock and the clock loft we have to raise some money through grants, donations and a Crowdfunding Campaign. It's really exciting stuff.

As the project develops, we will be recruiting staff and volunteers to take on important roles supporting the clock and creating a long-term community involvement for the young people as well as the not so young. 
