# CAB Focus on . . . Checking what benefits you can get

If you are struggling with the cost of living, you should check if you can claim benefits or increase your current benefits. Lots of people miss out on benefits that they are entitled to - so it is worth checking what you can get.

There is help available – and it is not just for those out of work. There is support for those earning but still

struggling, plus there may be additional help if you have children, caring responsibilities, or a long-term health condition. You might be able to claim certain benefits even if you work, have savings or own a home. Claiming benefits may also mean you can get access to other financial help like cost of living payments and discounts on energy and transport.

#### To check what benefits you can get, you can use an online benefits calculator.

A benefits calculator can tell you what benefits you may be eligible to apply for, and how much money you could receive. To get the most accurate results, you will need information about your savings, income, pension, childcare payments and any existing benefits for you and your partner, if you have one.

None of the benefit calculators can give you an accurate answer if you are a student, on strike, living outside the UK, living permanently in residential care or a nursing home, or in prison. This is because it is more complex to work out the benefit entitlement for these situations.

You can use the **Entitledto** benefits calculator for a detailed overview of what you might get. Entitledto's calculator is particularly useful if you are already claiming benefits, you are sick or disabled, or you are over State Pension age. <u>www.entitledto.co.uk</u>

If you want a quick overview of what help you might get, you can use the **Turn2us** benefits calculator. <u>benefits-</u> <u>calculator.turn2us.org.uk</u>

Alternatively, you can book a Benefit Check with the Citizens Advice Bureau. Our adviser will take you through the benefit calculator and talk to you about the benefits that you may be entitled to claim.

#### Countdown to Cromarty's big fundraising event – Art, Flowers & Gardens galore

The countdown is now on until the start of the popular Art & Flowers week-long display on 1st June, culminating with Cromarty Open Gardens on 8th & 9th June. Hopefully the two events will raise even more than last year when we were able to distribute  $\pounds$ 6,970 between 11 local organisations.

East Church is the venue for the Art & Flowers display which features intricate floral arrangements with a nautical theme to mark the 200th anniversary of the RNLI together with an exhibition of Botanical and Wildlife illustrations. Art & Flowers is open from 1st June from 11am to 4pm daily until Sunday 9th June.

The weekend of 8th & 9th June sees Cromarty gardeners throw open their gates once again to allow locals and visitors alike to wander around the town and view up to 30 gardens of all sizes and layouts – all the work of their owners and each displaying a wide variety of ideas for their own special haven.

There will be music on Saturday and Sunday plus a roving bagpiper, plants will be on sale, tea and home baking will be on offer plus a Tombola on Saturday and a Bric A Brac stall on Sunday. With admission set at £5 per person, under 12's free, the event offers real value for money especially as tickets are valid for both days.

Hopefully Cromarty folk will once again give their support to both events and encourage friends and family to join the many visitors who visit the town over the eight days. If anyone in Cromarty would like to join in and open their garden do get in touch – we are not asking for show gardens, just to give visitors the chance to se what you enjoy in your open space.



## **History Society**

We have an extra meeting this month – Sheila Currie's postponed talk about Black Isle place names. Sheila will take us on a journey around the area seeking out what our local place names tell us about the past and the people who lived here. As usual – all are invited to join members at this meeting at 7.30pm on Tuesday 21 May at the Victoria Hall, with refreshments served after the talk.

A new season of talks will commence in the autumn; we will post the details once all the arrangements have been made.



As we go about the Black Isle, do we ever wonder where our place-names come from and what they mean? This talk will take the form of a tour around the Black Isle, stopping to peer at some of the roadsigns we pass by without a thought; teasing out what these place-names can tell us about the histories of the people who have lived here since these names were first written down. What do the names we give tell us about what was important to the people at that time? Which languages did they speak and how did the languages change? How did that change the place names over time? Hopefully, you will come away with a flavour of the deep history of the places we whizz past in our car or vaguely notice out the bus window and may be inspired to do your own examining of the many hundreds of local place names that I won't be able to mention in this talk.

After spells working in Archaeology, Geology, various factories, the Oil Industry, Nature Conservation and

Environmental Management, being retired allowed Sheila to follow her nose and be entranced by what's around her, including (very) amateur history research into this part of the world, where she has lived for 32 years now. She is fascinated by the people who have lived hereabouts since the glaciers receded some 12,000 years ago and what is revealed by the traces they have left.

## **Community Development Trust**

### **Royal Hotel**

#### Grants

CCDT secured a grant from the Architectural Heritage Fund, to (mostly) match-fund the money awarded by the Scottish Land Fund. These grants now jointly fund 95% of the feasibility study on the Royal Hotel, with 5% matched by CCDT.

#### **Feasibility Study**

A detailed building survey has been conducted to record the existing building and assess its current condition. This information will be transferred to the first of the reports which accompany the feasibility study for CCDT and the community.

Impact Hub Inverness is currently preparing a questionnaire, in consultation with CCDT, for circulation to the community, as the next phase.

### **East Church Hall**

#### **Lease Options**

CCDT are currently in liaison with Ian Goode of Highlife Highland and Lewis Hannah, Ward and Community Development Manager in the Highland Council on the fine detail connected to getting the East Church Hall opened up.

On Monday, we met Lewis Hannah, visiting Cromarty Camping, The Thrift Shop and East Church Hall to support this happening and discuss lease options.

#### Unit 2 | Whitedykes Industrial Estate

#### **Community Asset Transfer**

Following an expression of interest in the above, CCDT have now met the Commercial Estates Management Team of Highland Council, to visually inspect the building and assess the merits of taking the commercial unit into community ownership.

A formal asset transfer request is now being made to the Community Asset Transfer Team of the Highland Council. This will trigger a second SLF application in Summer 2024.

CCDT are working alongside HIE and SLF over this. Unit 2 will jointly enable Cromarty Camping to expand works and simultaneously shore up demand for light industrial units within the community.

But this is something that will take into 2025, probably.

#### **Cromarty Camping**

With an on-site team of two, hard and soft landscape works are progressing at a pace. Over April, John and Rory constructed a staircase to the upper terrace and zone for two cycling touring tents; and completed a section of drystane dyke which is to become the new herb garden. In Autumn last year John seeded areas of the campsite with a mix of wildflowers and seed gathered from gardens across Cromarty, and these - if successful - will be the nocut zones of the site, to support wildlife and biodiversity. Come along and have a look!

Bookings continue to roll in, from as close as Ardersier and as far away as Austria.



#### **Thrift Shop**

Our brilliant volunteer team is now back in full swing. Donations have again flooded in, including some which enormously help the operating side of the shop: Jon and Emmy have kindly gifted the thrift shop their 'cheese shop' till and counter, making life so much easier. The thrift shop has also been gifted industrial flooring, which insulates the floor. Approximately £600 has been made over the first two Saturdays. Please keep your donations coming in.
