### **Cromarty Clean Up - THANK YOU**

People have come to the Cromarty & District Community Council (C&DCC) and complained about the state of Cromarty so we decided to organise the Cromarty Clean Up with a deadline to finish before the Open Gardens.

The Cromarty Clean Up was coordinated with the Highland Council who were asked to remove the bags of vegetation etc, and it's just as well this was put in place. We circulated social media and posters advertising for volunteers for 16th, 17th and 18th June from 7-9pm each evening, to meet and start work.

Well here's what happened: basically the clock stopped at Open Gardens; yes we continued to work until, and on, a blazing hot, Friday. We also saw that many people were clearing up outside their, and neighbouring frontage. In total, over 300 bags of waste were removed, probably about 3 tons, the collections organised by Highland Council went very smoothly.

Councillor Sarah Atkin came out to help on Monday, which was a really strong show of support for what we were doing. We have had over 50 volunteer (slots) over the 5 days, one 9 year old, a couple of teens and an age range up to 80! Huge thanks to the volunteers, this would not have been possible without their time and considerable efforts. We've received lots of nice comments and one of the lucky volunteers was presented with a bottle of Prosecco by a grateful member of our community.

A HEARTFELT THANK YOU to all those who participated, much of this behind the scenes.

### **Cromarty Harbour**

#### Progress report on on-going works

Those who have visited the harbour recently will see that our restoration of the historically important curved east pier has started and despite some windy weather our contractors continue to make progress. Unfortunately, the foundation stones at the end of the curved East Pier are not in good condition and could fail soon. The base will now be underpinned with a concrete ring with the cavities then filled and linked to the ring with steel pins to keep the structure stable. I've attached a photo to highlight the poor state. That has set us back in time and money and now the budget has to be reallocated to preserve the integrity of the structure below the waterline rather than doing the extensive repairs we had planned.

However, we will be getting on with the new steps and a good deal of pointing. It isn't the outcome we wanted, but it is the right one, ensuring that the pier remains in place and accessible. We continue to work with our principal funder, Historic Environment Scotland, to map out a solution that could work for both of us; we are encouraged by their support, but we urgently need more funds for restoration and hence the plea from our adjacent charity, Friends of Cromarty Harbour, who have to date been able to commit over £12,000 to the project as a result of their fundraising activities.

You may have noticed that we have installed a donation pillar and a couple of boards with QR codes to encourage donations. If you want to donate some small change the donation pillar is the place.

#### Supporting the harbour


It has only been a year since we put our charity whisky cask to rest and now the liquid is starting to draw some colour and flavour from the rum cask. Given the need to raise additional funds to support the harbour restoration, now is an opportune time to give the Whisky Share initiative another push. It was a great success last year and helped other funders come onboard, e.g. Historic Environment Scotland mentioned to us that it helped demonstrate good engagement and effort. In short, if you haven't already done so, secure your bottle share of the cask for £60 (within this amount £48 is a gift aid donation that can be offset against your income tax) and only pay duty and bottling costs in 9 year's time, estimated at around £30 presently. Roughly you get a single cask ten year-old GlenWyvis whisky matured in a rum cask for much the same price as being charged today whilst helping to support Cromarty Harbour's restoration effort at the same time. We have also turned our best-selling harbour poster into a card, which is on sale from EcoVentures and Gallery48. Priced at £3 each, this makes a lovely reminder card for someone to receive.





With the support of the Art Fund, we commissioned this footage to be crafted into a short artistic film by local filmmaker Kyllachy: "Summer is coming to a close in Cromarty. From the lively festivities of the 1963 Regatta, winter arrives and the town succumbs to dramatic storms. The gradual degradation of the film footage acts as a metaphor for the passage of time and the fading of collective memory."

The Cell A Cinema is open during our normal opening hours (**Wednesday - Saturday, 12-4pm**) with Cromarty63 playing on loop.
