A Grateful and Proud Moment at the Harbour

Saturday 25th October marked the completion of the latest phase in the harbour's repair and renovation project, with the East Pier now restored to pristine condition. The sheer scale of work accomplished is difficult to capture in a few words, and we encourage everyone to take a stroll along the pier and see the results for themselves. The craftsmanship is outstanding, and the transformation remarkable.



With the project freshly completed, it may take time for the full impact to sink in. Together we have, quite literally, saved the pier from collapse, restoring stonework and mooring posts to their historic appearance from two centuries ago. Take a moment to admire the two new sets of stairs, the beautifully laid stone around the harbour, the improved decking, and the meticulous pointing.

Recall how the area between the steps looked just six months ago! Even the wall at the slip has been repaired and repointed. Photographs hardly do justice to the transformation—so please, come and visit and experience it for yourself.

Cromarty Courthouse Museum

We have a really exciting talk that explores Timothy Pont and his work in mapping the Scottish Highlands during the sixteenth century, focusing on his Wester



Ross map (Pont 4). Pont worked at a time when mapping was used to claim authority and bring order to a region seen as wild and unknown. Though his maps were never published in his lifetime, they became the foundation of Scottish mapping and still offer valuable insights into the landscape, culture, and daily life of the early modern Highlands. The talk will be delivered by Siobhan Beatson the Director of Ullapool Museum.

Harbour seal lives up to his name

This month the harbour has had regular visits from a juvenile harbour seal. To keep it safe on one occasion the gate was closed for a few hours.

Local marine scientist Terrie Sawyer contacted the British Diver Marine Life Rescue (BDMLR) organisation, but the little chap had



disappeared back into the water by the time they arrived on more than one occasion.

BDMLR advise when the seal is seen hauled up, that dogs are kept away and the area kept safe and quiet. As cute as he or she is, they can give a nasty bite which can be become infected quickly.

To prevent too much attention they also advise us to post any photos on social media **after** the seal has gone back into the sea. However, if our wee friend seems distressed the link for the BDMLR is below.

From the photos provided the seal seems in good health and to be finding enough food from the scat it leaves behind. Harbour seals are suckled by their mums for around 4 weeks and then they are on their own. So it seems this solo wee chap has adopted our harbour as home for now.

An ordination of a deacon in the Scottish Episcopal Church is a solemn, yet joyful act of worship in which a person is set apart for a ministry of service, pastoral care and proclamation of the Gospel. It marks the beginning of a new phase of ministry, often as a step towards priesthood but always as a lifelong commitment to serve God's people with humility and faithfulness.

In a colourful ceremony, Stuart was ordained together with Rev'd Anne MacDonald from the northwest of Scotland. Stuart felt the call to ministry for many years,

including while working as a lay school chaplain at Christ's Hospital school in West Sussex. His mother is also a priest - in the Anglican Church of Australia, where he hails from. He has been training for the last three years through the Scottish Episcopal Institute, following a teaching appointment at Glenalmond College in Perthshire.



Stuart will serve his curacy in the Black Isle Episcopal Charge of St John, Arpafeelie, St Andrews, Fortrose and St Regulus here in Cromarty. He is already making his mark organising an open 'Come and Sing' evensong on Remembrance Sunday and with his wife, Charlotte and children Connie and Ted will no doubt be involving himself in encouraging young people to come and worship!

The Menagerie of Heathens

David Alston's talk 'The Menagerie of Heathens' will explore the portrait of the exiled Jacobite, George Keith, (last Earl Marischal of Scotland) and an enslaved African boy named Salvador. Keith led the Spanish forces which landed in Lewis in 1719 and were defeated at the Battle of Glenshiel. Later his household in Italy, Spain and France included not only Salvador and others from Africa but enslaved people from Turkey and Kazakhstan. They were agnostic, Christian, Buddhist and followers of Islam — and they were known to Voltaire, Jean-Jacques Rousseau, James Boswell and David Hume.

David's 'Slaves and Highlanders: Silenced Histories of Scotland and the Caribbean' was the Saltire Society Scottish Book of the Year in 2022. He is currently working on an account of a murder in Larkhall in 1905 and the execution of Pasha Liffey, the only Black African to have been hanged in Scotland.

The talk will take place on **Tuesday November 18th** at 7.30pm in the Victoria Hall, Cromarty. The meeting will conclude with refreshments. As usual, non-members are welcome and pay £5 per meeting but membership of the Society is £15 for the remaining 5 talks. Please bring cash as we cannot take card payments. Under-16s are welcome and are free. We look forward to seeing you there.
