Structure Governance and Management

Constitution

NOSAS SCIO was granted Charitable status by OSCR on 15 January 2014 and it is governed by the constitution which was approved at its formation and has not been amended.

Appointment of Trustees

Members of the management committee, which normally meets every two months, are the charity's trustees. Any member can be appointed as a trustee provided he/she is not an employee of the society. Trustees are elected at the Annual General Meeting which is normally held in October. Under the constitution, the number of Trustees should not exceed twenty and not be less than eight.

The committee may appoint any member to be a trustee. This appointment must be approved by the members at the next Annual General Meeting.

Trustees may not serve for more than six years without a break of at least one year.

Management

The Trustees are responsible for the management of the society.

Objects & Activities

Charitable Purposes

The society is a membership based voluntary group that seeks to encourage people of all ages to learn about and engage with the archaeology of the North of Scotland, to enjoy it, and to protect it for the future. Its purposes are:

- The advancement of education by arranging and supporting projects and events, formal and informal, which enable members and others to learn archaeological methods and associated techniques.
- 2. The advancement of the arts heritage, culture or science by
- a. undertaking and supporting relevant archaeological projects which add to the public record of our heritage
- b. promoting awareness and understanding of our heritage by arranging discussion sessions and exploratory walks, publications, and participating in public events.

Activities

The Society has been very active throughout the year, the annual pattern of events being similar to previous years and closely reflecting members' wishes and enthusiasms.

Conferences

As usual we were active and contributing participants in the 2015 Highland Archaeology Festival, leading open walks of archaeological interest and the 'opening' of the Carn Glas cairn following the Adopt-a-Monument project. We had a display at the weekend conference, which many members attended, and NOSAS' contribution to other projects was mentioned in positive terms by several speakers.

Members also attended the SCAPE/SCHARP conference, following up our contributions to that project. We had a display at the Community Heritage Conference in Pitlochry, and a small contingent also attended the Archaeology Scotland Summer School.

Monthly Archaeological Discussions (MADs)

This format works well for the Society: our MADs were well attended and lively discussions ensued. The topics covered include: Coastal Communities and the Mesolithic Tsunami (Kristian Pedersen); Atlantic Roundhouses and the later prehistoric settlement archaeology of the Moray Firthlands (Candy Hatherley); Short contributions from members (various); Rock Art (John Wombell); The Bronze Age (Anne Coombs); Bobbin Mills (Joanna Gilliatt).

Winter Walks

Our programme of 'winter walks', often incorporating a meal, is becoming increasingly popular, and included: Balintore (David Findlay); Slochd (Meryl Marshall); Erchless castle (Roland Spencer-Jones); Caledonian Canal (Bob Jones) and Craig Phadrig (Anne Cockroft); Moray (Lachlan McKeggie); Brochs (Anne Coombs).

Special Events

In late April we had a very successful week on Islay, led by Jonie Guest and Sheila Clark. In May Lachlan McKeggie arranged a private visit to the Celts exhibition in Edinburgh with an introduction by Fraser Hunter. In June Anne Coombs led us on a long weekend near Helmsdale.

Training and Skills Development

We make an effort to publicise relevant events being held by other organisations in our area, notably ARCH, Inverness Museum, and Groam House museum, and many members attend these. We also arrange our own events, which included: Plane tabling at Ormond castle, Spinningdale, and Brahan (Meryl Marshall); Plane tabling at Glen Strathfarrar (Roland Spencer-Jones); QGIS (Malcolm Standring); Photogrammetry (Alan Thompson); Pottery identification (Eric Grant).

Much learning also occurs in the context of projects, as noted below.

Projects

Our own projects active in the year were: Field walking at Tarradale, plus some limited test pitting and dating, and the Rosemarkie Caves project which has moved to its next phase.

An extensive survey was done jointly with the Aigas Community Forest organisation, and plane tabling and aerial survey jointly with Avoch Community Archaeology.

We also join in with and contribute in various ways to other projects such as the Cromarty Medieval Burgh Community Archaeology Project, and Aberdeen University's excavations at Garbeg.

Other activities

Other activities which support and promote the Society include: Newsletter (Anne Cockroft); blog (James McComas); website (Roland Spencer-Jones); Facebook page (Roland Spencer-Jones and James McComas); and our library (Susan Kruse).

Achievements & Performance

Governance

During the year we held six regular Committee (trustee) meetings, plus one special one to approve the submission of the Tarradale Through Time grant application. Meetings are minuted and when approved made available on our website. At each meeting a financial report is received.

We have formalised our sub-committee structure and membership, and a report from each subcommittee is taken at each Committee meeting. Much work is done within our sub-committees, the results of which are evident in the section above.

The Committee gained three new members at the 2015 AGM (Duncan Kennedy, Karen Kennedy and Sue Walker).

The Committee sees no reason to recommend a change to the membership fees.

Strategy

We have continued to follow and develop the strategy set out in 2014. Now we are established as SCIO we are in a better position to apply for funding for larger projects, as we did for the first time this year. We have tried to provide activities which meet the wishes of our members, and the levels of attendance at all the activities listed above suggest that we are on the right lines. Indeed, we have had rather too many members at some of our winter walks and the Committee will need to consider how to deal with this.

The Society continues to grow gradually (now 120 members). This appears to be a viable and manageable size and we have not sought to grow more rapidly. Consistent with our strategy we have had positive contact with and in many cases worked with other organisations with common interests eg HES, ARCH, University of Aberdeen, Aigas Community Forest, Avoch Community Archaeology, Scottish Rock Art project, Cromarty Medieval Burgh Community Archaeology Project, and UHI.

We have used NOSAS funds selectively to support projects. We are not in a position to become a major funder, and have chosen to use our limited funds to support own projects with very limited financial needs eg Aigas survey, and as 'pump priming' funding to help progress what may become a large project to the stage where a major external funding application can be made eg Tarradale Though Time.

We have also used NOSAS funding to support the training events (although participants usually contribute) and for limited purchases of equipment. We budget to spend up to £200 per year on books and publications for our library.

Future Projects and Funding

During the year we have been active in seeking funding for future projects. Specifically, we would like to put in place a two to three year project based at Tarradale ('Tarradale Through Time') which comprises a series of targeted excavations and aims to involve local groups and reveal a little more about what lies beneath the farmland of this remarkable location. We applied to SSE's Sustainable Development Fund but this was greatly over-subscribed and we were unsuccessful. We believe that we will have a better chance with HLF and other potential funders and we are preparing to apply again.

Early in the year we committed to support the Scottish Rock Art project as a partner undertaking the pilot field work. Substantial funding has now been secured from the Arts and Humanities Research Council by Edinburgh University and HES for this five year whole of Scotland project which we hope will start later this year.

We have a small number of incomplete projects on our 'books' and will continue to endeavour to finish or close them.

People

The Society relies entirely on the enthusiasm and hard work of its members, particularly its Committee. This year our long-serving treasurer David Findlay will stand down from the Committee.

Financial Review

Our ongoing source of funding is from membership subscriptions and these amount to £1,671 (2015 £1,478) in the year. We received grants of £3,000 for further test pitting and sample analysis for the Rosemarkie Caves Project and we continue to receive significant income from the sale of our two books, Glen Feshie and Strathconon. Book sales amounted to £653 (2015 £973) in the year.

Our expenditure for the year of £5,454 included funded projects at £3,499, unfunded (own) projects at £801, and covered our running costs and the costs of our charitable activities.

The net receipts for the year of £664 (2015 £4,179) represents a net payment for projects of £(499) and a surplus from charitable activities of £1,163 (2015 £763).

Reserves Policy

The policy of the Trustees is to maintain sufficient reserves to cover normal annual running costs and have sufficient funds to investigate, research and fund future projects. At the end of the year the society has reserves of £17,343 of which £5,215 are restricted for expenditure on funded projects.

Plans for Future Periods

The Trustees intend to continue to carry on with the core charitable purposes of the society and would like to encourage new projects to be promoted by members.

Independent Examiner's Report

For the year to 31 August 2016

Year ended 31 August 2016

1. Basis of Accounting

These accounts have been prepared on the receipts and payments basis in accordance with the Charities and Trustees Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

2. Nature and purpose of funds

Unrestricted funds are those that may be used at the discretion of the trustees in the furtherance of the objects of the charity.

Restricted funds may only be used for funded projects as specified by the donor. During the year £3,000 (2015 £3,500) was received for the Rosemarkie Caves Project. See note 10 for detail of Restricted Funds.

No separate bank account is maintained for restricted funds.

There were no related party transactions and no remuneration was paid to trustees or any connected parties during the year.
