

Stalkerpath Research – David Jarman – a June 2025 update

This sheet contains [a link](#) to a valuable resource relating to the extensive network of stalkerpaths in the Highlands.

On opening the web-page, under 'Research', click on **Presentations**, then scroll down to identify the individual stalkerpaths that have been researched and described, as well as the overview documents. The reports are not in any particular order, so worth scrolling down.

These paths were created in the late 19th and earlier 20th centuries when many Highland estates were given over to sporting activities, but also with recreation in mind.
