Art Society of Inverness:

What You Told Us - Membership Survey Highlights Elaine French reports:

A heartfelt thank you to everyone who took the time to complete our recent membership interests survey! With 112 responses - nearly half our membership - this has been a valuable opportunity to hear your voices and shape future events around your interests. We'll be holding a special committee meeting after our September exhibition to consider all the feedback more fully, but here are some early highlights and decisions already made based on what you told us:

Outings and Events

While there was initial interest in a trip to *Beyond Van Gogh: The Immersive Experience* in Aberdeen, the cost of hiring a coach was simply too high to make this feasible. Sadly, this trip won't go ahead - but we are always open to other outing suggestions for the future!

On a brighter note, it looks like a Christmas party will be a welcome addition to our calendar. Over 77% of you said you *would* or *might* attend, so we'll be moving forward with plans for a festive celebration. A New Year party drew a more cautious response, with 43% not interested, so for now we'll focus on Christmas.

Workshops and Classes – What You Want to Learn

We offered a wide selection of art media and asked what kind of learning format you'd prefer - just a one-day taster, a short two-day course, or a longer class block. Here's what stood out:

- **Drawing (graphite, charcoal, pen)**: Interest was strong, with over 58% interested in at least a one- or two-day session.
- **Watercolour** continues to be popular, with nearly 75% expressing interest, especially in class blocks.
- Pastels and Acrylics also fared well, with more than 60% of respondents keen to participate.
- Mixed Media and Oil had more mixed interest, but still worth considering for future programming.
- Collage and Lino Cut Printing had more limited appeal, and Stained Glass and Fused Glass had the highest proportion of "Not interested" responses—though we know these do appeal to some!

A number of you used the comments section to ask for **portraiture**, **life drawing**, **land-scape and perspective workshops**, and **monoprinting**. These will be considered along-side our regular offerings.

Interestingly, many of you expressed a preference for **shorter**, **accessible formats** like one-day or weekend sessions. We also noted suggestions for **art history talks**, **Saturday sessions**, and even a **novice section at the annual exhibition** to encourage new artists to display their work.

When Works Best

Most members are most available on **weekday daytimes**, with 51% saying they could "always" or "usually" attend. **Weekends** are also reasonably popular, with 40% saying they "usually" or "sometimes" can attend. **Weekday evenings** are the least popular—perhaps not surprising during our Highland winters!

Helping Hands – Volunteers and Committee

We asked if anyone would be willing to help out on the committee. While 34% said "Yes" or "Maybe", only a small portion actually included their names or contact details. So, if you *did* tick "yes" but forgot to tell us who you were, please reach out! You can speak to *any* committee member - our emails are just inside the front cover of this newsletter. If joining the committee feels like a big step, don't worry. 68% of you said you'd consider helping out with specific jobs or events. Thank you! We'll be in touch where contact details were provided, but if you meant to offer but didn't leave a name, just get in touch.

Who Are Our Members?

We were pleased to see a good mix of members:

Around 43% described themselves as either **hobby artists** or **serious amateurs**. 28% were **newcomers**, while 34% have been with the Society for over 5 years. Several members have been with us since the 1980s! It's clear that we have both a wealth of experience and an exciting number of new members to welcome and nurture.

Final Thoughts and a Few Gems from the Comments

The final comments section was a treat to read. Quotes that made us smile: "I love this art society – the teaching, the camaraderie, the encouragement." "Thank you, ASI, for all that you do for the members. Your hard work is greatly appreciated."

"Just love Artyfacts – look forward to it arriving on my doorstep."

There were also a few useful reminders—for example, to be mindful of accessibility, to consider the challenges of driving into Inverness in winter, and to offer options for both beginners and more experienced artists. These are all important points we'll take forward.

You will learn about using traditional oil-based inks and print on the Takach and Albion presses.

FRAMING WITHOUT FEAR - Don't panic!

SO you are going to exhibit your work and it needs a frame - and getting one seems a daunting and expensive prospect. Here are some hints and ideas borne of experience:

Does it really need a frame? Probably, but a deep sided canvas (approx. 4 cm) can be shown without one. Make sure the sides are clean, maybe painted white or black, or the image continued around the sides. (Unless you like the paint splattered look!)

FRAMERS: The two best known professional framers in Inverness are:

We Frame It in Tomnahurich Street

The **Inverness Framing Company**, very conveniently situated within WASPS (Inverness Creative Academy). <u>www.invernessframingcompany.co.uk</u>

Both of these can be very busy so don't leave it until the last minute.

There is also a new business at Lentran, awaiting feedback: **Maclennan's Picture Framing Services,** 07789 814578, *shinty49@gmail.com.* And there are others.

Professional framing is not a cheap solution as you are employing a skilled and experienced expert who can offer you all kinds of options, and you will come away with something beautiful. Worth it if you can.

However, there are other things you can do with a bit of ingenuity (and no carpentry):

FRAMES ONLINE: You can buy frames online, not as cheap as you might think although there are usually discounts if you buy a few. Allow plenty of time for delivery. **www.bramptonframing.com** are very obliging and good for larger bare-wood frames (i.e. you paint them yourself). Best to get a few to make the postage worthwhile. **www.easyframe.co.uk** are good for tray-style frames for canvas. There is not space here to describe how to frame your paintings with these, and what accessories you need, but I am very willing to advise if you want to contact me directly. It's not difficult.

UPCYCLE: Useful for smaller works. Buy small frames from the likes of Dunelm, The Range, Hobbycraft etc, preferable wooden ones. Inspect them carefully before you buy and reject any with defects. You can paint them (carefully) before use (a matt grey looks quite smart) and you will usually need to apply D-rings and cord, and tape the backs. Remove the struts from the back of photo frames.

WOODEN PAINTING PANELS can be converting into tray frames by turning them over! You might want to sand them before painting them. Use No Nails glue to stick your canvas or board inside— you can raise a board up to "float" using small blocks of wood (try mini jenga blocks from The Works)

RECYCLE (if you are up for it): This is feasible for a work on paper that needs to be mounted under glass. Look in charity shops or the local auction for unwanted prints in sound frames (preferably wood that you can paint). Instead of a mount you could stick your painting onto a piece of mountboard cut to the size of the frame. Some people leave the edges gently torn rather than cut, which can look quite attractive. Paintings on canvas need a frame exactly the right size. Works on board can be trimmed if it won't spoil your composition. Or get the frame first and paint on a board the right size. If your glazed frame does not have re-usable "tabs" to hold painting, mount and backing board in place, you can buy a Framing Point Driver from Amazon. This is a fun piece of equipment! Do not point it towards yourself unless you need multiple piercings (thanks for that advice Kathy Sutherland).

You can use good quality household emulsion to paint frames. Matt, vinyl, silk or egg-shell, whatever you want. Neutral colours are generally best. The New Start charity warehouse in the Carse in Inverness sells bashed tins of good paint very cheaply. (They also have loads of used frames just now).

I cannot emphasise enough that you should not attempt a DIY framing job if you are unable to take your time and be scrupulously clean, neat and accurate. Look at the back of your framing - would you be happy to have bought this yourself?

What else?

Accessories such as tape, D-rings, cord, fixings etc are cheapest from e-bay or Amazon. Glazed frames must be neatly taped round on the back.

Cord is better than picture wire. (no String PLEASE - it rots after a few years).

The D-rings go one third of the way down the back of the picture.

Everyone needs a bradawl (pointy thing, £2.50 at B & Q)

"Offset Framing Clips" are useful for fixing canvas into frames as you can easily swap the canvas for another one at a later date.

Sticky labels frequently fall off the back of frames. Use glue. Write neatly.

Paint frames by balancing them on a paper cup or bean tin at each corner.

Price your work so that you will not be out of pocket with framing costs.

Finally, follow all exhibition instructions to the letter, as it's disrespectful to the organisers if you don't! You can do it!

In a future issue, Bob Peckham will explain how to make your own frames using the Lionpic Chop Service (warning, may involve carpentry, possibly an axe?)

Art to help save a Kirk and Hall

Thanks to a huge amount of work by a lot of individuals, a very healthy profit was made by a 'Grand Art Sale' in July to help save the Kirk and Hall at Killearnan. This came out of the commission from sales of paintings and cards (some of which were full donations by artists), from a raffle, an auction and sales of delicious home-bakes and refreshments.

Heading up the team of organisers were ASI members Belinda Johnson and Margaret (Maggie) Macdonald who advertised it as a special sale 'at bargain prices' by ASI members "to help save this historic building and hall for community use." Doors opened on 4th and 5th July with a display of at least 200 paintings in the church and cards and refreshments in the hall. The sun shone, the people came and a wonderful atmosphere resulted.

Many came representing the numerous art groups that meet regularly at the hall. There were many positive comments about the suitability of the venue as a future community centre for the arts in the Highlands – if only it can be saved. Supporters point out that the hall is modern with a great car park, the

church is beautiful and there are many painting opportunities around. There has been a church there since 1223 and the whole site is of great historic interest.

Additional attractions included live music from Daniel Shearer, a Secret Auction of Paintings by his dad Jonathan, and Portrait Sketches by William Mather. Winner of the 'Lucky Square' raffle - with people paying £5 per square - was Colin Riach, who is now the proud owner of an original painting by William Mather. Maggie, a member of the church, said: "Colin is always helping at the church and transported the ASI screens for us. He is a very worthy winner and he and his wife are delighted with the painting."

The church and hall face possible closure due to the Church of Scotland facing difficult decisions to 'rationalise its estate' and make the best use of its resources.

HIGHLAND ART PRIZE 2025

The main information about this was published in the May edition of Artyfacts. New members (and those who don't do filing) will find all details on www.artinverness.com. Meanwhile here is an update on the arrangements:

In addition to the £1,000 prize for the winner (to be shared with their corresponding arts organisation), WASPS have confirmed that they will once again offer the opportunity for the winner to mount a solo exhibition in The Briggait in Glasgow, ideally in October 2026 when the 2026 Highland Art Prize exhibition will also be taking place (as the Royal National Mòd is in Glasgow next year). Alongside that, Cass Art will present a £250 gift voucher to the highly commended runner-up, and the Highland Soap Company will give a gift set to each of the 10-12 shortlisted artists.



"What artists see": Block of 6 classes with Fiona Stewart: REVIEW

This was an excellent series of classes at WASPS. Fiona is a very engaging tutor and the sessions were informative and entertaining.

The subjects of the classes were: Mary Fedden (still life); Van Gogh (landscape drawings); Alex Katz (re-imagining place - collage); Georgia O'Keeffe (shells); Matisse, Picasso and Klee (mono print); John Piper (coastal collage).

Fiona was well prepared for each class: materials set out for participants, examples of each artist's work pinned up on the wall, and printouts to help us focus our own efforts. Fiona had provided still life subjects for the Mary Fedden session, while for some of the other classes we were asked to bring along materials such as photographs to work from.

Each class began with a presentation by Fiona on her i-pad, setting out the background to the artist's work and his/her influences and methods. This also gave us the chance to ask questions and have a wider discussion. Following the presentation, it was our turn: Van Gogh's mark-making; how to create a monoprint; how Mary Fedden arranged her still life compositions; re-creating an Alex Katz collage; looking into and through shells as inspired by Georgia O'Keeffe.

Let's hope there are more in future – after all, there are so many artists to choose from...
