#### DAME BARBARA RAE at INVERNESS MUSEUM & ART GALLERY

#### "Times and Places"

This wonderful exhibition of Barbara Rae's

his knowledge and long experience.

paintings and prints recently came to Inverness
Museum and Art Gallery, and one wintry afternoon
Barbara's master print-maker Michael Waight held
a print-making demonstration and Barbara
herself had us spellbound with a talk.
Michael took us through the process of inking up
and printing a steel etching plate. The print of ice
floes in beautiful blues and greens is from
Barbara's North West Passage journeys. Michael's
technique is meticulous and he engaged us with



We had time to absorb Barbara's artwork "Stone Pier", a favourite of hers from 1980 (now in IMAG's collection); "Peat Bank" (1988), a glowing mixed media collage; "Exit" (2015), a massive canvas 213 x 184 cm ,plus some monotypes and etchings. It was a feast of spectacular colours and wonderful mark making, an inspiration.

Barbara then gave us an entertaining and informative talk, tales about growing up and going to art school, stories from her teaching days and descriptions of her travels, to the USA, Ireland, Spain and most recently to the Polar Regions. Her next major exhibition will be based on time spent in Antarctica. Questions from the floor enquired about her ways of working. Barbara paints in acrylic and often washes off layers as part of the process. She recounted a funny story of using so much water that blue paint dripped through the floor onto a life model below.

I have long been in awe of Barbara's work and it was an honour to meet her. She well deserves her new title of Dame Barbara Rae.

#### CHRISTINE O'KEEFFE

(died December 2024)

Christine O'Keeffe was a professional watercolourist and teacher who divided her time between her croft house in the Highlands and her shepherd's cottage in the foothills of the French Pyrenees.

She had always worked in the field of art and design but had specialised in large, bold and loose watercolour paintings of the landscape for the last twenty years. She also enjoyed portraiture and striking flower paintings. Christine exhibited in and around Inverness, Perth, Edinburgh and London and her work found its way into homes as far as Australia, South Africa, Canada and America.

Her work was distinctive in style, and she employed some unusual techniques to encourage a loose, strong and bold final painting. She was happy to share her knowledge and techniques with ASI members through her workshops, where many of us got to know her.

Christine used to say of her medium that "Watercolour painting should be fun. It may be irritating and frustrating, but it should be enjoyable. It is not a nice pale hobby; it is an exciting vibrant battle ".

# **Stained Glass Workshop with Catherine Carr**

Jane Nestor reports on a workshop held at WASPS before Christmas. Catherine Carr is a fantastic glass artist who has her studio there, and hopefully this workshop might happen again!

We started off with Catherine outlining the whole process, and talking us through the tools we were going to use. She then demonstrated how to use the glass cutters, showing us how to cut a straight line.

Now it was our turn! We were given a piece of glass around A4 size, and practised cutting a few straight lines. Then we moved on to wavy lines and various shapes until we were comfortable using the cutter. Catherine was very attentive, going round us all to make sure we were cutting at the right angle and using correct pressure.

There was a selection of Christmas themed patterns for us to choose from, which most of us used, although the option to use our own design was there. There were angels, doves, holly leaves, stars etc. Then we chose our colours. There was a huge selection of glass, ranging from clear, iridescent, patterned, textured, even mirrored. The colours were stunning, especially when you held them up to the light, and everyone had fun making creative choices.

Once we had cut all our pieces, all the cut surfaces were then ground down to smooth them off. There were 3 grinders for us to use, so nobody had to wait long for a turn. Next, we applied the copper foil around the edges and smoothed it down. Now, on to the soldering! I found it a bit daunting at first, but soon relaxed into it. Even though it wasn't perfect, I was happy with the end result.

There were a lot of new skills learned that day, and everybody gained a sense of achievement. It was a busy and absorbing process in a very friendly and encouraging atmosphere. Catherine's knowledge, experience and patience were invaluable, and everybody thoroughly enjoyed the workshop.
















#### A NOTE FROM THE EDITOR
