
Wednesday March 5th Ash Wednesday.

Thursday March 6th

'Whenever you fast ...' Matthew 6:16.



'Jesus is taking it for granted that you will fast, not suggesting it as something you might not have thought of. So consider practising the discipline of fasting this Lent. I don't mean just giving up ice cream or doughnuts. The object of the Christian fast is to deny ourselves something normally experienced as fundamental to life, so that we grow in our appreciation that all things come from God and that

without God there is nothing. Hence, we return to the thing we have missed, with a real thanksgiving and a much fuller enjoyment.

In which case, consider giving up a whole meal once a week. Or give up coffee or alcohol. Or give up driving your car so fast, or driving it so often. You can give the time saved to God in a more profound thanksgiving for the whole of life. You can give the money saved to those in need as a small token of your desire to build a fairer world. Thus your acts of fasting and self-denial, however small, will begin to draw you into the mystery of the one who gave up everything for you.' (Stephen Cottrell)

For reflection : How might fasting put me back in touch with some basic realities about life? Is there some simple, practical way in which I can fast during this Lent?

Teach us, O God, to view our life here on earth as a pilgrim's path to heaven, and give us grace to tread it courageously in the company of your faithful people. Help us to set our affections on things above, not on the passing vanities of this world, and grant that as we journey on in the way of holiness we may bear a good witness to our Lord, and serve all who need our help along the way, for the glory of your name. Amen.

Friday March 7th World Day of Prayer

<u>Focus on the world during Lent.</u> <u>YEMEN.</u>

'Secret meetings, coded messages and pseudonyms – these are all part of what it means to follow Jesus in Yemen, such are the dangers.

"It's like we have our own language," says one church leader. Amidst it all, the Holy Spirit is moving.

For years, Yemen has been embroiled in civil war, leading to fractures in governance, a rise in extremism and a catastrophic humanitarian crisis. Against this backdrop, religious freedom is non-existent, with Christians and other religious minorities increasingly forced into the shadows. With Islam the state religion, it's illegal for Muslims to convert to another faith, and being discovered as a Christian can bring house arrest, imprisonment, torture and even death.

"Your prayers have done many miracles – your prayers for safety and protection have been answered," says one leader. "It's a miracle that we're able to come back home and safely sleep at night and then do it again and again. Your prayers are what keep us going." And people are coming to know Jesus, particularly through social media, reaching rising numbers of Yemenis who are questioning Islam. So please pray for new believers – for protection, boldness and wisdom. And that peace and justice will come to Yemen.'
