I said in my last report that closing of the Churchroom during lockdown was sad, but that it gave us a great opportunity to get on with our work to make this space amazing!

So, what have we achieved?

1. The toilet has been plastered and painted and is looking great and functioning perfectly. We are just waiting for the grab rails & nappy changing facility and now a hot air hand drier.

2. The ceiling of the main room has been painted and freshen up.

3. The main room floor has been renovated and looks amazing!

And finally

4. A beautiful new window has been fitted above the main door in the West wall.

This work has been funded by generous donations from the community, the National lottery Awards for All and the Somerset Community Foundation.

Cross Lane

The long awaited Somerset Highways works to improve the pedestrian access and safety between Cross and Axbridge will be starting on 24th August 2020. The works will be the construction of a road crossing on the A38, a new footway on Cross Lane, new road surfacing to the north and south bound A38 and associated works. A one way system is going to be put in place prohibiting westbound traffic between the A38/Cross Lane and Prowse Lane, Axbridge.

Coronavirus

It has been both a rough time for lots of people in our parish but also has been a testament to the thoughtfulness of others. We thank all those who have been looking after some of the more vulnerable members of our parish and also have ensured that groceries were delivered to those in lock-down. Many 'Oldies' have been touched by the many displays of kindness. Thank you!

Love Where You Live

Compton Bishop has become an even more popular location for walkers, cyclists and other visitors during the Covid-Lockdown period and we, as residents can understand why. We are privileged to live in this lovely location and most of us have taken advantage in our regular walking and cycling.

- There have been so many people visiting this area - on one day at midday over 200 people were seen to be enjoying the walk from Kings Wood to Crook Peak. It has been remarkable that the levels of litter have been lower than usual.

- The colourful attire of very many cyclists passing through Cross is a wake-up call for government to recognise their responsibility to ensure the safety of cyclists on narrow country roads. Government funding looks after increasing cycle routes in towns and cities but fails to recognise the need within the country locations.

- The massive reduction in cars and lorries on the A38 and minor roads has meant significant improvements in the reduction of traffic noise from the A38 and improved air quality. Let's just hope that our politicians recognise the value of clean air and reduced background noise and its impact on the well-being of communities.

"I want to publicly record my thanks to Maggie Pritchard, a very hard-working Compton Bishop Parish Councillor, who died recently.

Knowing what a remarkable contribution she had already made in her tenure, I feel a Public acknowledgment of her work must be made.

The Parish of Compton Bishop is long and winding, making a cohesive community difficult to create and maintain. Maggie Pritchard 'made a real difference' by drawing the community together. This very public spirited lady created an information email link for those who find navigating the Parish Website a challenge. This link currently has more than seventy five Parishioners who are more easily kept up to date with Parish Events and issues. She conceived and designed an attractive rest area by the Yeo River Bridge on Old Coach Road – ably assisted in the execution of the work by two other committed community minded people.

She arranged for three Village signs to be erected at the entrance to the two villages using photographs of Crook Peak. These are on Old Coach Road; approaching Compton Bishop and entering the two villages at the Webbington. She arranged the acquisition of large tubs throughout the village and persuaded some of the ladies to fill and maintain them with colourful plantings.

Her most recent Project was the creation of an Historical display board for public view. For this she engaged the help of local Historian Margaret Jordan who many years ago produced a small book of the same subject. The Board will contain old photographs of the five areas that make up our combined villages. Namely – Cross, Newtown, Compton Bishop, Rackley and Webbington. Information gathering continues so should any of you have photographs, particularly of Newtown and Rackley, they would be gratefully received.

Maggie Pritchard was an outgoing personality who cared deeply about the physically fractured community in which she lived. She worked hard to make her village a better place in which to live and for that she needs praise. She was a self deprecating person and all she wanted was to do a good job. The council has lost a stalwart who will be hard to replace."

St. Congar's Church, notice for services

We welcome you to join us for these services of worship while restrictions to limit the risk of contracting Covid-19 are in practice here in St Congar's. We ask you please to wear face coverings and for the morning and evening services we will use two metre social distancing and mark places for you to sit with a kneeler. Wherever you are, we can all still help make a difference and I encourage you to sign up either with your household – pets included – friends, or another household in line with current government guidelines. Create your own route, from lapping your garden or local park to revisiting somewhere special. This year's Santander-sponsored Memory Walk is free to register. Walks can be organised anytime between now and October – or you might choose to do it on 20 September to mark World Alzheimer's Day.

‘World walker’ Tom is on a mission in his mum’s memory

One man walking machine Tom Fremantle is set to embark on a trek from St Austell in Cornwall to St Paul’s Cathedral in London... a mere stroll by his standards. Buckinghamshire-born Tom, 53, was midway through a four-year ‘world walk’ when the coronavirus pandemic struck, forcing him to postpone his epic 16,500-mile journey after ‘just’ 6,200 miles. But lockdown has left him with itchy feet – and so he has hatched plans to walk 250 miles in aid of Alzheimer’s Society, the UK’s leading dementia charity.

Travel writer and teacher Tom, who grew up in Swanbourne, near Aylesbury, and went to school in Oxford, will be walking in memory of his mum Ann, who died with Alzheimer’s in 2013, aged 81. He plans to cover around 20 miles a day, setting off on Monday, July 20, and arriving at the capital’s iconic domed cathedral on August 3. He said: “Mum was a lovely soul and an amazing walker herself, usually with her beloved dogs at her heels. She was a great gardener and cook too. “It was dreadful to see her succumb to dementia but we were fortunate in that it didn’t change her character in the way it can with some people. “She still recognised all her family right up to the end, but she did become very frail.”

Tom’s back-up team for the walk – friend Paul ‘Skonie’ Skone and son Alex – are helping him drum up interest with social media support. Tom explained: “People can make donations to the Alzheimer’s Society on my ‘Miles Memories Mum’ Just Giving. I’m offering to tie a ribbon around my walking stave in memory for anyone with a loved one who lived with dementia as well as play a song in their honour on a dedicated Spotify list. Just get in touch if you’d like a ribbon or a song in memory of anyone. I’d also love it if people walked with me for part of the journey. “My sister Fanny will be joining me for about 50 miles and, with any luck, we’ll arrive at St Paul’s with our walking sticks covered in ribbons. Then we’ll hand over the sticks to the lovely Alzheimer’s team.”

Tom’s postponed World Walk is in aid of three charities – Alzheimer’s Society, The Puzzle Centre and Medical Detection Dogs but this latest walk is solely for the AS. He is determined to pick up where he left off once it is safe to do so. However, despite taking on such formidable challenges, he insists he’s no athlete. “I’m a chubby 50-something with munchkin legs and a hernia,” he joked. “My only strengths are an optimistic nature, a mulish ‘I’ve started so I’ll finish’ obstinacy and feet as gnarly as the Gruffalo.”

For his St Austell to St Paul’s walk Tom will be staying safe and socially-distanced by sleeping in a tent at campsites and friends’ gardens en route. There are 850,000 people living with dementia in the UK, including around 7,000 in Buckinghamshire. The condition is the UK’s biggest killer, with someone developing it every three minutes. Chloe Beevers, Events Fundraising Officer for Alzheimer’s Society, said: “We’re thrilled that Tom has decided to fundraise for us after being forced to postpone his World Walk.

“Right now, people living with dementia need our support more than ever because of how hard the coronavirus pandemic has hit them. Our research shows a quarter of those who have died from Covid-19 had dementia. “Since the lockdown began our trained staff have made more than 100,000 welfare calls to people with dementia and their carers to offer support, information and to reassure them that they are not alone. Every penny raised by our dedicated fundraisers is helping us to continue this vital work.”
