# A Very sad time for the club

### It is with heavy heart that I write this short obituary

Ann Lloyd joined Cromarty Boat Club in 2017 and has been Club Secretary since 2018 when she was elected to the position,taking over from Bob Bull. She was a keen sailor, crewing many times, for Willie Smeaton, aboard Moonshadow on the commodore's cruise. Ann owned her own boat, an Oyster 28 called *Randan* and could be seen regularly working away at it in the compound to get it up to scratch.

Ann had been suffering from cancer for some considerable time and had been undergoing treatment of Chemotherapy. Toward the end of last year it was believed that she was finally on the mend and that it was under control. Alas Cancer is a mean adversary and at the beginning of 2025 she was told that it had returned. She went on to have further Chemotherapy and immunotherapy, both of which were causing her a lot of discomfort and leaving her totally exhausted. Throughout all of this she remained positive and was determined to beat the disease. At the last committee meeting, she said she was determined to carry on with her duties, however at around 1600 on Wednesday 30th May, passed away. Rest in Peace Ann, you will be sorely missed.





# Successful day for club crane in

Everything was in our favour on Monday 28<sup>th</sup> April, for the start of the season, with a very well executed craning operation plan. Although some of our regular more experienced members, such as Gwyn Phillips, Tom Paling and Jim Cockburn were unable to attend. Their positions were filled with keen and able replacements in the shape of Danny Coutts and Ian Mcbay. Thanks are due to several other members, who although not having a boat being lifted in gave up their time to assist in this important event which is the official start to our sailing season.

The weather was as good as we could have asked for with very little wind and no rain to dampen our spirits. The crane did arrive an hour before it was ordered, which allowed us to move one boat which is remaining in the compound, thus making room for an additional boat for the crane out in October, increasing the number of craned boat spaces. There has been a steady decline in trailered boats coming to the club and an increase in boats requiring craning. It is unfortunate that we have now reached the limit of craned in spaces.

It was agreed at the last MYA meeting in December 2024, that to try encouraging more participation, there would be a "Trial Period" of a *White Sails Only* allowance. This will mean that boats with no Spinnaker will be given a 4% increase in the handicap, applied after the cut off level. This will increase their chances of achieving better results. 
## The season ahead, continued

### **Cruising:**

# From MWG regarding Club Moorings

The 2025 moorings were laid at the beginning of March when 18 moorings for Club members & 3 Visitors Moorings were deployed on the usual grid of four lines of moorings off the Royal Hotel.

The Club retains a small stock of parts for mooring risers - polysteel rope, shackles, swivels, intermediate chain etc - that can be purchased from the Club should any risers need repair.

As for the Visitors Moorings, these will be available for use by Club members who keep their boats elsewhere but who may visit Cromarty from time to time. The idea of having a pool mooring for the exclusive use of visiting CBC members that was trialled in 2024 has been abandoned.

MWG would like to thank the Club members who helped at the various work parties and/or crewed the barge during the Spring round of activity.

Lastly, Jon Priddy will be taking over the MWG admin stuff from Jim Cockburn at the end of the 2025 sailing season.
