# Structure, governance and management

Type of governing document

Constitution

Trustee recruitment and appointment

Any resident of the village and it's locality over the age of 18 may put themselves forward for election as a Trustee. Any resident may become a member of the Association.

At each annual general meeting one third of the elected charity trustees (who are subject to retirement by rotation), or if their number is not three or a multiple of three, the number nearest to one third, shall retire from office. At each annual general meeting the members may elect charity trustees.

The board may at any time appoint and co-opt any member or nonmember of the organisation to be a charity trustee either on the basis that he/she has been nominated by a body with which the organisation has close contact in the course of its activities or on the basis that he/she has specialist experience and/or skills which could be of assistance to the board.

An elected charity trustee retiring at an annual general meeting, and whose vacancy has not been filled, will be deemed to have been reelected, if willing to act, unless: -

> he/she advises the board prior to the conclusion of the annual general meeting that he/she does not wish to be re-appointed as a charity trustee; or

an election process was held at the annual general meeting and he/she was not among those elected/re-elected through that process; or

a resolution for the re-election of that charity trustee was put to the annual general meeting and was not carried.

### Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the financial period Completion of hall refurbishment project. The village hall is now a more pleasant place to be and is being made more use of by the community.

We provided funds to purchase the kit to build an Aylesbury Skiff. The skiff build project was completed near the end of July and the skiff was launched in time for our village fete on the first weekend of August. A Scottish Coastal Rowing Association event took place on fete day with several visiting teams attending. The day was a great success and we hope to make this a regular feature of the fete as well as encouraging the development of our own rowing club.

Local Authority spending on village maintenance has continued to decline this year and we have been taking up a good deal of the slack.

### Financial review

Brief statement of the charity's policy on reserves Funds are raised through events such as the annual summer fete, via donations to the general association fund or for specific projects and through fees and donations for the use of the all-weather sports court and the new pontoon facility.

A budget is agreed at the beginning of the financial year against a range of budget heads covering all main activities, events, projects and general administration. Some reserves are allocated at this time to each budget head and against specific projects.

Use of remaining reserves would need to be agreed by the Trustees.

A reserve of £5000 for contingency/emergency is maintained.
