SHOULD WHITE-TAILED EAGLES BE REINTRODUCED TO CUMBRIA?



A group of local organisations is exploring the possibility of bringing white-tailed eagles back to the Cumbrian landscape and they need to hear your thoughts.

White-tailed eagles are Britain's largest native bird of prey and were last in Cumbrian skies in the late 18th century. They were driven to extinction in the UK, and various reintroduction programmes across the country have seen breeding pairs successfully returned.

Research by the Cumbrian White-Tailed Eagle Project shows Cumbria holds suitable habitat for the bird of prey – now it's time to hear from you.
