up to £1,200 (including VAT) to enhance the appearance of their shopfronts, signage, and exterior features. The scheme is designed to help improve the visual appeal of Fort William's businesses and promote trade with local services/suppliers.

Events Support Grants - This grant is designed to help local organisers enhance, expand, or trial events that bring people into the town centre and support the local economy. Grants can cover up to 50% of eligible costs, including marketing, infrastructure, and added-value programming.

The scheme is open to local businesses, community groups, and individuals with a viable event plan that benefits Fort William.

- **SSEN Regional Community Benefit Fund:** SSEN have opened the second round of their **Regional Community Benefit Fund**, enabling organisations across the north of Scotland to apply for a share of £2m for projects that will aid skills development, support the culture of the region, or help alleviate fuel poverty. - **Scottish Rural Network – Decarbonise Community Transport Fund:** Community transport operators are invited to apply for Scottish Government funding to invest in zero emission vehicles and charging infrastructure. The latest round of the Plugged-in Communities Fund makes £4 million available for the purchase or lease of electric vehicles, including wheelchair accessible vehicles, and the associated charging infrastructure. 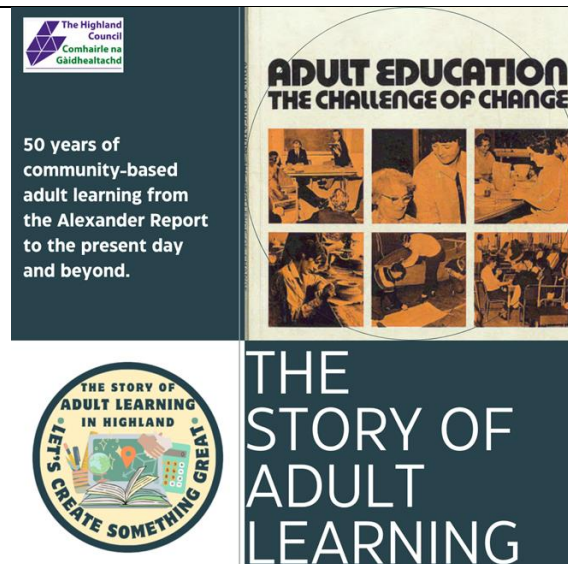
Achlachan Wind Farm Community Fund
Area: Highland Grant size: Up to £10,000
The fund supports community activity and development in the Huklek & District Community Council area, with priority given to projects within a four kilometre radius of the Achlachan Wind Farm.

Beinneun Student Scholarship Fund
Area: Highland Grant size: Up to £1,500
The Beinneun Student Scholarship Fund provides bursaries for individuals living in Fort Augustus, Glenmoriston and Glenelg seeking to improve their employability prospects or develop a new career. It is provided from the Beinneun Community Benefit Fund which supports voluntary organisations, charities, householders, students and social enterprises across these three communities.

EDF Renewables Corriemollie Wind Farm Community Fund (Contin)
Area: Highland Grant size: Up to £5,000
This fund supports not-for-profit groups providing charitable activities that benefit people living in the Corrie Community Council area, including Dalmecon and Tobar.

EDF Renewables Corriemollie Wind Farm Community Fund (Lochbroom)
Area: Highland Grant size: Up to £250

- **Age Scotland Dementia Guide:**
Developed in collaboration with members of the Dementia Lived Experience Forum and the Unpaid Carers Working Group, ensuring that the voices of unpaid carers directly informed the content, tone, and structure of the guide. Designed to help unpaid carers understand their legal rights and access key support. From navigating social care to understanding carer assessments and financial entitlements, the resource offers accessible information shaped by real-life experience. - **Highland Housing Need & Demand Assessment - Household Survey 2025:**

The Highland Council is carrying out research which will help them and other partners to understand the housing circumstances and needs of residents across Highland. This will help the Council plan for new housing and housing services in the future, making sure the needs of all residents across the Highland region are met.

- **Highland Repair Directory:** The Highlands and Islands Climate Hub is pleased to welcome the Highland Repair Directory to their list of projects supporting communities in Highland. The Repair Directory is an online resource which makes it easier for people to share or repair items, instead of sending them to landfill and replacing with new. - **The Whole Family Wellbeing Programme (WFWP),** in partnership with Generations Working Together (GWT), is offering a fully funded support package to help 36 practitioners from 18 Highland organisations develop intergenerational projects. Money Counts Training:



Money Counts Courses July – September 2025

Course information

Brief conversations: is aimed at anyone who is in a position to have a brief conversation with individuals around money worries. The course aims to build the confidence of staff to offer income maximisation help and explains how to ask about money worries and where and how to refer for support. **Course length – 45 mins**

Support conversations: aims to increase confidence of staff working with people that may benefit from income maximisation help. It aims to increase staff's understanding of poverty and the importance of asking about money worries, and what support services are available what they can offer. **Course length – 1.5 hrs**

Poverty informed practice: aims to increase understanding of poverty and who it affects and what impact poverty stigma can have on individuals. It aims to support staff and teams explore what changes can be made by individuals and within organisations to ensure that poverty stigma is considered and what actions might be taken to reduce this. **Course length – 2hrs**

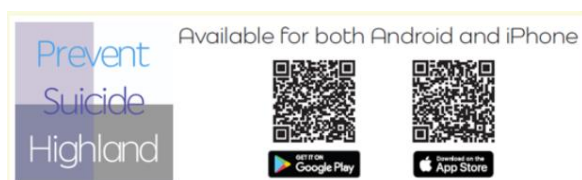
