FUNDING NEWS

- The Robertson Trust provide funding to third-sector organisations that help people and communities in Scotland living with poverty and trauma. Information on who and what they fund, useful links and resources and FAQs can be found here.
- Business Grants to help Fort William thrive: From events that bring people together to property improvements that enhance our town centre. Register your interest and be the first to hear when applications open.

up to £1,200 (including VAT) to enhance the appearance of their shopfronts, signage, and exterior features. The scheme is designed to help improve the visual appeal of Fort William's businesses and promote trade with local services/suppliers.

Events Support Grants - This grant is designed to help local organisers enhance, expand, or trial events that bring people into the town centre and support the local economy. Grants can cover up to 50% of eligible costs, including marketing, infrastructure, and added-value programming.

The scheme is open to local businesses, community groups, and individuals with a viable event plan that benefits Fort William.

- SSEN Regional Community Benefit Fund: SSEN have opened the second round of their Regional Community Benefit Fund, enabling organisations across the north of Scotland to apply for a share of £2m for projects that will aid skills development, support the culture of the region, or help alleviate fuel poverty. - Scottish Rural Network Decarbonise Community Transport Fund: Community transport operators are invited to apply for Scottish Government funding to invest in zero emission vehicles and charging infrastructure. The latest round of the Plugged-in Communities Fund makes £4 million available for the purchase or lease of electric vehicles, including wheelchair accessible vehicles, and the associated charging infrastructure. 


- Winter Heating Payments: Information on the winter heating payments due to benefit over 720,000 pensioners across Scotland. Any pensioner with an income of less than £35,000 will receive these payments. You can find more information here.

greenhouse gas emissions. The fund is open to applications until the end of October 2025, or until funding is fully allocated. Approved projects must be completed and all funding claimed by the end of February 2026. CARES funding is allocated on a first-come, first-served basis once a fully completed application with all required supporting information is received, and any queries resolved.

Age Scotland Dementia Guide:

Developed in collaboration with members of the Dementia Lived Experience Forum and the Unpaid Carers Working Group, ensuring that the voices of unpaid carers directly informed the content, tone, and structure of the guide. Designed to help unpaid carers understand their legal rights and access key support. - Highland Repair Directory: The Highlands and Islands Climate Hub is pleased to welcome the Highland Repair Directory to their list of projects supporting communities in Highland. The Repair Directory is an online resource which makes it easier for people to share or repair items, instead of sending them to landfill and replacing with new. For more information, click here.
- The Whole Family Wellbeing Programme (WFWP), in partnership with Generations Working Together (GWT), is offering a fully funded support package to help 36 practitioners from 18 Highland organisations develop intergenerational projects. Participants will gain access to GWT's national conference, three training courses, one-to-one support, and a UKwide Community of Practice network. Additional benefits include free GWT membership, access to Highland network meetings, and various online learning events. The initiative aims to build skills, confidence, and relationships across generations, fostering inclusive, cohesive communities through shared learning and care. Each organisation must commit two staff members to attend and engage fully.

- Power tools (including those with lithium batteries)

Chargers, cables, and remotes

Not accepted: Vapes or vape batteries.
