The lockdown may mean the children have not yet had chance to explore it, but work has continued apace to create an area where children can have hands-on experience of caring for animals and plants. The Therapy Farm will be a resource for the whole community, and for other schools and organisations for vulnerable young people.

In these difficult and challenging times, our school has pulled out all the stops to support our community's children, not just academically but emotionally and socially too, so to all the staff, whatever their contribution to school life, we say a huge THANK YOU from the whole community

We are also preparing the Annual Parish Return setting out our administration and accounts for the last year and our auditors are undertaking the audit in June.

Helen Myers, our new Parish Clerk, has hit the ground running and is working with Lindsay to progress an orderly transition. We have registered the Parish with a new



Government web domain (pirbright-pc.gov.uk) which makes data and communication more secure and are aiming to refresh and relaunch the Parish Council's website as a key part of improving communication of essential information, issues and events. We will be launching new email details in due course, but all contact details will remain as they are for now.

We have also taken the opportunity at Lord Pirbright's Hall to replace the roof of the Clubroom and undertake some repainting in the kitchen and elsewhere so that it's in good condition when we can resume hosting activities. JUNE 1940 – a month to remember

June 1940, 80 years ago, was a dramatic month in the Second World War. As the evacuation of Allied Forces from Dunkirk was completed, recently appointed Prime Minister Winston Churchill told the House of Commons on 4th June: "We shall fight on the beaches, we shall fight on the landing grounds, we shall fight in the fields and in the streets, we shall fight in the hills; we shall never surrender."

When he spoke, the French had not surrendered, and the idea that "in God's good time" the USA might conceivably have to ride to the aid of a 'subjugated' England, an



idea that depressed as many people as it invigorated. Two weeks later, on the 18th June, with the battle in France lost, Churchill addressed the country with a rallying call in what must indeed have seemed a very dark hour. "The Battle of Britain," he said, "is about to begin. Upon this battle depends the survival of Christian civilisation." He concluded by saying that if Britain were to last a thousand years, people would still say, "This was their finest hour."


JUNE GARDENING TIPS from Wellie

So, after all those weeks that we have had in lock down, and the sunshine and showers our gardens have received we should all be starting to notice a difference when we look outside. Hopefully, as businesses start to reopen, garden centres will as well, and any gaps in the garden can then be instantly filled, adding more colour to the garden. Make

sure that herbaceous perennials that need staking have some support otherwise they can flop over and the stems can then be damaged trying to bring them upright again. Check roses for signs of blackspot, aphids and leaf rolling sawfly damage. Cut down daffodil bulbs now as it has been at least 6 weeks since they flowered. Dead-head and cut back oriental poppies after flowering to stimulate new foliage. Pinch out any side shoots from your tomato plants, these can then be potted up to create new tomato plants. Start to feed tomato plants once the first truss is setting fruit. Keep an eye on your onion and garlic. When the leaves start to



yellow and die back, they're ready to harvest. Harvest early potatoes - these are normally ready about 10 weeks after planting.
