## Just a thought.....

## What's the magic word?

When I was a child I was taught to say please and thank you if I asked for something or if someone gave me something nice. Even if I didn't particularly like whatever the something was, I still had to be grateful for it. After every birthday and after Christmas I had to write my thank you letters - a chore I must confess I didn't enjoy very much. My children were always taught the same, and yes, they always grumbled about it too.

I also remember my parents saying, 'what's the magic word?' when I was asking for a drink, or a biscuit, or a special birthday or Christmas present. It's quite true that if you say 'please' when you're asking for a treat you're much more likely to get a positive reaction. That's what is at the heart of prayer: in effect we're asking God for something close to our hearts, and although God

is always listening, he's also waiting for the magic word. Or rather, words. Our prayers will always be answered, maybe not in the way we expect, but in God's own way. So it's only right and proper that we should say 'thank you' as well.

These days there are so many things that I am thankful for, good health, a lovely home, family and friends not least among them. But perhaps one of the things I am most thankful for is the fact that I have lived my whole life in a part of the world that has been free from the horror of war, although of course that is not the case for everyone. Whether it was a good thing or not I didn't even have to go through the rigours of National Service; I have always been thankful for that, but I often wonder if it might have made me a better or at least a less self-centred person.

In November every year we remember with pride and humble gratitude the men and women who served their country, and so many of whom paid the ultimate price. Although lots of them volunteered to serve their country in time of war, many were conscripted. Nobody asked them, and they weren't given much of a choice - and the word 'please' probably didn't enter into it. But it's because of them that we're here today, so we can and should take this opportunity to say thank you to them all. Which I do, unreservedly, on behalf of us all. Revd Gary Williamson

## **Pirbright Community Sports Pavilion**

The Parish Council has been in detailed discussions with Pirbright Cricket Club and Pirbright Football Club and Pirbright Youth Football Club on replacing the old cricket pavilion and developing a wide range of grass roots sports activity for the wider community. After 70 years we need a new pavilion for a new era of sporting endeavour in Pirbright and to build on the success of our established clubs. It has been great to see youth and adult football played competitively on the village green this year and the ground has never been in better shape. Youth cricket coaching took off tremendously over the summer and is oversubscribed, with over 70% of children coming from the Parish and local schools and with sufficient interest to form teams in a range of age groups and for the first time a ladies side. We want to encourage sports participation at all levels and all ages and abilities, and to have these facilities locally, so our community don't have to travel to access team sports and activity.

So working with the stakeholder groups the Trustees of Lord Pirbright's Hall and Recreation Ground, with the support of the Parish Council and the clubs, are developing the clear business plan and funding proposals to add to local donations and we are now preparing a bid to the new Surrey County Council Community Fund to help us with



construction. This bid process will be taking place over the autumn and if all goes well, we hope to have a decision and funding in place sometime in the new year. There is much to do, but momentum is now with us and we hope that before long we can have the use of a new community asset that will encourage the development of wider participation in a range of sports and recreation for the whole community for the next 100 years.

#### **Trees**



The established woodland and trees around our Parish, and especially framing the village green, form part of the essential character of the Parish. They help frame our space and add to the

richness and diversity of our environment. But, as with all things, they change over time and need management. As part of our responsibilities as a public body we recently commissioned a comprehensive tree survey of the trees on Parish Council land, especially those in areas of the green close to people and activity. This has flagged the need for some urgent work that is required to ensure that these remain safe over the winter and some further works needing to be undertaken in the coming months. We will progress with the short term actions identified in the next month or so, but rest assured that this is essential for the long term health of the woodland and setting of our green. We are working on a strategy for the replacement of trees wherever possible consistent with good woodland husbandry.

#### **PIRBRIGHT HISTORIANS**

Mercifully, diphtheria is no longer endemic here and it's vanishingly rare nowadays for a child to die in the UK of this disease. 138 years ago it was a very different story, when a



deadly epidemic swept through the local area and Pirbright was particularly badly hit. Between January and December 1882, there were 106 cases, of which 9 were fatal, with a further 3 in the following spring; this out of an average school attendance of 104. The Board School, under head Abel William Hill (pictured) was closed by the Medical Officer for Heath for almost 20 weeks. Unaware that the disease was spread by respiratory droplets (like Covid-19), he also had the sanitary & water systems checked (no piped water or sewerage those days). Fortunately, this was to be our worst outbreak, with only rare mentions in the school log book afterwards. What, I wonder, did the children do in lockdown without mobiles, TV or even radio?

If you see her, don't let on, will you.



#### **NOVEMBER GARDENING TIPS from Wellie**

Keep raking up leaves from lawns and paths, and off the beds if they are laying thickly, if not they can be left for the worms to break them up and incorporate them into the soil. Tie-in long whippy shoots of climbers and wall shrubs. Prune roses to prevent wind-rock and this is also the time to prune most deciduous trees, but a lot of deciduous ornamental grasses can be left until the spring. Prune grapevines after leaf fall, but before the end of December to avoid 'bleeding' of sap. Now is the ideal time to plant bare rooted plants, they need to be planted promptly, before they dry out. They can be heeled into the soil for a short period if conditions are not suitable for planting. Plant tulip bulbs now, once other spring bulbs are in, thereby lessening their chance of being infected by the fungal disease tulip blight. Keep overwintering brassicas covered with netting to prevent pigeon damage. Plant garlic cloves and shallots (if not done last month). Lift and divide rhubarb crowns. Parsnips can start to be harvested after the first

frosts when their flavour will have been sweetened. The first week in November is traditionally the time to make sowings of peas and broad beans. Start winter pruning apple and pear trees. Turf can still be laid now, providing the ground isn't frozen but keep off lawns in wet weather to

avoid compacting the soil.

**CUNNINGHAM HOUSE:** The residents' Over 80s Limbo Dancing Group entered into the Bonfire Night spirit with a dazzling show of flexibility under a flaming bar. A carer was heard to comment 'So that's how they keep getting out to the pub after lights out!'



**PIRBRIGHT TWINNING ASSOCIATION** combined their bonfire party with traditional Beaujolais Nouveau celebrations. The evening was a great success though fire and free flowing wine proved to be a heady mix.
