PERINEWS IS FIFTY!

The first edition of the Pirbright Village Newsletter was published in October 1970 and for fifty years the monthly booklet has kept the community informed, active and (hopefully) entertained. Our thanks to the Church and Parish Councils for authorising this special colour edition to celebrate this shared achievement.

In that first ever edition, Rev Cunningham apologised for 'imposing' upon everyone in the village, but wanted the newsletter to be inclusive of all, whatever their faith. Looking through that first newsletter some things seem very familiar – advertising for the Harvest Supper with barn dance in the village hall (tickets five shillings – from Mrs Watkins at the Post Office) and a coffee morning to raise money for new kneelers in the church. With no Church Room, the Sunday School started in the church then all the children walked down to the village hall, and a crèche was run by the Mothers' Union and Girl Guides in Churchmead, opposite the church.

The Rawlins Club planned to celebrate its 19th birthday that month and Mrs Rolfe of Chapel Lane celebrated her 90th birthday (so she was born in 1880). For the Cricket Club Charlie Rose was named best player, having taken over 50 wickets in that season. The Evening WI were holding a jumble sale and the Afternoon WI a demonstration on 'How to make Christmas Crackers' whilst the Brownies, Guides, Cubs and Scouts all met at 'the Hut'. It has acquired a new name, a new shape and a very different look - there were no pictures or graphics in those early days, and certainly no possibility of a colour edition to celebrate it's half century! 

Just a thought.....

As we celebrate the 50th anniversary of Perinews, I am struck by words of the Vicar of Pirbright, which he penned for his first Newsletter fifty years ago this month. It seems that the Newsletter was initially set up as a means to bring people together, as Reverend Cunningham encouraged villagers to 'belong' and not to 'shut themselves away in their little gardens' or 'within the small group who happens to be their friends'. In the welcome, he said that loneliness was one of the tragedies of the age. Fifty years later, loneliness remains a tragedy of our time, not so much due to the 'new found amenities of life' mentioned by him, but mostly due to family members moving away.



It seems that the Newsletter was developed to encourage a sense of belonging, of gathering around a common purpose, with each person playing their part to help to overcome the loneliness of village life. Fifty years on, looking back, it seems that he may have achieved that goal. Pirbright remains a picturesque 'protected' village, and the sense of belonging is palpable. Fast forward to October 2020, following several months of being shut away in our homes, with or without family, people were gradually emerging from the externally imposed loneliness. However, as a result of the recent upward trend in Covid-19 infections in hotspots across the UK, new Government rules forbid social gatherings of more than six people at any one time.

This global pandemic challenges our very sense of 'belonging'. It forces us to rethink our core values, as well as what it means to live alongside people as if we didn't belong, socially distanced two metres apart, and wearing masks, even in church. Much has changed over the years, yet things have remained constant. Reverend Cunningham said that 'it is up to us to preserve that which is of value to us'. Over the years, you, the people of Pirbright village have done just that, preserving the Newsletter and continuing to build community. I believe that you are held by the love of God expressed in the mission of the church, which still stands today as a beacon of light, love and acceptance where all continue to be welcomed. I wonder what Reverend Cunningham would make of it all.



With all of the restrictions imposed on gatherings this year, Councillors had to wait for a suitable opportunity to mark Lindsay's retirement after 18 years as Parish Clerk. In this time Lindsay has served the Parish Council well, and has deftly applied her knowledge, energy and enthusiasm to serving the people of Pibrbright, a role that often goes unnoticed and unsung but which has been vital in keeping the wheels turning and keeping our Parish and our community informed and in good shape. Options to mark the occasion were somewhat limited, but on a beautiful evening in August members of the Parish Council recorded their personal thanks with a small gathering at the Manor House, by kind invitation of Mr and Mrs Swinney, where Lindsay was presented with a painting of the pond and village green by former local artist David Deamer.



Save our streams

Please help us to safeguard our water-courses and roadside drains by thinking twice before leaving garden waste and grass clippings on their banks. We are all too familiar with the consequences of flooding in the village. We rely on the drains and streams during heavy rainfall but garden waste is a common cause of blockages. Nutrients from grass clippings can leach into streams, upsetting the ecological balance and depriving native plants and wildlife of oxygen. Good reasons to dispose of garden waste responsibly!

Parking Problems

Efforts to tackle inappropriate parking and speeding within the village have been the focus of a series of meetings with stakeholders. The Council are now considering further measures which may be taken.



OCTOBER GARDENING TIPS from Wellie

Bulbs glorious bulbs. Now is the time to buy and plant bulbs for spring displays. Life might not be back to normal but at least we can add some colour and enjoyment to our gardens. Why not think about adding some pots of winter colour, such as heathers, pansies, violas and cyclamen. All the overgrown clumps of herbaceous perennials that you have been saying this summer need to be split, now is the time to do it, as the plants are dying down for the winter. Don't worry if you aren't able to do them all, some can wait until the spring.

Cut back asparagus foliage as it yellows and dies. Harvest pumpkins and squashes before the first frosts. Plant autumn onions, leeks and garlic. Apply grease bands to fruit trees to protect them from winter moth. Sow batches of broad beans and peas for early cropping next year. Cut fruited stems of blackberries and autumn raspberries down to the ground.

Net ponds to prevent autumn leaves falling in. Regularly rake and clear fallen leaves off lawns. Complete scarifying, aeration and topdressing. This month is a good month for laying turf if it hasn't turned too cold.

The evening's raffle sold well due to hot competition for a pair of string backed driving gloves.



Pirbright Computer Club: Members enjoyed a thrilling game of Pong in which players compete in a simulated tennis tournament, adroitly moving paddles up and down to strike a moving 'ball' back and forth across the screen to the opposing player. News of the invention of a new computer chip called Intel failed to raise much enthusiasm, 'It will never catch on' was the unanimous verdict, and the invitation to invest in INTEL processors was declined.

The Parish Council Decimalisation Committee has been working overtime to prepare the village for next February when the nation changes to the continental decimal system. As we wave goodbye to pounds, shillings and pence the village must also embrace decimal weights and measures. Residents were reassured that, in a few short months, litres, kilos and kilometres will have erased all memory of the old fashioned pints, pounds and miles. There was some discussion as to whether a Baker's Dozen would become 11, a cricket over would be 5 and whether the WI Market would have to stop selling eggs by the half dozen and invest in five-egg boxes. However, they were able to reassure younger parishioners that, whilst guineas will cease to exist, Guinea pigs will be unaffected by the change.



The Church Finance Committee reported that the church collection has received a very large number of half crowns lately. They wish to remind the congregation that half crowns ceased to be legal tender last January. The Treasurer added, 'Ten bob notes will also cease to be legal currency next month, but no-one ever gave us those anyway.'

Pirbright Royalists were out in force when the world's most eligible bachelor drove through the village. Prince Charles was travelling to Portsmouth, where he has recently joined the Royal Navy, but was disappointed to find that the traditional daily ration of grog was abolished in July.
