SOMEWHERE OVER THE RAINBOW

Rainbows tend to appear at the end of a period of rain, or a storm when the sun emerges to spread its warmth and light over the fields, meadows and gardens. Over the past months, the rainbow has become a special symbol of thanks and hope that is universally recognised. It's a symbol of gratitude for the amazing work that so many people have done and are continuing to do for their own and the wider community.

Although they're hard to pick out individually, a rainbow is often regarded as incorporating just seven colours, but depending on their intensity they might actually include more than the 100 or so colours that a human eye can actually see. There are all sorts of definitions of what actually constitutes a 'colour', but some tell us that black and white are not colours (I remember being told at school that black and white were 'shades'); black being the absence of light and white the absence of colour. It's a fascinating question, but that's not really my point...

Which is, what 'colour' is light? It's not a question that I have an answer to, or at least not one that I understand! Although light is all around us in some form or another, we can't actually see it. But when we look at it through an object that splits it up, that's when all those wonderful colours become 'visible'. So my answer would be that light is all the colours...of a rainbow.

Jesus tells us in John's Gospel that he is 'the light of the world'; his light, too, is one that embraces *all* colours. In the story of the Flood, in Genesis, the rainbow appears at the end



of the rains as a symbol of God's mercy and peace. For some folk now, it's a symbol of hope that when we finally emerge from this strange and challenging time we will find a world that is more compassionate, less self-centred; we might have learned new things, experienced new things. We might have found our own pot of gold.




ELLACOMBE CHIMES

PIRBRIGHT PARISH COUNCIL

Groundwork continued throughout August with additional wooden security posts installed around the Little Green to match those installed in July. The new, more substantial posts have been funded by the Parish Council with some grant support from GBC. More posts will be installed around the triangle opposite the Cricketers to discourage some of the inconsiderate parking we have all witnessed recently and this will bring the works to completion.



Across the Green in the Playground, another grant aid project has come to fruition with 3 new soft-close, brightly coloured gates. These are designed

to increase safety, protecting children from knocks and bangs. A wonderful group of volunteers from the village have begun repainting the playground Horse – he will be refurbished and given a much needed touch of sparkle. The larger swing seats have also been replaced and several other items in the playground will be smartened up and brought back to life.

FOOTBALL, CRICKET AND SPORTS PAVILION

There has been a lot of activity on the village green on Friday evenings during the summer with the new youth cricket programme. Most Fridays have seen over 50 aspiring cricketers from as young as six, up to early teens, being introduced to the game by a team of experienced coaches led by Chris Smith. A team of 8 year olds played their first competitive game during August, defeating their Milford opponents. Another ten matches played in August, and the programme ended with a three day cricket camp. 85% of the children are from Pirbright Primary School, which augers well for the future.

The club has also enjoyed its best start to the shortened season, the opening game against Witley saw Pirbright plunder over 350 runs in 45 overs and bowl the visitors out for 72. Come to support the club in the next games on 5th and 6th September. It has also been good to see adult and junior football teams training hard in anticipation of the lockdown being relaxed and local football being allowed again. The one blot on the horizon is the state of the present

pavilion which is rapidly becoming unfit to use. It has no disabled access, only one female wc and no changing area for match officials. Sanitary ware is ancient and in poor condition and reflects badly on the club and the village. Raising the finance to replace the old pavilion is becoming imperative, otherwise cricket and football could disappear from the village. SEPTEMBER GARDENING TIPS from Wellie

Overgrown clumps of herbaceous perennials can be divided now. This will invigorate them and improve flowering and overall shape. Lift the clump and split the outer area of the clump, discarding the centre which will be the oldest part of the clump. Don't worry if you are not able to do this now, some can wait until next Spring, just make a note of which ones need attention. Continue to deadhead plants to prolong the display. Why not treat yourself to some Spring bulbs that you can scatter around the garden or put

into pots to give some brightness at the beginning of next year. Net ponds before the leaves start to fall. Lift the height on the mower and mow less frequently now. An autumn lawn feed can be applied now which will harden up your lawn. This is best done after the lawn has been scarified and aerated. If you want to lay a new lawn or reseed an area, this is a good time of year to do it. Cut or strim summer flowering meadows now after they have gone to seed. As you carry on harvesting your crop of vegetables from this year, you can get ahead by sowing some crops for next year. Some broad beans and peas can be sown now for an earlier crop next year, along with spring cabbages and



spinach (this might need to be covered from frosts). Onions and garlic can also be planted now for harvesting next year.
