#### **PIRBRIGHT SPORTS PAVILION**

The cricket and football clubs have already been training for some time and are looking forward to the new season with great enthusiasm. The funding process for the new pavilion is progressing with the Surrey County Council scheme and we are hoping to be included in the next stage, based on full submissions of applicants' plans. We have received very positive feedback for our project, including letters of support from the Army and local schools. However, we still need to generate more financial backing from the local community and would appreciate all donations, large or small. Although last summer was badly affected by the lockdown restrictions we introduced a programme of Youth Cricket, which was an outstanding success with more than 60 youngsters, including quite a few girls, between 6 and 13, most of whom have already signed up for 2021. We have also recruited a number of ladies during the lockdown and expect to form a team to play

### **GREEN PIRBRIGHT recycling for energy scheme**

Recycling has become a high priority, as we all strive to save our planet. However problems have arisen during recent lockdowns with the accumulation of waste waiting to be recycled, and concerns about it being dumped rather than used. Green Pirbright is a plan to reduce the carbon footprint of our waste by using it locally instead of paying for it to be taken away, and at the same time to benefit the local community by using it to generate electricity. Power from recycled waste could be used to supply Lord Pirbright's Hall, the surgery, the cricket Pavilion and houses around the village green. Unsightly bins in the village hall car park will be replaced with a much larger capacity



underground collection and processing plant where waste can be sorted and used to generate electricity. By the time the backlog in waste caused by the lockdown has been consumed, long term sustainable electricity generation will be in place using second hand fuel rods sourced on Amazon from Sellafield Parish Council.

# Just a thought.....

#### The changing face of 'normality'

The recent government road-map out of lock-down has given us all cause to hope that by the summer we will be back on the road to normal. But do we really want to go back to so-called 'normality', or is it time for us to let go of the past and move on to the brave new post-pandemic world and all that it has to offer humanity.

Normality for us at St Michael and All Angels Church is doing what we can to keep our community and parishioners safe. This means when in church sitting in marked seats, wearing masks, not singing, and being physically distanced from each other. Easter and Christmas 2020 have been extremely different from anything we have ever experienced. Our church, which would have been filled with over a hundred people can now hold no more than 23. But we look forward to worshipping together in full fellowship, even if it is within the context of a new 'normal'. The old 'normal' has meaning for those who understand it, but not for those new to the church. What is shared together now is the new 'normal' of online worship via Zoom, and 'hybrid' services in which such online worship is linked to worship in the church building. Clearly then, what we view as 'normal'

To everything there is a SEASON... and a time to every purpose under the HEAVENS Ecclesiastes 3:1 changes over time. Nothing stays the same. This past year, the changes have been rapid, but like most churches, St Michaels has embraced Zoom technology in its worship, not out of choice, but out of the desire to remain a faithful worshipping community.

Ecclesiastes 3, 1, tells us that 'there is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven'. This is a comforting reminder that God is in control; and though we may have mastered some things, e.g., technological changes, some things are beyond us and we need to let go and let God guide us. I believe that the time has come for us to prayerfully reflect on what we have learned during the past year of this pandemic so that we can take forward those things that will enrich the future mission of St Michael And All Angels as a vibrant church at the heart of the community.

We are planning the Church's road-map out of lock-down and, all being well, we will gradually return to worship in the church building including on Easter Sunday (4<sup>th</sup> April). We will also continue with the 'hybrid' services of Zoom and in-church worship into the foreseeable future. Please be assured that anyone worshipping with us online via zoom is as much a part of the congregation as anyone in the church building. **PIRBRIGHT HISTORIANS** 

This fine photo is of the Reverend Francis Owston, the 23<sup>rd</sup> recorded incumbent of Pirbright. Born in Yorkshire, he came here from Lancashire as a 31-year-old in 1851 with new wife Eliza. At this time, Vicars lived at the Manor House. Katherine Dobbs Halsey wrote of a visit there in 1865 – 'We made our way through a tangle of rank grass and weeds....and thought we had never seen a more overgrown and untidy little place. The inside was also very shabby and not clean & hardly furnished with chairs to go round.'

In the mid-1870s, a new vicarage was built on the site of former Burrow Hill Farm (until recently Pirbright Surgery with parts of the old farmhouse still incorporated). The Owstons, after living at the Cemetery for a few years, dwelt at the new vicarage from 1878 until going to Essex in 1889, where he died 3 years later 'deeply regretted by all



who had known him'. A keen local historian, he left a volume of manuscript notes, sadly, from our point of view, now lost. Mary Cawthorn, who came here in 1885, also had recollections – The Vicar, Mr Owston, was a very handsome and venerable looking man. Occasionally he made us very nervous by pausing in the middle of his sermon and asking the Churchwarden to fetch a tumbler with some brown liquid from the vestry: or he would fix his eyes on some boys at the back of the church and say: "Boys, if you do not behave better I shall request Mr Churchwarden to remove you."

# CUNNINGHAM HOUSE - what kind of home are we?

There are many options for older people's accommodation, so here's a quick guide to what they mean, and where Cunningham House sits in these options:

- Nursing Care offers 24 hour medical and personal care.

- Care/Residential homes offer 24 hour personal care. Some specialise in dementia care.

- Warden assisted housing offers individual flats where residents live independently in a self contained flatlet.

- Cunningham House is classed as supported housing. We don't provide care, but some residents employ a carer to help with basic bath/showering and laundry; residents have a 24 hour care line pendant to call for help in an emergency; home cooked meals are

provided and bills and maintenance are taken care of, and most importantly, they are not alone. So if an older person isn't ready for a care or nursing home, but needs more support and companionship than living alone offers, we may be the perfect option! *Lucy 01483 488751*

## **APRIL GARDENING TIPS from Wellie**

**Lawns** – now is the time to start looking after your lawn. Every gardener knows trimmed edges can make all the difference! Apply a spring lawn feed now. Any bumps and hollows on lawns can be repaired by peeling back the turf and either adding or removing soil. Sowing new lawns, or reseeding patches, can be started this month, depending on the weather.

**Flower garden** – stake perennials before it's too late, why not create attractive willow or hazel structures. Feed and spray roses, why not try an organic garlic formula? Tackle weeds now before they start to get a hold In the garden. Feed borders with a general purpose fertiliser. Prune penstemons and other slightly tender plants such as Teucrium

now. Finish cutting back any dead foliage on perennials and grasses to make way for new growth.

**Fruit and Veg** - April is ideal to sow a wide range of vegetables directly into prepared drills, including carrots, turnips, peas, broad beans, spinach and lettuce. Plant second early potatoes early in the month. Harvest asparagus spears when they are no more than 18cm tall. At the end of the month tender vegetables like French and runner beans, squashes and courgettes can be sown indoors. Spray emerging peach and



nectarine leaves to prevent peach leaf curl. Feed raspberry canes, fruit bushes and fruit trees to encourage good crops.
