

Both the Parish Council and the Church sent messages of condolence to Her Majesty the Queen and the Royal Family on behalf of the community of Pirbright, on the sad news of

the death of The Duke of Edinburgh. The messages can be read in full on the Church and Parish Council websites. On the announcement of the death of the Duke on 9th April, the church tenor bell was tolled 108 times - nine for a man, and 99 for his age. The bell tolled again for his funeral on 17th April. Life's Full of Ups and Downs

Over the past year many of us have taken to walking as a form of exercise, and Pirbright is truly blessed with some wonderful walks. There really is little to compare with being in the fresh air, whatever the temperature, enjoying the sights and sounds of nature all around us. Much of the walking in and around Pirbright is fairly flat, any hills or slopes are gently undulating and not overly challenging. For more demanding walks we have to go further afield; my own favourite place for walks is the beautiful island of lona, and one of the walks I enjoy is scaling $Dun \hat{I}$, the highest point on the island, from whose summit on a good day one can see for miles

As we get older it's rather more of a struggle getting to the top; it can be easy to slip or miss a step and take a (somewhat undignified!) tumble, and I'm usually panting a bit when I get there. Coming down again is much easier, and seems to take half the time it took to go up. But it's still a little perilous in places and care is essential. Uphill can be a struggle, downhill is usually a lot easier. Just like life itself.

So it has been for so many of us over the



past year of lockdown: mostly an uphill struggle trying to deal with the 'new reality'. Sadly, for a lot of folk it must have been even harder than that, especially if they've lost their job or a loved one, and there must have been times when some will have thought, 'why go on, I just can't do this'. For others it will have been difficult to keep focused on the goal of getting to the top of the hill and be able to say, 'I've made it'. But get there we can and will.

However, there seem to have been far too many folk who have been determined make an over-hasty start on the easy part – the downhill. It may be that some of them have tripped and fallen in their haste, either contracting Covid-19 themselves or unwittingly passing it on to others in their eagerness to return to 'normality'. So it was with Jesus: from what was arguably the key moment in his ministry, the Sermon on the Mount, on to Jerusalem to be fêted and acclaimed by the crowds on Palm Sunday and then on to his crucifixion on another hill as we remembered just a few weeks ago at Easter.

Discipleship, being, or doing our best to be a follower of Jesus, is likewise not an easy one; it's sometimes difficult to stick with it, as Jesus tells us in Matthew's Gospel, 'narrow [is] the road that leads to life, and only a few find it' (Matthew 7:14).

Life is indeed full of ups and downs. Now, as life is slowly returning to 'normal', we just need to take care to look where we're going. Getting to the top and down again safely will be so worth it! *Revd Gary Williamson*

Annual Parish Meeting

The Parish Council held its 124th Assembly of Electors on 26th April 2021 with presentations from Lt Col Shamus Kelly ATP Pirbright, James Herd of Surrey Wildlife Trust and Cllr Keith Whitham Surrey County Council. Councillors David Woollett and Elaine Eason also spoke about specific projects the Parish Council had undertaken over the last financial year and about what the role of a Councillor involves. The



Chairman, Steve Fidgett, opened the meeting with an explanation of activities and of how the precept had been spent last year, including maintenance of the Green and associated facilities.

A further presentation was given by the President and Vice President of Pirbright Cricket Club who are looking for support from parishioners on the new multipurpose pavilion that is planned to replace the current structure which is sadly no longer fit for purpose. It is hoped that in addition to pledges from local people, that additional funding will come from Surrey County Council from 'Your Fund Surrey'. As explained at the meeting, the number of votes by members of the public will make a huge difference as to how the project is rated and ultimately its chances of success.

In April, the Army Training Centre in Pirbright was the site of intensive rehearsals for the funeral of the Duke of Edinburgh. It appears that the Duke of Edinburgh made two visits to Pirbright in April 1956, travelling by helicopter to visit the 'Government Research Centre', now The Pirbright Institute, on April 11th, and returning to inspect the Training Centre of the Welsh Guards, of which he was colonel in Chief, the next day. It has been a very long, hard winter and we have more reason than usual to celebrate the arrival of Spring. And now that we are all allowed to mix a little more out of doors, what could be better than a traditional Maypole Dance! So with a bit of help from the bellringers we dug out the old Maypole and roped in any children we could find. At first all went well, the girls skipped to the right, and the boys skipped to the left, holding their ribbons and bobbing over and under as they passed. Then they all changed directions, boys to the left and girls to the right. That's when things stared getting a little confused, and it was the point at which I realised I should have made sure, before we started, that everyone knew their right from their left. It took 30 minutes and a small surgical procedure to free some of the smallest infants from the tightly woven lattice. So if the Churchwardens ask you haven't seen me!

MAY GARDENING TIPS from Wellie

When I wrote this column last year I talked about how we were all at home, keeping social distances and struggling to get any seeds to sow, compost or plants for our gardens. A year on, we have a little more freedom, and garden centres have been open, but even they are struggling to source stock due to covid and Brexit. One thing is clear though, our gardens have kept growing and are not affected by any of these issues, and in fact they might even have had a bit more tender loving care this past year. Some things you might like to do this month- Earth up potatoes. French and runner beans and sweetcorn can be sown outside now. Start removing side shoots from tomatoes. These shoots can be put in a glass of water to root then planted up to make more tomato plants that will fruit later on. Hang pheromone traps in apple trees. Put straw around your strawberries and net them before the birds get in and enjoy them.

Plant out summer bedding....after risks of frosts have passed. Keep on top of those weeds, either hoe or hand weed them. Don't let them set seed, otherwise you will be

encouraging more weeds into your garden. For example, the annual weed shepherd's purse can produce 2-3,000 seeds per plant. Mow lawns regularly now, apply a weed, feed and moss treatment if not already done. Prune spring-flowering shrubs such as Choisya and Ribes after flowering. Tie in climbing and rambling roses as near to horizontal



as possible. Trim back Alyssum and Aubrieta after flowering to encourage fresh arowth.
