Just a thought.....

After eighteen months of living with Covid-19, we are all hoping for a return to some form of normality. This virus has impacted all of us in different ways. Our children and young people hope that, by September, there will be a return to the normal school or academic year. Couples have had to change their wedding plans; families have delayed their children's baptism into the Christian faith and others have had to delay the interment of ashes of loved ones. Like many churches up and down the country we, at St Michael and All Angels church, are looking to the future with great hope, but what does such hope look like?

Hope has many faces. It can seem like a list of wishes. It can be sheer optimism, when we take risks in the belief that we will achieve the desired outcomes. It can be aspirational, finding out what really matters and trying to make it happen. Hope may come across as having an open mind, trusting that things will work out somehow, we just do not know how or when. Different situations may demand different types of hope, but I suspect that we have all experienced these different types of hope over the past year.

However, there is another kind of hope which encompasses all of these but is built on a solid foundation. This is the hope that we have in God. In Isaiah 61, the prophet



describes the Lord's promise of hope to those who had been exiled in Babylon. Everything had been destroyed by their captors and, after generations in captivity, they had little but the stories passed down to them. When they heard what Isaiah was saying, 'that the Spirit of the Lord was upon him, and he was anointed to bring good news to the broken hearted, to restore the captives, and the oppressed, and to comfort the mourning', the people began to hope again. They realised that they should not worry because what was lost would be

restored to them. God liberated them and

would provide for all their needs.

In some ways, it feels as if we have also been living in exile this past year. Our patience has been tested like gold in the refiner's fire, and although we will face challenges as we emerge from the final stage of lockdown, we still have much to be thankful for. Having faith in Jesus, our loving and compassionate Saviour, gives us inner peace, a sense of freedom and reason for confident hope, strength and stability as we transition out of lockdown.

Like the prophet Isaiah, we too are called to bring words of comfort and hope to our brothers and sisters who are overwhelmed and struggling: mentally, socially, financially emotionally and physically. On behalf of all at St Michael and All Angels Church, I would like to say 'thank you' to everyone in our parish for all that you have done to help others during this unprecedented time in our current history. Farewell and welcome The Chairman and members of the Parish Council wish to thank Cllr Jon Hallam for his services to the Parish over the last six years. Jon has moved out of the Parish and can therefore no longer serve as a Councillor. Also at this time, the Chairman and members have welcomed Cllr Mark Watson onto the Parish Council. Mark, who has lived in the village for over 24 years and is a retired solicitor, was elected as a Councillor on 13th July 2021 to replace Cllr Swinney. Mark brings a wealth of local knowledge and expertise having served on the board of Cunningham House for many years.

Capital projects The Parish Council has also secured funding to undertake a number of important capital projects over the next few months. These will include major resurfacing works in the playground to upgrade the worn safety tiles around several pieces of equipment. Along with the welcome return of the "Volunteer Dads", the playground will be a bright and inviting place for children. A new picnic table is to be installed in the recreation area of Lord Pirbright's Hall and the football pitch will receive some much needed drainage works to enable it to be used by our

very own Pirbright Football Club throughout the wetter months of the season. The well trodden Blind Lane footpath, running between School Lane and the Church, has been improved to remove a couple of boggy areas and make it more pedestrian friendly and the Parish Council would like to thank Guildford Borough Council for their support for these projects, which will hopefully enhance the village for everyone.

PIRBRIGHT HISTORIANS:

It was good to read in last month's newsletter that the Fox has reopened, some 160 years after its building in 1862, on land called Gander Hill. Up to 1881 it was rented by brewers W & G Simonds of Reading, when they bought the freehold. The following year, James Sayers came as tenant with wife Emma. This newspaper cutting reports a spot of bother he had in 1885. Two Sayers daughters were born here and their father was to remain as publican until his death in 1904. Emma carried on until 1911, when Devonborn Walter Edwin Liley arrived with wife Edith and it is almost certainly him in shirt-sleeves with his wife in this lovely old 1919 photo. Another long-term resident, he was tenant through two world wars, dying in 1947. The Fox stayed in Simonds' hands at least until after WW2.

AN OBSTINATE TRIO. — William Stevens, Richard Stevens, and Edward Warner, young men, of Pirbright, were summoned for assaulting Tames Sayers, landlord of the Fox.—Richard Stevens pleaded guilty, and the two other defendants not guilty.—The defendants repeatedly refused to leave the house when complainant told them that it was 10 o'clock, and when he attempted to eject Warner the other defendants struck him in the face and throttled him. Complainant said he did not wish to press the charge against the defendants.—The Bench ordered Richard and William Stevens to be committed for 14 days' imprisonment, and Warner was fined £1.

CHURCHYARD CHRONICLES

Summer is here at last, and along with everyone else this year, the denizens of the Churchyard are planning a staycation this year. Camping doesn't have quite the novelty when one lives in the wild anyway so we all thought we would try house swapping.

The mice were thrilled with their five star accommodation in the cosy rabbit warren, with enough spare bedrooms for all the baby mice and some welcome peace and quiet for their parents. The squirrels offered their dreys to the rabbits, then sat back and laughed as the bunnies tried unsuccessfully to climb the trees to reach them. The rabbits had the last laugh though, as the squirrels bagged the badger's sett, only to get hopelessly lost in the pitch dark, meandering tunnels. The birds felt quite at home in the

Wherever you are, enjoy your summer. Yellow Rabbit



Now is the time to summer prune your wisteria, which will have put on lots of wispy tendrils. Unless they are pruned twice a year, it will grow very large and soon outgrow its allotted space. Cut the wispy growth back to five or six buds from the main stem. Once your lavender bushes have finished flowering they can be given a good hair cut to get them back into shape. This can be done by reducing the section of green growth that exists between the wood and the bottom of the flower stem. French lavender needs to be treated slightly differently, they just need to be dead headed throughout the summer.

Keep on dead heading to prolong the flower display in your garden, and don't forget your hanging baskets as well. Climbing and rambling roses that do not repeat flower can be pruned once the flowers are over.

Raise ripening pumpkins and squashes off the soil to prevent rotting. Plant new strawberries now, either as bought plants or detached runners. Cut down fruited canes of summer raspberries after they have fruited. Pinch out the tips of your runner beans once they have reached the top of their support.

This encourages side-shooting and more beans at a manageable height. Lift and dry onions and shallots once their foliage has bent over and turned yellow. Keep picking runner and French beans to prevent them from setting seed.

Lawn growth is slowing down now so raise the cutting height of your lawn mower to help your grass.

Don't feed your lawn with a high nitrogen fertiliser now as it will encourage lush growth that can be damaged by autumn weather.
