First Impressions

I love books, and although I usually take my e-reader on holiday I still prefer the look and feel of a real printed book. What is it that attracts you to a book? The author, perhaps, or the title, or maybe just the look of the sleeve? Personally, I will probably take all three criteria into consideration. But the point is, until I've started to read (or even finished) my book it's difficult to know whether I will enjoy it or not – and I have given up on a few. So is that maybe how you tend to judge a book, by its title...by the cover? If that's the case, how do you judge people? By how they look, or perhaps by what they do? And do you sometimes

change your mind once you've got to know

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them better? Or do you still base your opinion on your *first impression*?

I must admit I used to do that...'don't like the look of him/her/them'. Being a naturally reserved type (officially!) I would just not engage with the person/s concerned, which has occasionally been embarrassing for whoever else I have been with. Well, let's be honest, it was just downright rude. PIRBRIGHT PARISH COUNCIL

Stoney Castle – the Clean-up Begins The Council wish to thank Gordon Jackson and Cllr Keith Witham who have fought to bring an end to the waste activity and occupation of Stoney Castle for many years. The site was finally secured through a multi-agency collaboration in late July and is currently in the process of being cleared and cleaned up. Over 2,500 tonnes of illegal waste has been removed and substantial new barriers have been installed to prevent further dumping.

Pirbright Pond The Council have completed the first stage of works on the pond which had become somewhat overgrown. (PHOTO) Although brambles and overgrowth give essential cover to ducklings and the many broods of Egyptian goslings born in the churchyard and raised at the pond each year, it must be maintained to stop leaf litter polluting the water and from becoming completely enclosed and obscured from view. The emphasis will remain on the pond serving as an oasis of sanctuary to wildfowl and insects of all shapes and sizes but it is hoped that a balance can be struck between a manicured pond and a wildlife friendly refuge.



Thanks to Arthur ('Onk') Cheeseman, I'm happy to set the record straight on the Perefrith sign (June Newsletter). Onk had the mammoth task of building the base from 3^{1/2} tons of Pirbright stone collected by the 1st Pirbright Scouts. The 3cwt post came from a dead oak at Furzehill Place and Scott Caie fashioned the wrought iron sign (Perifrith=Pear field). The idea came from a commuter train conversation between Michael Boyd & then Parish Council Chairman, Stan Dabbs; Bruce Englefield being responsible for the design & woodwork. Hidden somewhere in the cairn is a sealed metal box with the names & details of many residents and 'a few other things', such as a Jim Rice shop price list, a copy of the newsletter & the Surrey Advertiser. Onk's lips are sealed as to its whereabouts, so an efficient metal detector and a few days labour would be needed to discover this treasure!

SEPTEMBER GARDENING TIPS from Wellie

Make the most of the warmth in the air and soil, before the temperatures drop at the beginning of Autumn. Some Broad beans and pea varieties (such as Aquadulce Claudia and Pea 'Douce Provence') can be sown now for an earlier crop next year, along with spring cabbages and spinach (which might need to be covered from frosts). Onions and garlic can also be planted now for harvesting next year. Take cuttings of tender perennials such as fuchsias and Pelargoniums before they get caught by the frost. Start planting bulbs for spring display now. Tulips are better left until November, but daffodils need to be planted now. As a quick rule for depth of planting, bulbs should be planted 3

times the height of the bulb. Lift the height on the mower and mow less frequently now. An autumn lawn feed can be applied now which will harden up your lawn. This is best done after the lawn has been scarified and aerated. If you want to lay a new lawn or reseed an area, this is a good time of year to do this. Divide herbaceous perennials now if they have outgrown their space or are looking tired. Doing this will improve their flowering

and shape and invigorate them. Net ponds now before the autumn leaves start to fall.
