THE RAWLINS CLUB IS 70!



Portrait of the Church...

Many years ago, the Church I was leading held an Away Day to explore a vision for the church. Two of the questions asked were: What two words best describe your church? And what do you think God is calling us, the church, to be? Responses to the first question included 'a tree with wide-spread branches', 'a ministering angel', and 'a sleeping tiger'. Responses to the second question included being 'visible', 'rooted', and 'to spread the Good News'.

More recently, I was looking at images in the book, 'Pirbright in Art: Portrait of a Surrey Village', which contains many beautiful images by local artists. It also demonstrates a richness and diversity of talent, which are truly inspirational. But it is the images of St Michael and All Angels Church that reminded me of the above-mentioned day.

In the images, the church building is captured dramatically in watercolour, oil, acrylic, and oil and pen. For example, it is shown in the winter, covered by snow, yet also basking in a fiery winter sun. It sits



beneath blue skies, grey stormy clouds, or stands proudly, but partly hidden by trees. It also acts as a backdrop to Church Cottage. Some of the images show green grass and shrubs; and the tower seems to compete with the tree growing behind it.

In one image a man makes his way with great determination to the entrance of the church; and, in another, a couple holds hands while walking in what seems to be a leisurely stroll. These three people show that the church is not just a building. It is made up of all sorts of people, some able to take a leisurely stroll while others may have to struggle to be there. The good thing is that we do not have to leave our struggles behind. We can bring them with us and lay them at the foot of the cross of Jesus. To anyone moved to worship in this spiritual space or simply to visit it, St Michael's is a place that accepts all people.

The changing seasons, from spring and summer through to autumn and winter, reminds us that although the seasons change, God is unchangeable. Thus, St Michael's remains a visible sign of the Kingdom of God in Pirbright. It is rooted in God's love, peace, joy, consolation, forgiveness, and hope. So, as we recover from this pandemic, let us continue to reach out to each other and share in the joys, challenges, struggles of life. And yes! Let us share the gospel, point people to Jesus, and transform lives. *Rev Bev*

Peter recently installed a defibrillator for public use at his home at Wayback, between the Cricketers and Fulk's butchers. He brings a wealth of local knowledge to the Council, having lived in the village since 1993 and ran a local fencing company for 25 years.

All's Fair on Pirbright Green: Members of the Council sat on the Summer Fair Committee and worked hard to give everyone a fun filled day out and a sense of normality for a moment on the 4th September. It was one of the busiest events we have hosted and it will not be long before preparations begin on next year's Fair. The Queen's Platinum Jubilee: In 2022 the Council will be taking part in celebrations to mark the Queen's 70th year as Monarch. The Green will host one of the nationwide beacons on 2nd June 2022 and

Pirbright Horticultural Society will take part in The Queen's Green Canopy, a unique

tree planting initiative created to mark the Jubilee following the motto 'Plant a Tree for the Jubilee'. A Rowan has been selected for the occasion.

Road Safety measures have begun on Avenue De Cagny with Surrey Highways installing a dropped curb to make for a safer pedestrian crossing at this busy junction with the Guildford Road. LORD PIRBRIGHT'S HALL

Hall operations are gradually building back to former levels, with existing hirers returning and new groups starting. Social hirings are also beginning, with bookings for almost every weekend.

Soffits and bargeboards: volunteers have now repaired and repainted these on the west side of the Hall as a community project by Dan from Chameleon. It needed a cherry picker which was also free of charge, and the job took three days.

Replacement cooker: as they wind up the financial affairs of the Peribus, its management committee donated £3,650 of the remaining reserves to Lord Pirbright's Hall to pay for the purchase of a new electric cooker and removing the old one. The first step will be the addition of a new power cable to enable its installation.

PIRBRIGHT HISTORIANS

A new cricket pavilion would be a fitting memorial to the late Derek Bytheway. Thanks to his & many others' enthusiasm & energy, the club is thriving as never before. The first cricket record we have is a press cutting of a successful season in 1845, but surely the game would have been played here before then. By 1857, the team had become the Pirbright Invincibles when they met the Knaphill Heroes. For many years the game was played on the ground between Lord Pirbright's Hall and the White Hart, but moved to its present position sometime before 1931, when Club President, Major Basil Fletcher, presented a new pavilion. In July 1957 it had reached the end of its life, with the opening of the current building, a gift of Sir Adrian Jarvis, of Admirals Walk House. The photo is of R.W.V. Robins (left), former Middlesex & England Test cricketer, Stan Garland (club captain) & Sir Adrian (right), apparently with the older pavilion behind and, inset, an 1870s Pirbright C.C. belt.



OCTOBER GARDENING TIPS from Wellie

Sow sweet peas indoors now for an early flowering next year. Tall shrubs that will be hard pruned in the Spring, eg Lavatera and Buddleja, can be pruned by half now to reduce wind rock. Cut down herbaceous perennials that have finished flowering and are looking untidy. Lift and divide overgrown clumps now. Start raking up leaves and composting those that are healthy. Complete scarifying, aerating and topdressing lawns. Give wildflower meadows a final cut. New lawns can still be turfed this month. Net ponds before too many leaves fall into them. Plant autumn onion sets and garlic. Apply grease bands to fruit trees to protect them from winter moth. Sow batches of broad beans and peas for early cropping next year. Cut fruited stems of blackberries and autumn raspberries down to the ground. Clean out bird baths now and make sure feeders are replenished

to fatten up birds for the winter. Don't be too tidy in the garden, piles of leaves and stems of dead perennials provide shelter for insects and other invertebrates.
