Just a thought.....

War Games

As a young boy I used to enjoy listening to my parents and grandparents talking about their experiences during the war which had only ended five years before. As I grew older and became more aware of what was happening in the Cold War world, I used to have nightmares which featured fleets of Soviet bombers heading our way to send me (and the rest of the world) to nuclear oblivion. This was the age of mutually assured destruction. MAD.

It never happened, fortunately, but two events still linger in my mind from the 1960s: the 1962 Cuban missile crisis, when the whole world held its breath; and a film made in 1965 originally intended to be shown on the BBC, but which was deemed too intense and violent to broadcast. That film was 'The War Game', and I eventually saw it at a special showing at my school in 1969.

It was indeed very realistic...and very frightening.



Just a few weeks ago I heard an interview with a young lad of about 10, talking about video games. Something he said I found truly chilling: 'You get into it and then you start killing people'. Researchers have found that 'war gaming' can inspire and nurture an ethos of nationalism, radicalism, racism, homophobia, misogyny – just some of the negatives that wars, past and present, are fought over.

War is *not* a game. People who are killed stay dead. War is *real*. War is *terrifying*. Wars are *still happening*.

For over 100 years November 11th has been a day when we have remembered those who have sacrificed their lives or suffered horrendous and life-changing physical and mental injuries in the service of their country. To some people they are simply names engraved in stone on a memorial. But those names are engraved for ever in the hearts of their families and comrades. It is vital that as the numbers of those who fought and died in the two major wars of the 20th century dwindle, we should remember the young men and women – someone's sons and daughters, husbands and wives, who have given and continue to give their lives to protect us – you and me – from the horrors of war.

We all owe them our grateful thanks. This Remembrance Sunday that is the very least we can do.

PIRBRIGHT PARISH COUNCIL

Spare a Thought: November is a time of falling leaves and the Parish Council would remind residents to please spare a thought for pedestrians if you own a hedge or tree on or near a pavement or footpath. Hedges will encroach and make passing with a buggy difficult, leaves left on a pavement can become slippery and dangerous for the young and old alike. We are fortunate in Pirbright to have regular garden waste bin collections, something our neighbouring villages have not had with Woking's collections being suspended, so please make use of the garden waste collections and keep our village safe underfoot and looking its best.

Village Green works: following work on the village pond, PPC have completed additional work to clear drainage ditches on the east side of the village green using a local contractor, they have also repaired the old drainage in the sports fields which had become clogged and needed supplementing. As we head into winter, PPC is also speaking to contractors to undertake essential tree works on the village green, around Lord Pirbright's Hall and recreation ground to address a number of pressing tree management issues. With the increase in pests and a changing climate, some of our trees are in failing health and require cutting back or removal in the interests of public safety. We are looking at suitable replacements that are climate tolerant and

will be undertaking these works over the coming months.



PIRBRIGHT HISTORIANS

Energy crises are nothing new. For centuries the sole source of heat for the working classes & deserving poor was turves; like peat, dug from the moor, stacked in the spring & carted in the autumn. Calorific value was low, so thousands were needed in the turf houses attached to most cottages. From at least 1675, there had been simmering tension between the Glynne family, Lords of the Manor, holder of the rights, their tenants & the Vestry, accustomed since Time Immemorial to use (but not cut) the fuel. Matters boiled over in the 1720s & 30s with clashes between bailiffs & locals, calming down only after 1739, when Solomon Dayrolles came to Henley Park. Even after the coming of the canal & railways, bringing coal, some turf cutting took place, stopping eventually in 1878 with the War Department purchase of the commons. One of the last turf houses to survive is this one at Stanford Cottage in the 1920s.

NOVEMBER GARDENING TIPS from Wellie

I thought this month, instead of talking about what needs doing in the garden I would talk about petrol and using it in garden machinery. On the 1st September unleaded fuel was changed from E5 (5 % ethanol) to E10 (10% ethanol). The reason for the change is to help tackle climate change and to reduce CO2 emissions. It is estimated that the greener fuel could reduce CO2 emissions by 750,000 tonnes per year. Which is all great, but it makes the petrol unsuitable for some cars and is also not ideal fuel for powering gardening equipment. The higher amounts of ethanol can cause erosion and engine faults. The reason that the petrol could be more corrosive for garden machinery than cars is because people often leave garden machinery sitting around in between uses. Reading through different information it is suggesting that you put E5 (super unleaded fuel) in your garden equipment, but be warned that not all garages sell this petrol now. Also, make sure that you drain the fuel out of all your equipment before storing it for periods longer than 30 days, and always use fresh fuel.

If you are at all unsure talk to a lawnmower specialist.
