ENERGY SAVING

With the lifting of the electricity price cap this month, the cost of energy is a serious challenge to all, including the Parish Council. In a measure to save energy and reduce light pollution, the council have proposed switching street lights off at 10pm. Since they are on the same grid, this will mean that School Lane and Pirbright Tunnel Lane traffic lights will also shut down at the same time, but it is expected that motorists will adjust quickly and alternative routes can be signposted.

The White Hart and Cricketers have confirmed that they will continue to serve customers after 10pm by candlelight, which many customers feel will add greatly to the atmosphere. Candles will not be permitted in the Village Hall but lettings may continue after 10pm if hirers bring their own torches. In Church Lane, the on-demand lights along the churchyard wall will only stay on for half the current time. Trials show that pedestrians will only need to speed up to a gentle run to cover the distance between the Lych Gate and the war memorial before the lights go out, and the Surgery have confirmed that the extra exercise will be a health bonus. As both the church and village hall clocks are wound electronically they will now only strike alternate hours to save power, the church clock will strike the odd hours, the village hall the even hours. Energy saving measures come into force on 1st April.

Just a thought.....

The Burdens We Carry

At this time of year, our thoughts usually turn to upcoming holidays, meeting up with friends and relatives over the Easter break – let's face it, happy thoughts. Although we may well be thinking of joyful happy things this year, at the time of writing, the world is holding its breath at the situation in Eastern Europe and the suffering of the people of Ukraine. Shortly before the outbreak of World War 2 our then Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain chose to downplay the Nazi invasion of Czechoslovakia (now the Czech Republic and Slovakia) by referring to "a quarrel in a faraway land between people of which we know nothing."

Apart from its actual physical size, the world we live in now is in nearly every way much, much smaller than it was back in 1938. Ukraine and Russia are not faraway lands, and we know a lot more about them than our forebears did. That said, I'm sure we are all thankful that the situation in Ukraine hasn't – yet – directly threatened *our* lives, or the lives of *our* loved ones. But there have been thousands of people here in the UK who have been doing whatever they can to lighten the burden that is weighing so heavily on the millions of refugees who have been fleeing their homes seeking safety and shelter.

For the Christian Church, Easter is arguably the most important annual festival, and of

course it's only right that we should all enjoy some time with families and friends (not to mention chocolate...). But although the first Faster does indeed remind us that Jesus Christ was raised from the dead, that first Easter began with his trial, his abandonment by his followers, his ridicule, his suffering and finally his death. A horribly cruel, agonisingly painful and slow death. During Lent, I re-read a wonderful little book by the now Archbishop of York (Stephen Cottrell, 2008, The Things He Carried, London: SPCK) where I found the following: 'He treads a path of suffering, step by painful step...He carries the battered woundedness of everyone who has been trapped and convicted by the foul depravity of all the awfulness we do to each other... ... [But] there is a light flickering within him that will not be snuffed out...not when he [is] ridiculed, forsaken, defeated.' So as we rejoice this Easter, let us also be mindful that our brothers and sisters in Ukraine may well have precious little to rejoice in. Let us be with them in spirit. Let us pray with the world for an end to their suffering, for *their* light not to be snuffed **Revd Gary Williamson** out

PIRBRIGHT HISTORIANS

With the plight of Ukrainian refugees much in mind, during his ongoing research on the Heath Mill area, Richard Hartley has discovered Heath Cottage was probably a haven for Jewish refugees prior to WW2. In the late 1920s, with the writing on the wall, Bessie & John Huber fled Vienna for Send Marsh. Divorced in 1934, Bessie purchased Heath Cottage & there is a strong possibility she provided a safe haven for other Jews, as in 1939 she is living there with her brother & four others. Her father died at Treblinka in 1942 & a brother in Belarus. Bessie continued to live there until 1981, when she was 88 & died two years later. APRIL GARDENING TIPS from Wellie

(and congratulations on achieving her Post-Graduate Diploma in Garden Design)

Hydrangea flowerheads left for winter protection can be cut off now. Remove old flowerheads from mophead and lace cap hydrangeas to just above a pair of buds, cut out any thin, weak stems around the base of the plant and remove one or two of the largest, oldest stems as low down as possible to the base to promote new shoots. Hydrangea serrata and quercifolia are lightly pruned, just removing old flower heads. Hydrangea paniculata and arborescens, which flower on this year's growth can be pruned back harder without losing this year's flowers. Check roses for blackspot, remove any infected leaves and treat with a fungicide. Sow hardy annuals and wildflowers in gaps in the garden. Cut back Penstemons now. Take a close look before pruning, some produce a mass of new shoots at the base of the plant, so old stems should be cut back close to the soil. When new growth is visible only along the stems, trim them to 15-20cm from the ground, just above a shoot. Encourage bushy growth on Marguerites,

Pelargoniums and Fuchsias in the greenhouse, by pinching out the tips. Spray weeds on driveways and paths this month when they are actively growing. Use a spring/summer feed on the lawn (it should be high in nitrogen to encourage strong leafy green swards) Carry on sowing vegetables directly into prepared soil including carrots, turnip, peas, broadbeans, spinach and lettuce. Sow tender courgettes,

cucumbers and pumpkins in a heated propagator or sunny window sill. Plant out autumn sown sweet peas.
