

#### **CONGRATULATIONS TO PIRBRIGHT CRICKET CLUB !**

Pirbright Cricket Club was awarded ECB Clubmark status in July, which is a fantastic achievement. This shows that the way the club is run, children are looked after, the procedures in place and the offer provided are ranked in the top category of clubs in the UK.



The club has gone from having 40 playing members in 2019 to 235 today with 11 youth players on waiting lists. Village cricket is thriving and Surrey Cricket and England cricket have acknowledged the growth by agreeing to support the club with grant funding to install a non-turf wicket along side the square – something the Parish Council have approved subject to planning permission.

Youth activities have finished for the summer culminating in 3 different award ceremonies to acknowledge the 124 players in 11 teams over 148 matches. The leagues have almost finished and these are the current standings.

## Just a thought.....

#### THE TREE OF LIFE

Here in Pirbright we are lucky to be surrounded by trees: in fields, meadows, gardens and the local heathland ranges. We are now only too well aware that trees are a crucial factor in our continued survival, soaking up the carbon dioxide that we all breathe out, absorbing it from the air and either storing it or releasing small amounts of it back into the atmosphere. Trees are essential to life: our very own **tree** (s) of life...

I have always been fascinated by the Vikings, whose culture is now recognised as having been much more sophisticated than their traditional image as fierce warriors might suggest. In Viking mythology, *Yggdrasil* – the Tree of Life – spread its branches all over their world, which had nine realms, each of which was home to a different form of life.

It occurs to me that the idea of a 'tree of life' might very well be applied to religious belief. All living trees grow from a tiny seed and spread their branches away from and beyond their roots. Some branches may



wither and die, others flourish and grow more offshoots, spreading themselves in different directions. All the time, however, all the branches remain firmly part of the original tree. Every season, the branches shed their leaves and seeds, which may then go on to start and nourish new growth elsewhere.

If we think about it, that's exactly how belief works: out of one central point branches grow, spread and flourish. Branches may wither and die, but the main stem remains firm and supports and nourishes its branches. Different faiths may have different names for their core, and some faiths have a multitude of different branches. In the United States, for instance, according to one source<sup>1</sup> there are 'at least' 33,000 Christian denominations. That's some tree!

By a remarkable coincidence, *Yggdrasil* had three roots. Strange...the Christian God is a triune God, the Holy Trinity – Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Over the past couple of months our trees (and gardens – and some of us) have been struggling to deal with the severe drought and heat that we are being told is now our 'normal' summer weather. So let's do what we can to keep *our* tree of life alive, no matter what species it is, or how many branches away from the tree's heart it may be. *Revd Gary Williamson*

## **PIRBRIGHT PARISH COUNCIL**

#### Parking Restrictions in the Village

In 2017, residents requested that the PC seek parking restrictions (double yellow lines) around the village. Last year, GBC agreed to finance the implementation and enforcement of these restrictions and the plans progressed. The consultation is now live and is open for public comment. ## Fishing in the Pond

With the consistent dry weather the Clerk looked into removing all the goldfish from the pond who were struggling with the equivalent of someone pulling out their plug. Both Surrey Wildlife Trust and the Environment Agency advised against saving them or trying to top up the pond



with gallons of chlorinated water. RoSPA advised against entering the pond due to the risk of Weil's disease (much to the Clerk's dismay having previously directed her husband to wade in to put up signage when the rats were about!). Undeterred the Clerk found a CEFAS operator who agreed to come and rescue the fish at a cost to the council of £350. All the fish caught will now live happy lives in purpose-built ponds and lakes. The Fisheries Officer has advised that a pond **without** fish would create greater biodiversity and provide a habitat



for newts and frogs, and this suggestion will be encouraged with the pond being such a feature of the village.

## Green Hut and Committee Room

The Parish Council and Lord Pirbright's Hall office is proposing to move from the Green Hut to the Committee Room, both of which will be given a new lease of life as multi-purpose spaces, available for use by community groups. This helps update the facilities offered by LPH and address the needs of our community and secure the future of an increasingly busy and successful village hall at a time of rapidly rising costs. Victoria and the LPH Trustees would like to extend a huge thank you to all the regular and loyal hirers for their support and patience whilst we commence with the first of the new and exciting changes.

It's the War Department we have to thank, who purchased 3,072 acres from lucky Pirbright Commoners in 1877 for the princely sum of £14,600 (£1.15m today), thus joining the land they already owned as Ash Ranges. It would have been a grand sight to see the manoeuvres held in summers thereafter. Not so much fun for the Poor Bloody Infantry, forced to march in noonday sun over the heathland, then virtually devoid of trees. After



some fatalities from heatstroke (a couple buried in the churchyard), Queen Victoria ordered the planting of conifers. True to the Law of Unintended Consequences, they are now a pest which need regular clearing. #### SEPTEMBER GARDENING TIPS from Wellie

Some Broad beans and pea varieties (such as Aquadulce Claudia and Pea 'Douce Provence') can be sown now for an earlier crop next year, along with spring cabbages and spinach (which might need to be covered from frosts). Onions and garlic can also be planted now for harvesting next year. There is still time to sow some salad crops such as winter lettuce mixes and mizuna, and why not put in a row or two of radishes as they are quick to mature. Some seeds can be sown now such as English marigold, cornflower, Californian poppies are a couple of suggestions. Either sow direct in to ground where they are to flower next year, or sow in modules to plant out later. Take cuttings of tender perennials such as fuchsias and Pelargoniums before they get caught by the frost. Start planting bulbs for spring display now. Divide herbaceous perennials if

they have outgrown their space or are looking tired. Net ponds before the autumn leaves start to fall. This is normally a time when gardeners start to clear up, but if you want to encourage wildlife why not leave some seedheads, and let some herbaceous perennials dieback



naturally thereby providing food and shelter for birds and small animals. Wash and disinfect bird feeders and tables to maintain hygiene, and if the feeders are quite old think about replacing them.
