The Manor Court parchment tale from last

month continues with a 1781 marriage of William Skerrett to Sarah Bullen, but only 3 years later & clearly going downhill, the first of many payments to William was recorded in the Pirbright Overseers of the Poor book, culminating in 1787/8 with more to Sarah for clothes & shoes for her children. Life must have been desperate, but the 1788 baptism of illegitimate William Russell Sherratt still came as a surprise, followed by the above disapproving entry in 1793. William Russell was one of the stone-getters who dug Pirbright stone from the Common (see the church tower). He died in 1796, leaving his land & cottage in trust to eldest son William Russell Skirrett, letting mother Sarah live there for life & it was he who sold them in 1823 via the long-missing parchment which turned up in Sheffield. jonathan@pirbright.info

The animals gathered around the new nativity figurines. They had been made years ago by a talented boy in the village, but lay forgotten in a garage as the boy went on to become a famous sculptor. Now they were in the church for all to see.

'And their clothes are not very colourful' grumbled a squirrel, 'even the Kings look a bit shabby.' 'They don't look very cheerful, do they' said Badger, 'in fact Joseph looks decidedly worried!'

DECEMBER GARDENING TIPS from Wellie

Prune Japanese maples (*Acer palmatum*) now (if required), as they will bleed sap if pruning is done in Spring onwards. Start to winter prune wisteria by cutting back the whippy summer side shoots to 2 or 3 buds. Prune climbing roses, removing diseased or damaged growth and tying in any new shoots. Prune older flowered side shoots back to two thirds of their length. Remove yellowing leaves from your winter brassicas and cover with netting to protect from pigeons. Cut down dead asparagus foliage, (if not already done). Dig over empty borders and cover with well rotted manure. Prune apple and pear trees now to maintain an open, well balanced structure and encourage quality over quantity of fruit production. Prune grape vines now by cutting back the side shoots to 1 or 2 buds. Apply grease bands to trunks of fruit trees to prevent female winter moths



climbing the trunks to lay their eggs. Wash and disinfect bird feeders and tables, clean out bird baths. Hang fat balls and make sure feeders are kept topped up. Make a pile of old logs in a corner of your garden to provide shelter for wildlife. Did you know that the wrappers of Quality Street chocolates are compostable? Apparently they are made from cellulose, derived from wood pulp, so they can be added to your compost heap.....well that will be my excuse for eating some chocolates over Christmas!
