Just a thought.....


Whatever 'love' is...

The Prioress in Chaucer's Canterbury Tales wore a posh medallion with the inscription 'Amor Vincit Omnia' – 'love conquers all'. A Prioress 'is a head of [a] convent house of nuns'. However, the phrase was first written by the Roman poet Virgil so a pagan, not a Christian. 'It refers to amorous or physical love, not spiritual love, and so should not be the motto of a religious woman... It could possibly be construed as about God's love, but that is a stretch—if the prioress were truly religious she would have found a phrase about love from the Bible.'

February is the month when we, too, celebrate love, on St Valentine's Day. But I wonder what we think of when we send our cards (anonymously or not) to a 'loved' one? What do we mean by 'in love'?

Isn't that the sort of love that we should be celebrating – a deep, genuine love for all other human beings, animals, indeed the whole of God's wonderful creation. It's difficult, I know, to have that sort of love for everyone and everything, especially when you're hurting or alone. But always remember that *agape* is the only kind of love that God has for us.

Here in Pirbright we are embarking on a new era at St Michael's with a new priest. Let's help him to grow the friendship love into the selfless universal love for *all* of our neighbours. *That's* the sort of love that we should aspire to.







PIRBRIGHT HISTORIANS

Welcome to our new Vicar, George Watkinson, the latest in a long line of incumbents stretching back over 800 years. In his admirable booklet on the history of St. Michael's, James Grimshaw lists 40 known, but there are many gaps. The longest recorded was George Dawson, curate for 50 years from 1705, whose marble tablet beside the pulpit predates the current building. His predecessor was the strangely named Hashabiah Horsnell. 100 years before him, curate Henry Asser's 7 children were christened with the unusual names of The Lords Neare, Experience, Godheard, Christian, Hope, Be Faithful & Timothy. The earliest known incumbent, c1200, was Parson Jordan. 600 years later, in 1805, Halsey's map still showed 5 fields as Jordans, stretching from Cove Bridge to Grove Farm. Is there hidden archaeology under the gardens of the Terrace, Gibbs Acre or Cowbridge Meadow?

CUNNINGHAM HOUSE

Forty-three years ago a local lady, Sylvia Cunningham, recognised a need in Pirbright for accommodation to suit older people who were lonely and finding household bills and chores increasingly difficult. In researching options, she discovered the Abbeyfield charity which provides a structure for volunteers to run this type of accommodation. She brought on board some willing volunteers with relevant skills to take the project forward. To this day, we are still run by local volunteers who sit on either the Board of Trustees (taking responsibility for strategic aspects of the house) or the House Committee (who take responsibility for day-to-day operational aspects). We always





The churchyard animals are all very excited about meeting our new Vicar. FEBRUARY GARDENING TIPS from Wellie

These tips are written a month in advance and the weather outside at the moment is extremely wet and windy, but also very mild. It will be interesting to see which plants, especially the more temperate ones, will have survived the low temperatures we had in December. In the 20 odd years that I have been working as a gardener, 2022 was the first year that the leaves (especially some of the oaks) had not all fallen by Christmas. So the suggestions below are just that – suggestions, and are all dependent on the weather. Cut back ornamental grasses and other perennials left for winter interest. Prune back shrubs such as Cornus and Salix grown for winter coloured stems. Winter flowering jasmine can be pruned after it has finished flowering. Take out any dead or damaged wood, tie in any stems needed to extend the framework, then shorten side shoots to 5cm from main framework. This is a good time of year to apply slow release fertilisers such as fish blood and bone or pelleted chicken manure to your beds and borders. Once winter flowering heathers have finished flowering, trim back with shears to the base of

the flower stalks, thus encouraging side shoots to grow. Cut back late flowering (group 3) Clematis such as *Clematis viticella, C. orientalis* and *C. "jackmanii"* to a low pair of strong buds, 23-45cm from the ground. Prune late summer flowering shrubs such as Buddleia, Lavatera and Fuschia hard. Try to finish pruning apple

level.

and pear trees by the end of the month.
Cut autumn raspberry canes to ground
level and prune out a quarter of blackcurrant older growth at ground
