29th September is Michaelmas, the feast day of St Michael and All Angels

Michael is an archangel, whose name means 'who is like unto God?' He makes various appearances throughout the Bible, from the book of Daniel to the Book of Revelation. In Daniel, he is 'one of the princes' of the heavenly host, and the special guardian of Israel. In Revelation, he is the principal fighter of the heavenly battle against the Devil.

In art Michael is often depicted as slaying the dragon, as in the 14th century East Anglian Psalters, or in Epstein's famous sculpture at Coventry cathedral. Or he is found (in medieval art) as weighing souls, Michael's most famous shrine in western Europe is Mont -Saint-Michel, where a Benedictine abbey was founded in the 10th century.

Michaelmas



In medieval England, Michaelmas marked the end of the farming year, when the harvest was over, and the bailiff or reeve of the manor would be making out the accounts for the year. It became one of the 'quarter days', when accounts had to be settled. On manors, it was the day when a reeve (foreman) was elected from the peasants. Michaelmas hiring fairs were held at the end of September or beginning of October, enabling labourers to find work for the year ahead. Michaelmas is still a significant dates marking the terms in the judicial, financial and academic year.

CUNNINGHAM HOUSE

The start of September will see many young Pirbrighters begin the next phase of their education/career path, which may be college, university, an apprenticeship or maybe diving straight into the job market. I wonder how many are planning to become a carer for elderly people. It is a career which is often overlooked and undervalued yet can be so rewarding; not in monetary value but in making a difference to an older person's life. Working at Cunningham House for the last 14 years has shown me that old age brings both physical and mental challenges, but a little support from our lovely self-employed carer as well as peer support from fellow residents makes a huge difference to their well-being.

Parish Councillor Elected

The Council would like to announce that Mrs Lindsay Graham became the seventh Parish Councillor on Wednesday 9th August 2023 having been elected by a majority vote of residents. The Council would like to thank all those who voted and explain that Parish elections are non-political. The Parish Council was not permitted to give out any information about the candidates prior to the election, other than their names. Campaigning is the responsibility of the candidates themselves.

As you will have read in previous articles, local residents formally contacted GBC to call for an election when the vacancy arose in June. This election has resulted in a cost to the Parish Council of £3,300.

Councillors have three main areas of work:

- Decision-making: attending meetings and committees with other elected members, Councillors decide which activities to support, where money should be spent, what services should be delivered and what policies should be implemented;
- Monitoring: Councillors make sure that their decisions lead to efficient and effective services by keeping an eye on how well things are working;
- Getting involved locally: as local elected

representatives, Councillors have responsibilities towards their parishioners and local organisations.

Having been Clerk for over 20 years, Lindsay will be a very capable Councillor. Being a voice for the community can affect real change and although the role requires dedication and is certainly time-consuming we are sure Lindsay will not regret putting herself forward to serve her community.

Attending a council meeting is the best way to find out what the Parish Council is all about. Members of the public are welcome to attend all meetings of the Council and may address the Council about any matter of concern during the first ten minutes of the meeting.

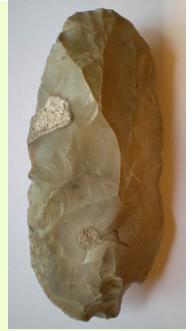

PIRBRIGHT HISTORIANS

When we came to Pirbright some 50 years ago, I thought that the village was historically fairly 'recent'; sandy scrubland hard-won from the heath by stubborn medieval peasants. However, this photo is of a Neolithic tranche axe head found near Kiln Hill on Pirbright Common by the late Peter Netherton, and a dig in the 1990s at the Manor House found Roman and Iron Age pottery sherds and fragments of struck flint. To find evidence of early settlement in such unlikely places seemed amazing, but, thinking on, perhaps Pirbright wasn't such a bad spot after all. There's water from the streams. On the Common there was flint and clay for pots, plenty of rabbits to eat, heather for thatch and ironstone on the Hogs Back for smelting (a lump of iron slag was unearthed near Kiln Hill). Thousands of years of history are just under our feet. Food for thought.....

SEPTEMBER GARDENING TIPS from Wellie

Bring in houseplants that were moved outside for the summer, before temperatures start to drop. Lift and divide congested clumps of perennials, once they have finished flowering. Plant spring bulbs such as daffodils, hyacinths and snake's-head fritillaries. Take cuttings of fuchsias, pelargoniums and salvias. Collect ripe seeds, store in envelopes and label ready to sow next year. Some varieties of broad beans and peas can be sown now so that you have an early crop next year. Plant onion sets and garlic bulbs. Spring cabbages and spinach can also be sown, but might need to be protected from frosts. Clear leaves shading pumpkins to help them to ripen for Halloween, and raise them off the ground to prevent them from rotting. Cut bean and pea plants at ground level after they have finished, leaving the roots in the ground as they have will release nitrogen back into the soil as they break down. There is a technique that is being used more now which is 'Chop and drop'. Rather than pulling out annuals and cutting down perennials and putting on the compost heap or in your green waste bin, the idea is to cut the plants at ground level, chop up the stems and then leave on the beds to decompose where they are. This technique is thought to help reduce water loss from evaporation, slowly release nutrients back into the soil, save time and trips to the compost heap/bin, support soil life but if you prefer neat and tidy beds this idea might not be for you!
